WASHINGTON LEAVES SEATTLE TODAY FOR SAUNT TO PORTLAND

Dobie Says Team Weakened for Championship Game on Saturday With U. of O.

(Special to The Journal.) University of Washington, Seattle, Nov. 12.—The University of Washington team will leave Seattle today for Portland, where they will clash with the University of Oregon Saturday for the championship.

The team this year is not as heavy nor in as good condition as in former years, but is going to Portland to make a game fight for the northwest championship for the sixth consecutive time. Dobie has had his men out drilling them in both kinds of football. He was a spectator at the O. A. C. game last Saturday, and has been putting special stress on the forward pass, Oregon's strong point.

The team just now is not in very good physical condition, due largely to the injuries received in the Whitman game. Shiel has a bad ankle, which will slow him up considerably. Hunt is suffering from two broken ribs, while Miller has one of the bones broken in his kicking foot. He has not been out for practice for over a week, but will be in the game next Saturday nevertheless. Last night Bud Young sprained his knee for the second time this year. He will not even be in uniform at the Saturday game.

Another thing that is worrying Dobie is the fact that Noble, a freshman playing right half, will have to be on the side lines, on account of a bad leg.

The rosters are making big preparations for the game, and expect to go to Portland several hundred strong. They will leave Seattle Saturday morning in a special train via the O. W. R. & N. This train will get them into Portland about noon. The band will also accompany the rosters to Portland. They will be under the able leadership of Bruce McDougal, Yell Leader. Mathews has been practicing a new yell in hopes of showing the Oregon students a few things in the art of making noise. He has also planned a novel stunt to be sprung between halves.

Los Angeles Promoter Will Go Through With Cross but Prepared for Injuries.

Los Angeles, Nov. 12.—Joe Rivers and Leach Cross will weigh 135-pounds ringside when they meet at Vernon on the afternoon of Thanksgiving day in a scheduled 20 round ring battle.

This weight was agreed upon yesterday after Cross telegraphed such a request from New York, urging that he will not have sufficient time after his arrival here to reduce to a lower poundage. Cross was scheduled to leave New York for Los Angeles this afternoon.

Should Rivers or Cross be injured during training or anything occur to prevent the appearance of either in the ring, Promoter McCarey probably will substitute Bud Anderson of Medford. He has agreed, by telegraph, to give Bud an opportunity in case his present plans go awry.

DEMAND FOR SEATS AT SATURDAY GAME GREATER THAN EVER

Students of Both Colleges to Stage Original Stunts During Intermission.

The demand for seats for the Oregon-Washington college championship game to be played Saturday afternoon on Multnomah Field is greater than for any gridiron battle staged in Portland. Never before has so much interest been manifested in a football game.

Practically every seat in the center of the grand stand has been sold. Several hundred reservations have been made for prominent Eugene and Seattle business men. The rooting section this season will be reserved on the east side of the field for both colleges.

The stunts planned by the yell leaders of both colleges will surpass anything that has been witnessed in Portland. The famous "Washington Hook" will be here again and it will be guarded by 100 of the Washington students. The lemon and yellow students will bring their big "O" to the game. Between halves the students of both colleges will form a serpentine on the playing field.

Reports from both schools are being carefully guarded. Washington does not look any stronger than it did last season, because Shiel and Miller are not in the best of condition, it is reported. Anson Cornell, Oregon's great little quarterback, has not been out for practice this week, it is said, and may not be able to play in the game.

The seat sale will continue at Spalding's store on Washington street until Saturday noon. The general admission tickets will be sold at the entrance gates north of the grandstand before the start of the game.

EDDIE MENSOR WILL SPEND WINTER HERE

Eddie Mensor, the former Portland outfielder who was sold to the Pittsburg Pirates, returned from the east yesterday and will spend the winter in Portland, according to his present plans. Eddie says that he did not have a very good season with the Pirates on account of being sick all summer. Stomach trouble bothered him considerably and interfered with his work. Eddie played a grand game in the exhibition series with the Naps.

"I always feel good when I get out on the coast," said Mensor this morning, and wish I were playing out here instead of on the Atlantic seaboard. All last summer the heat and the stomach trouble which I suffered interfered with my work."

Mensor will be a guest at the banquet to the Sox and Giants next Tuesday.

PRELIMINARY BOUTS IN COAST BOXING EVENTS TO BE STAGED TONIGHT

Grudge Bouts Will Be Settled and Mittslinging Should Be Interesting to Fans.

The preliminary bouts of the Pacific coast championships will be staged tonight at 8:30 o'clock at the Multnomah club. The 25 mitt swingers with weight in at 6 o'clock this evening and the drawings will be made at the same time.

The bouts promise to be the best staged in Portland in a number of years. The 115, 125 and 135 pound classes will furnish the most exciting bouts of the meet. The entries in the heavier classes are not as numerous as they have been in past meets.

Several grudges will be settled this evening. Boxing fans are hoping to see Walter Williams and Allen McNeill get together. These two 115 pounders have been scheduled to appear against each other numerous times, but something has always prevented their meeting.

