

### STORM LOSS PLACED AT \$10,000,000 BY INSURANCE CONCERNS

Number of Victims Rises to 275; Second Storm Blows Today; Freighter Sinks.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 14.—Every hour added today to the list of known deaths in Sunday's and Monday's storm on the Great Lakes.

Estimates of the number of victims had risen to 275, and it was thought this might fall short of the truth. It was certain that 151 men perished in 11 wrecks. Nearly 75 bodies had been recovered from Lakes Huron and Superior. More were constantly being washed ashore.

Marine insurance men said that the losses from the storm were appalling. Some estimated them at more than \$10,000,000.

Sixteen ships, each carrying 20 or more men, were definitely accounted for as lost. The wreckage of a dozen smaller craft had been sighted.

The steamships Argus, Hydus and I. M. Scott, with crews of from 13 to 25, were five days overdue, and wreckage from each of them had been seen, but their owners still clung to the hope that they had found safe places to ride out the storm.

Another gale was blowing up on Lake Superior today, forcing the vessels engaged in the work of rescue to run for shelter. The wooden freighter Major sank in this second storm off Whitefish Point, but its crew of 18 was saved.

The sinking of the tug LaFayette off Huron Islands, Lake Superior, also was practically confirmed. The LaFayette carried a crew of 13, all of whom presumably perished.

R. A. Harrison of the Lake Carriers' association had taken charge of the corpses found along the southern shore of Lake Huron. Sixty bodies thus far have been recovered, and Harrison sent them to Gooderich, Ont., whence they will be shipped to relatives or, if unclaimed, buried by the association.

Lake men were expressing much indignation concerning the revenue officials who ordered the cutter Loraine

from Port Huron, leaving the still unidentified wreck of the boat stranded near there unguarded and without even a light showing as a warning to navigation. The revenue cutters, it was asserted, have not yet aided a single distressed ship.

Another freighter, Bottom Up, Harbor Beach, Mich., Nov. 14.—Another freighter, bottom upward on submerged rocks off Point Aux Barques, was sighted today. It could not be identified. Near the same spot the steamships Hanna and Mateo were rapidly breaking up.

Crews for Argus Come Ashore.  
Port Huron, Mich., Nov. 14.—Ten of the crew of the Cleveland lighter Argus, five days overdue, were washed ashore near here today. They wore life belts from the Argus and were positively identified by officials of the Pickands-Mather company, owners of the boat, which evidently sank with all on board.

### PENDLETON COUNCIL AFTER BILLBOARDS

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 14.—The city council has passed an ordinance making it unlawful for anyone to erect a billboard within the city limits save in front of the place or places where exhibitions or theatrical entertainments are to be held, or in front of places where merchandise advertised is for sale.

This action was taken as the result of the erection of two billboards on Walter's Island, just below the Main street bridge by W. N. Matlock, son of the mayor. He was requested to take them down but refused. Then the women of the Civic Club petitioned the council to abate it as a nuisance but under the existing ordinance, this could not be done as the billboards were on private property.

The mayor has not yet signed the new measure and there is much speculation as to whether or not he will.

### H. J. PARKISON DIVORCE SUIT ON THIS MONTH

### HIGHWAYMEN HOLD UP TWO TRAINS ON S. P.

Freight and Electric Suburban Are Robbed in the Oakland Yards.

Oakland, Cal., Nov. 14.—Two highwaymen, of the tall and short variety, masked and armed with heavy revolvers,

held up the conductors of two Southern Pacific trains here last night. At 10 o'clock they entered the caboose of a freight extra, eastbound at Third and Webster streets and held up Conductor G. W. Curtiss. They secured nothing of value.

At midnight they boarded the baggage and of an electric train eastbound at Seventh street and Broadway and robbed Conductor Hooper of his watch and money. They left the train at Twenty-third avenue station. The police have a description of the robbers.
