# HEALTH CERTIFICATES FOR BRIDES

**HAT** No girl should marry a man who cannot furnish a health certificate is now generally conceded.

But if a man needs good health to keep up his end in matrimony, think how the woman needs it! Any man is justified in refusing to marry a woman who either cannot or will not keep herself fit to be a wholesome wife and mother.

I have in mind a family of four daughters. Both the parents were healthy, and both recently died at a hale old age, after all four daughters had died of tuberculosis.

The girls were robust until they began to grow up and feel that they were young ladies. They stayed out all hours of the night, dancing. Time spent in sleeping was wasted, they thought. Having a good time was the only important thing in life.

They wore silk stockings and thin shoes all through the winter, because they were pretty and ladylike, and rubbers were such a bother. They changed their warm daytime clothes for thin evening dresses and underwear. When dancing made them warm, they sat in draughty windows and doorways to cool off.

They ate what they liked, when they liked, and, as everybody knows, girls are apt to like what isn't always the most nourishing food. But after a day or two in the house, they must be out again in thin shoes and stockings, throats exposed to the chill air.

Of course, mother scolded now and then. But, like so many mothers overfond of their children, she could not deny them their "good times," and she couldn't enforce the practice of common sense. Besides, she was rather proud of her pretty daughters' popularity.

The health of each girl was undermined when she married. Tuberculosis developed rapidly after marriage. The one who lived longest after marriage left three puny children and a husband who had contracted her disease.

Not one of these girls was prepared to enjoy real happiness, nor to make a husband happy.

Sickness must come to a good many of us some time, but most of the illness ought never to be; and a girl who is not taught and firmly held to the doctrine of good health is going to miss her share of the real joys, and fall in her highest duties.
