

HUNTERS WHOSE GUNS HAVE BEEN SEIZED MAY GET THEM BACK

Except Where Arrest Has Occurred or Offense Aggravated, Fine to Be Exact.

The state board of fish and game commissioners in its monthly meeting Saturday, decided that hunters whose guns have been confiscated for violations of the law, may have them back for a nominal sum.

State Game Warden Finley was authorized to ship at once to State Fish Commissioner Graham at Boston, Mass., 200,000 eyed chinook salmon eggs.

Hunters to kill off predatory animals in the counties of Josephine, Jackson, Douglas, Curry and Coos will go to work in a few days, stated Secretary Sherman of the Josephine County Game and Fish Protective association.

"We have found," stated Mr. Sherman, "that a cougar will kill one or two deer a week. They do not discriminate between the bucks and the does. That would mean that each cougar is making away with 100 deer a year."

"Great interest is being taken by our people in the game protection work," said Mr. Sherman. "We are all working together in an effort to have a tract of 200,000 acres, including the Marble caves and the Siskiyou mountains for 35 miles, made into a national park and game refuge. This tract begins at a point southeast of Grants Pass, and extends in a southerly direction across Josephine county and 2 1/2 miles into the state of California."
