

ASSAULT IDENTIFIED BY WOMAN FOLLOWING CAPTURE BY A POSSE

Man Who Attacked Milwaukee Resident in Her Own Home, in Custody

Milwaukee, Or., Nov. 1.—The stranger who yesterday at 7:50 a. m. choked and beat Mrs. Walter E. Gellinsky in her home at Lakewood station and was captured four hours later in nearby brush by members of the posse, has been identified as Emerico Pollo, a Frenchman, who had walked from San Francisco to Lakewood seeking work. He admitted attacking Mrs. Gellinsky, and she positively identified him as her assailant. Pollo reached Lakewood about 10 p. m. Thursday. He spent the night in the station there, and yesterday morning watched Mr. Gellinsky leave for Portland before entering his home. Pollo is 27 years old and speaks English poorly. He is of light medium height, smooth shaven, sallow complexioned and has short curly black hair. He wore dark blue trousers, a light-colored coat and a black cotton oiler's cap with a leather bill. After Pollo seized Mrs. Gellinsky, managed to reach the telephone, pull the receiver down and ring the bell, and her screams, which frightened him away, were heard by the 17-year-old boy central, H. Dowling. He at once telephoned his father, Deputy City Marshal Arthur Dowling, who notified Deputy Sheriff Kelso. Fifteen minutes after the attack Dowling and Kelso were running toward the Gellinsky home, half a mile away, while the central continued to phone the news to Milwaukee when, who had been formed at a point of 50. The deputies obtained from Mrs. Gellinsky a description of her assailant and the direction in which he fled, which they had phoned to all surrounding points at the time. Sheriff Kelso, after beating the brush near the Gellinsky home without finding the fugitive, and stationing men to completely surround the town and station in on him, they returned to Milwaukee. Meanwhile, when a neighbor, Mrs. Nicholson, was returning from a visit to the Gellinsky home with a bulldog, the animal discovered Pollo in some brush under the Kellogg creek footbridge. Mrs. Nicholson, screams brought Al Thomas, one of the posse, who, with the aid of his hired man, took Pollo to his home, near by, and telephoned Station Agent J. R. Kelso. At Kelso's home Sheriff Mack, who had just arrived from Oregon City, and Deputy Will Kelso and Dowling he rushed to the Thomas home in an auto and handcuffed the prisoner. He was later taken to the county jail at Oregon City. Mrs. Gellinsky, who is a frail little woman, was badly bruised, and for a time was hysterical.

SNAKE CHARMER IN POLICE STATION, GIVES SCARE WITH REPTILES

Matron Sampson refused to search her snake charmer insisted she had a snake coiled around her waist underneath her cloak. She refused to remove the cloak and was put into a cell. About 9 o'clock, the woman came to the police station to see Detectives Snow and Coleman, who were looking for her on charge of defrauding an innkeeper. She carried a laundry bag in which were two moosehorns and a rattlesnake. Around her neck, underneath the cloak, was a five foot spotted snake. It was not discovered until the woman had been taken to the third floor of the jail. She refused to give up the snakes, and in the scuffle they escaped and began crawling across the station floor. The policemen headed them off with their helmets. Finally the reptiles were driven into a corner and eventually in the laundry bag and taken to the Washington park zoo. Last evening the woman and her snakes slept at the Hoyt hotel where she has been staying the last few evenings. She let the snakes run at large in her room. During her absence the Japanese house boy ran to the room, and found the snakes curled around a light globe. He threw a mattress over the light and the snakes, rushed into the office and fainted. Detectives Tichenor and Abbott took the snake charmer to a photograph gallery this morning, as she wanted her picture taken. Another "scene" was caused there when she removed the snakes from the laundry bag and placed them on an imitation log in the gallery. She is on her way to San Francisco.

Word, testified that they never took interest. Mr. Stevens explained that as tax collector he held the public moneys only a very short period of time before turning it over to the treasurer. Cashier McGibbon of the defendant American Bank and Trust company testified that at the time Mr. Fields' savings account of \$4000 was converted into a time certificate of deposit the conversion was not made at his solicitation. **Accused's Brother Called** As to the amount of interest Mr. Fields was to be given on certificate of deposit he said that it was his understanding that if the certificates were left in the bank for one year the bank would pay the usual rate of interest. If they were withdrawn sooner no interest would be allowed. SUBPENA IS ISSUED FOR BISHOP COOKE IN METHODIST LITIGATION