Reports from the club states that every boxer entered in the tournament is in the best of shape. Schmeer, the "M" club's 135 pounder, who was overweight, is below the mark at the present time.

There will be at least three bouts in the 125, 135 and 145 pound classes. In the 108, 115 and 125 pound classes there will be two bouts. All told, between 12 and 15 bouts will be staged. The winner in each class will receive a beautiful gold medal and the second place winner will receive one. Omar Dranga will be the refereeing, and Joe Smith and J. N. Teal will do the judging.

Fox had a clear lead in seven rounds, while the other three were even. Moore tried repeatedly to rush Fox but the latter kept away and gave Roy a boxing lesson.

Fritz Holland, the Spokane middleweight, fought his old time form and gave "Dude" Clark of Los Angeles an artistic lacing. Holland put Clark down and almost out with a right swing to the jaw in the first round. The middleweights fought six rounds, Holland winning the decision.

OLD KID MALARIA PUT MILLER OUT 'TIS SAID

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—That Charlie Miller, the San Francisco heavyweight, knocked out recently in three rounds in New York by Gunboat Smith, was suffering from malaria when he entered the ring, was the assertion here today of Frank Carter, who acted as Miller's manager on his eastern trip.

"Miller was going fine at the start," said Carter, "but he was so badly weakened by the attack of malaria that he was unable to keep up the pace. He beat Palmer in New York and knocked out Tony Ross in Boston, but the referee robbed us and gave the fight to Ross on a foul."

New York, Nov. 12.—A match between the winner of the Freddie Welsh-Jack Britton bout with Willie Ritchie, the world's lightweight champion, was planned here today by Matchmaker Gibson of the Garden Athletic club. JIMMY AGNEW CAN'T COLLECT COIN WHEN HE DOESN'T PERFORM

Former Pitcher Who Developed Sore Arm Gets Claim Disallowed.

Out of Columbus yesterday came a brief announcement: "Claim of J. W. Agnew against Portland, Or., \$234, disallowed," and back of it is a very interesting story concerning the relationship between player and club.

Jimmy Agnew, the former Vancouver pitcher, who was concerned in a deal that sent Pitcher Schmutz from Tacoma to the Brown club, refused to report to the Tigers and was purchased by Portland. He is a son of Jay Agnew, the old time ball player, who formerly owned the Seattle club. Agnew pitched a few games at the end of the 1912 season and reported to Manager Williams at Santa Rosa. He had a good amount of time to work himself into shape.

Agnew was of little service to the club during the first couple of months of the season, explaining from time to time that he was not ready to pitch. Early in June, Williams sent him in the ninth inning to save a game, and he retired the side on eight pitched balls. A week later Williams asked him if he would take another swing at it, when he began to complain of having hurt his arm while pitching the eight balls the previous week.

A physician was set to work on the arm, but Agnew was unable to pitch. Williams gave him a half month's pay and told him he could go home to Tacoma, and come back when the arm got better. Nothing more was heard from Agnew by Judge McCredie until Secretary Farrell notified him of the claim of the ex-pitcher. He immediately sat down and wrote an answer, and it struck the point so well that Secretary Farrell asked him to prepare a like paper to be read before the National association, now in convention at Columbus.

It is likely that the paper, which handles the matter from a judicial standpoint, will be spread before the members of the National commission, which recently held that where a player is held on the reserve list he is entitled to full pay during the playing season. Agnew was held on the reserve list, but was unable to give service to the club, and his claim for some three months' salary was declared wrong.

PRINCETON IS 10 TO 7 FAVORITE OVER YALE FOR SATURDAY GAME

Navy Is Quoted at 10 to 6 Over Army and Harvard Is Also Well Liked.

New York, Nov. 12.—Betting on the big football games scheduled for Saturday opened up in earnest today. Princeton was a 10 to 7 favorite over Yale.

The betting on the Navy-Army game was 10 to 6 with the midshipmen on the long end. Although the Harvard-Yale game is more than a week away, a number of wagers were recorded on the game, with Harvard the favorite at 13 to 6.

The Harvard squad rested today for Saturday's game with Brown. The team will engage in but little scrimmaging after Saturday's contest, the coaches not wishing to take any chances of the regulars receiving injuries.

The Princeton squad also took things easy today, engaging only in signal practice. The New Haven coaches have not decided on Yale's final lineup. It was announced, however, that Warren will return to tackle and that Ketcham would remain at left guard.

PENDLETON AND BAKER WILL PLAY FOOTBALL

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 12.—Friday afternoon will see the football gladiators of the Pendleton and Baker high schools fighting it out for supremacy at Round-Up park in this city, and the game promises to be a hotly contested one. The annual Pendleton-Baker game has come to have the significance in the eastern Oregon academic world that the Oregon-O. A. C. game has in collegiate circles in the Willamette valley.

The boys hope to a victory for Pendleton. Two weeks ago the locals defeated La Grande, 21 to 3, and only a week ago the La Grande boys won from Baker, 18 to 12, during the last few moments of the game, when superior condition told. Both teams have strengthened in the last week.
