BUFFALO JONES TO TRY

TO GET LIVE GORILLA

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 11.—Buffalo Jones, Portaies, N. M., pioneer ranchman, trapper and huntsman rival of Theodore Roosevelt, was in Fort Worth today. He followed Roosevelt through Africa, but while the former president was slaughtering big game, Jones and his two cowhors were rounded. his two cowboys were roping lions, rhinoceros, hippos, leopards, sebras and

rhinoceros, hippos, leopards, sebras and other jungle animals.

Jones said today:

"I am going back to Africa in December, and we expect to rope a gorilla, which I have contracted to deliver to a big circus for \$250,000. If the gorilla is an animal, we will outwit it and make the capture without injury to any one of the party—but if it is human, some of us will get hurt.

"There is no real gorilla in captivity now, and should we be successful in roping one. I am satisfied it will make me a million."

COURT HOUSE LIGHTS TO GO OUT AT 11 O'CLOCK

No more will the courthouse windows glow after 11 o'clock at night unless the glow is from the windows of some county official or deputy working overtime. igures Disclose on Only 35 Days Out of 166 Would Have Prevented Dredging.

In his lonely post on North Head, Washington, the farthermost and highest point where the Columbia river empties into the Pacific ocean, J. J. Keiliher, government weather observer, has complied information that not only goes a long way toward redeeming the bar from its stormy reputation but that may have a decisive in-

observations of each of the days from November 1, 1912, to April 15, 1912. As small an average of stormy days when a dredge could not work are shown as during the summer months. The total count numbers 166 days, and on 131 of these days the bar was either smooth or moderate. On only 14 days did the observations taken at 7 a. m., 8 a. m., noon, and 4 p.-m., show the bar continuously rough.

The longest storm period was 6 days -December 28-January 2, inclusive The next longest storm periods recorded are of three days each, January 7-9, inclusive, and March 11-13, inclusive. It was on January 7 that the glamer Rose-crans was wrecked on Peacock Spit. There are five periods of two days each when the bar was rough either all

or a part of the time. These are December 3-4, December 18-19, February 16-17 March 2-3, March 30-31. The results of the compilation show a comparatively small number of days when dredging could not have been car ried on. Dr. Alfred Kinney, chairman of the Ports of Columbia committee and several others active in the move-ment to deepen the channel over the Columbia river bar, believe that a dredger could be worked the greater part of the year. Such a policy would prevent storms of winter filling in the channel dredged during the summer. The information obtained will be forwarded in detail to Senator Harry Lane at Washing-