Church Head Expected to Testify for Defense; No Temporary Injunction

A subpoena directing Bishop R. J. Cooke of the Methodist Episcopal church to appear as a witness for the defense in the suit brought to prevent the consolidation of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church and the First church, was wired to Indianapolis last night by Attorney W. C. Bristol, counsel for Rev. Dr. Young in the dispute now pending in the courts between the two church factions. Bishop Cooke is in Indiana, and it is believed that he will receive the subpoena some time today. It requires his presence in Portland, Friday, November 7, when the controversy now on between the two factions of the First Methodist church in reference to the consolidation of the Grace church with the First church, as authorized by the quarterly conference last year, will be given full hearing before Circuit Judge Cleaton. **No Temporary Injunction** Pending actual trial, no temporary injunction restraining the consolidation, already petitioned for, will be allowed. This much was agreed upon yesterday between Judge Cleaton, M. L. Pipes, representing the faction seeking the writ, W. C. Bristol, counsel for Rev. Benjamin Young, pastor of the First church, and A. E. Baker and A. Zollinger, counsel for the Taylor Street church and the trustees. That the proceedings will be hotly contested there is no doubt. In this connection it is pointed out that the action seeking the injunction against consolidation is fighting for a final and complete separation of the two congregations which were joined several months ago. It is anticipated that the case will take up at least a week of the court's time and probably more, owing to the fact that the entire history of the case from the time consolidation was authorized last year up to the present time will be brought to the court's attention. **No Temporary Intervention** When the attorneys for the two factions appeared in court yesterday, Judge Cleaton said he was not inclined to grant a temporary injunction without hearing both sides, and as this was manifestly impossible under the circumstances he decided to take up the matter in detail for a final decree. Yesterday Attorneys Zollinger and Baker for the church trustees and churches, filed answer to the plaintiffs' charges. Their answer was about the same as the one filed earlier in the week by Dr. Young. In brief they set forth that the churches and trustees have followed instructions as laid down by the governing body of the church; that the question in dispute is a matter purely ecclesiastical and within the management of the governing bodies of the church and should be adjudicated by them and not by a civil court. The answer concludes with a demand for the denial of the application for injunctions and payment of costs and disbursements by the plaintiffs. The answer was filed in behalf of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church, the First Methodist Episcopal church and the trustees of the First church. Contrary to general opinion the Rev. Mr. Young is not personally mixed up in the controversy as far as the legal end of it is concerned. As pastor of the church he automatically becomes a party to the suit; the injunction is not aimed at him, but is, instead, directed against the church as an organization.

WILL ASK FOR DREDGER OF LARGEST CAPACITY

Leviathan Would Give Thirty-five Foot Channel in Year, It Is Said

The Ports of Columbia committee has found that the \$750,000 appropriation asked of congress by Senator Harry Lane for a dredge at the mouth of the Columbia will not be enough. The committee will ask Senator Lane and other representatives in congress of the northwestern states to support an appropriation for at least \$1,500,000. Dr. Alfred Kinney, chairman of the Ports of Columbia committee, announced yesterday that he had received through the efforts of G. W. Wingate of the Port of Astoria commission, estimates on the cost of a dredge which would duplicate the famous Leviathan of the Mersey bar, Liverpool. The Seattle Construction & Drydock Co. wants \$1,575,000 and 18 months in which to construct a duplicate of the Leviathan. The Gamble company of Liverpool, which built the Leviathan, sent word that the construction cost of a duplicate would be \$1,000,000. The Leviathan cost \$750,000, but her builders say that conditions have changed since her construction, and it is not now possible to build a vessel of her capacity for so little. "I have found that the Leviathan alone has more power than all the dredges owned and operated by the United States together," said Dr. Kinney. "A vessel like the Leviathan could cut through our Columbia river bar and give us a channel of 35 feet in a year."

ANGRY CHINESE SHOOT BOY; KILLS HIMSELF

San Francisco, Nov. 1.—Paul Lyons, 17, shot in the breast last night by an unidentified young Chinese who afterward killed himself, probably will recover, it was stated at the Central Emergency hospital today.

Lyons, with several friends, was stepping from a lunch room as the Chinese passed, accidentally struck him the elbow with the swinging door and then laughed whereupon, in a flare of temper, the Chinese pulled a pistol and fired.

Several policemen chased him through the Mission district and were just on the point of capturing him when he turned his pistol on himself, pulled the trigger and fell dead.

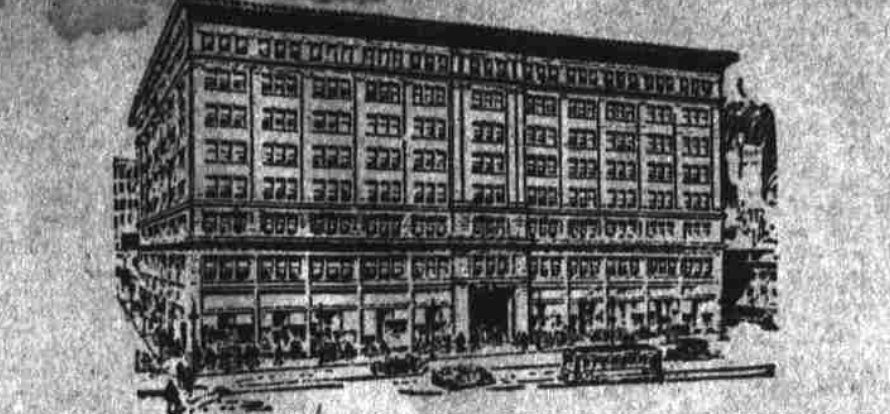
