Another Contender Between Vancouver Lightweights and Frankie Burns This P. M.

San Francisco, Oct. 31.—A hitch over the weight question threatened today to result in calling off the dogs for a 21-round battle here Thanksgiving day between Bud Anderson and Frankie Burns.

Anderson insisted that he could easily do 133 pounds four hours before the battle, the weight insisted upon by Burns, but said he would not do it. Burns then called off negotiations, but Promoter Jimmy Rohan, acting for Eddie Grane, arranged another conference for late today.

The University of Washington team, through its graduate manager, Ralph Horr, washed his hands of the game last Saturday night.

Manager Plowden Stott upon hearing of Dobie's stand in regard to getting up an all-star team, wired Johnny Bender of the Washington state college. Whether the Indians will be brought to the coast will be decided tonight.

Stott is willing to guarantee the Indians \$2500, but it is not known whether Bender would agree to that amount. If this proposition is agreeable to Bender, the games will likely be played on Christmas and New Year's days.

### SEASIDE HAS NEW INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITIES

(Special to The Journal.) Seaside, Or., Oct. 31.—Prouty brothers, who are building a sawmill on the Wahanna river at this place, have incorporated as the Prouty Lumber & Box company and will soon be putting rough and dry lumber and box shooks on the market. J. A. Prouty is president, A. N.

Prouty is vice president and F. W. Prouty, Jr. is secretary. The mill will shortly be put in operation to saw enough lumber for dry kilns and other necessary buildings. As soon as these are completed the mill will start full capacity. Electric power will be furnished by the Seaside Light & Power company, which will also extend its day service to other shops and factories in the city. Heretofore the electric plant has only been giving a night service.

There is a possibility that the box factory of the defunct Seaside Lumber & Manufacturing company, which has been idle for the past three years, will resume operation. The machinery from the sawmill of the defunct concern was sold to Prouty brothers and is now being installed.
