

CHINESE BURED WITH



Except Where Arrest Has Occurred or Offense Aggravated, Fine to Be Exacted.

The state board of fish and game commissioners in its monthly meeting Saturday, decided that hunters whose guns, have been confiscated for violations of the law, may have them back for a nominal sum. This payment will amount to \$2.50, unless the offense is aggravated or the offender has been arrested before. Any larger penalty than the amount named will be fixed by the board at its regular meeting. In the office of State Game Warden

Finley, there is a veritable arsenal of shotguns, confiscated by the various doputies. It was at first intended to soil these at public sale. Some of the weapons confiscated are very valuable, a few being worth more than the \$50 maximum fine that has been imposed so far.

State Game Warden Finley was au-thorized to ship at once to State Fish Commissioner Graham at Boston, Mass. 209,000 eyed chinook salmon eggs, which are to be traded for 200,000 eastern brook trout eggs. The Massachu setts station wishes to experiment with the salmon in the eastern coast streams,

brass band, and a Chinese trio consist ing of a Chinese oboe, one string violin and gongs. That his aged wife might not be

forced to walk to the grave as a Chinese mourner, she donned for the nonce occidental garb and rode in a carriage. Had she worn the customary pantaloons and blouse, perforce she must have followed

the funeral cortege on foot. - Even at the grave this odd intermingling of an ancient civilization with a new prevailed. A sermon was preached by Rev. Moy Ling, a Christian Chinese, although burning punk and food were placed by the grave, according to the Chinese custom. The plaintive flute with its shrill wall of despair was drowned by noble strains of "Nearer, My God, to Thee."
