

COMPENSATION LAW IN SUPREME COURT

Test Case Will Determine if Measure Is Operative at Once.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Nov. 14.—The question of whether the workmen's compensation law is in full effect, including the insurance feature, will be tested in the supreme court immediately by means of a mandamus suit, which will be filed today to compel Secretary of State Otcott to audit a claim presented by the Salem hospital. The suit is a friendly action of all concerned, and arrangements have been made with the supreme court to hear the arguments in the case tomorrow morning. It is expected a decision will be handed down by the court Tuesday.

Since Attorney General Crawford rendered an opinion to the effect that the law, while in effect, could not become fully operative until next June, on the ground that employers and employees have until that time in which to elect not to come under the law, if they so desire, the compensation commission has desired to have the law tested as soon as possible.

The commission entered into a contract with the Salem hospital for accommodations during the month of December for first aid to workmen coming under the law who might be injured. A deposit of \$25 was paid on the contract. The hospital presented the claim to the secretary of state's office, which, in order to make a basis for a friendly suit, refused to audit it.

This transaction deals with the insurance feature of the law, and will bring the question of whether it is now operative directly before the supreme court.

HUERTA TO RETIRE TOMORROW, SAYS MEXICAN RUMOR

Neither concerned that what they feared most was premature publication of developments.

It was known, however, that the administration was sure General Huerta would retire as president of Mexico though it did not appear to have been decided just when or how. The main point was that dispatches from both Embassy John Lind at Vera Cruz and Charge O'Shaughnessy at Mexico City showed the dictator had decided it would be hopeless to try to keep him in the United States, backed by the other world powers.

Despite General Carranza's declaration that he would consent to American mediation in no form whatsoever, it was believed he would change his mind and agree to mediation and an armistice pending election.

Asked concerning a report that Lind had told Huerta Mexico's ports would be blockaded unless he answered American demands by noon tomorrow, Secretary Bryan said:

"That is untrue. No representations have been made to the Huerta government that are in the nature of demands. Anxiety was felt concerning conditions at Chihuahua City, from which the rebels having cut the telegraph lines, no news was obtainable. Having been repulsed in attempts to storm the town, it was said General Villa, the rebel commander, had notified down to serve it out by a siege."

Carranza Forces Take Capital.
Nogales, Sonora, Nov. 14.—Messages received here today reported the capture of Culiacan, capital of the state of Sinaloa, by the constitutionalists. The dispatch contained no details. Rebel sympathizers here immediately launched a hilarious celebration, parading the streets and shouting "Viva Carranza."

ASHES OF JAPANESE GO HOME BY PARCEL POST

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 14.—The ashes of K. Maruawa, who died recently, are en route to Japan in the parcel post. The package was held up until the postal authorities ruled it must be accepted.

ders of Railway Conductors and Trainmen were involved.

At the last moment the company appealed to the federal board of mediation and conciliation, but it was too late to prevent the walkout.

May Reach Coast Lines.
Houston, Texas, Nov. 14.—That the strike on the Atlantic division of the Southern Pacific lines will spread unless the company speedily comes to terms was predicted by union railroad men.

They were of the opinion that the Houston and Texas Central, running north from here, would be the next line to be tied up, and said they looked to see the coast lines affected ultimately.

They would not accept mediation now, they declared, the company having refused it hitherto, but would insist that it negotiate with the united brotherhoods.

The railroad management was preparing today to man its trains with office employees who rose from the ranks and understood practical railroading. Strike breakers' supplies were also in readiness, and every indication pointed to a hard fight.

Only one train has left here since the strike began. It was bound for San Antonio. The striking conductors and engineers will draw benefits of \$50 a month from the union funds, while the strike is on, and the firemen and switchmen \$40.

President Wilson Appealed To.
Washington, Nov. 14.—Senators Randall and Thornton appealed to President Wilson today to take immediate action toward settling the Southern Pacific strike, telling him that if it continues long Louisiana and Texas industries will face ruin.
