

CRIMINALS SHOULD BE TREATED LIKE OTHERS WHO SUFFER DISEASE

Former Penitentiary Chaplain Declares Men Who Commit Crime Are Morally Ill.

"Cause and Cure of Crime" was the topic of a very instructive lecture delivered during the week by Rev. G. W. Feffer of Seattle, former chaplain of the Wisconsin state penitentiary...

"We do what we do because we are what we are," declared Rev. Feffer, in accounting for the numbers in prison stripes...

"Crime," said Rev. Feffer, "is not a physical or mental disease, but is a moral disease, though the mental and physical condition, being often related to the moral, may, and often do, supersede the criminal act."

"The criminal should not be dressed up in good clothes and paraded as a hero, neither should he be treated with brutality, but as a man who needs help. If our friends assist in crime, with a fever we call the physician or if overcome with insanity we hurry them to the hospital for skillful treatment...

"I would have no guard in the penitentiary who was not a Christian, and had that larger sympathy for sinful man that belongs to the follower of the Saviour of men. After all, it is said and done, sin is the basis of all crime, and only a remedy for sin will be an effectual remedy for crime."

Rev. Feffer is now the missionary of the union in northwest Washington. Another address of unusual interest was that of J. W. Armstrong of Walla Walla on "More Than a Quarter Century a Missionary."

During these years of service of the American Sunday School union, Mr. Armstrong has organized more than 400 Sunday schools with fully 26,000 members.
