He admonished the pair that they ought to patch up their differences for the sake of the children, but refused to force Nash to provide for his wife unless she should consent to live with her husband.

AMOUNT OF SCHOOL TAX IS FIXED BY LAW

Section of Code Fixing Per Capita of 1910 as Basis Called to Attention.

The attention of the county commissioners to the law regarding the levy for school purposes has been directed by City School Clerk Thomas, County School Superintendent Armstrong and District Attorney Evans.
The law provides that a tax shall be levied which will give a per capita amount for each boy and girl between 4 and 20 years equal to the amount per capita raised in 1910, which was \$8.70. District Attorney Evans interprets the law to mean that the tax must be levied.
