New York, Nov. 6.—Ought New York's Democracy to stamp Tanmany out absolutely, form a new organization and make an entirely fresh start? Or would it be better to make the old organization all over and go on using that?

These were the questions Gotham's Democratic politicians were asking one another today.

The conservative older heads were of the opinion that a reorganization would be better. The Tammany machinery was wonderfully effective, they argued. It would take years for any substitute for it of work so well. "Boas" Murphy must be ousted, they all agreed. Many thought it would be wise to drop the name. "Tammany." 
