

POULTRY SHOW OPENS WITH MORE THAN 1000 FINE BIRDS ON DISPLAY

Exhibit Said to Be Best in
History of Association; The
Judging Begins.

The fifth annual exhibition of the Oregon Poultry and Pet Stock association opened this morning at the new building, Fifth and Alder streets, under the most favorable conditions of any show yet held by this association, with prospects that the net result will be the best show ever held. The location is in the center of the business district, and the building is roomy, airy and light. Practically all the birds are new. More than 1000 birds are on display, in addition to which are many rabbits and pet stock.

Judging started as soon as the doors opened this morning, although the work of cooping the birds was not finished late this afternoon, on account of delayed arrivals. An especial feature is the window displays, which are attracting no little attention.

Huge Raven "Greeter."
The "greeter" is a huge black raven owned by Leonard H. Crowdsou of 1062 East Ninth street, which has an especial gift of being able to talk, sing, whistle, crow and cry. This bird's tongue has never been split, which makes this gift a notable one.

Another feature is a small display of beautiful little song birds, all caged together, whose whistlings and chirps can easily be heard above the roar of the roosters crowing and hens cackling. A flock of Golden Pheasants is attracting many visitors by proudly strutting about in the sand cases provided for them, chirping, fussing and quarrelling over the only scant scattering of feed that has been provided for them.

In a separate room are the pigeons of all kinds and descriptions, in the same manner. In another room are the ducks and geese and some monster and handsome specimens of both are to be found there.

Fine Turkeys on Hand.

There are two magnificent turkeys, one a gobbler and the other a hen, in this room, that escaped the ax last Thursday, which seek to drown out the apparently distasteful quacking of other ducks and the honking of their neighbors, the geese.

The work of installing the exhibits of poultry food, patent nests, incubators, brooders and feeders, and other allied necessary articles for the success of the poultry raisers is in progress today, and will be completed tonight. A special guard has been set to watch the coops where the birds are placed, to prevent the robbing of eggs and that are making their appearance occasionally, and W. L. Fulmer, secretary of the association, declares he intends to put them in the vaults that have been erected in the building.

The judges are making their awards as fast as possible and whenever a class has been completed the names of the winners are being rushed by Fulmer to the printer who is preparing a catalogue bearing these names.

The work of judging will be completed tomorrow afternoon and Wednesday morning, the complete catalogue will be ready for the guests and ribbons will be placed on the coops.

Indoe this morning. If it is possible to have them ready sooner it will be done. The work will be done, of course, under the direction of Colonel McKinstry in charge of improvements on the lower Columbia. Major McIndoe leaves Portland Wednesday evening by way of San Francisco for Manila. He has been ordered to take charge of government work in the Philippines. He will leave his family in Portland. Until Colonel McKinstry comes, about January 1, Major Jay J. Morrow will have direction of both his own and Major McIndoe's work.

Major McIndoe has won the appreciation of the Ports of Columbia committee and many others interested in the development of Portland commerce. He not only recommended the installation of two new pumps on the Chinook, but also an additional dredge for work at the mouth of the Columbia river.

In line with this recommendation Senator Harry Lane of Oregon has introduced a bill for \$1,500,000 with which to build the vessel.

Major McIndoe has also recommended an increase in the appropriation for the north jetty and that it be \$2,000,000 instead of \$1,500,000 as originally recommended. He has also asked that the work be put on a continuing contract basis so that there may be no delay in completing the jetty which will cost an estimated total of \$7,000,000.

Major McIndoe plans for a 20-foot channel in the Columbia river from the mouth of the Willamette to the sea will be gotten into action soon after the first of the year.

race track, perhaps the only privately owned race track in the world in these days.

Title to the farm has been transferred by Mr. Alley to the United States Mortgage & Investment company of Portland, organized a few weeks ago by George Dr. C. E. Cunningham, Knute Ekman and C. P. Olson. Included in the sale are the personal property on the farm, but Mr. Olson, secretary and attorney of the company, who returned from Roseburg today, says that the company will make improvements and alterations that will transform the property into a dairy farm instead. It will be handled by a manager and held as an investment.

"I don't know what demand there is for fast horses," said Mr. Olson this morning, "but the automobile seems to have become very popular, and the farm is exceptionally well suited for dairy work. The fine land is watered by a creek, tributary to the Umpqua river, and about 150 acres are cleared and in cultivation. Quite a large portion of the remaining land has been cleared, but is under a contract for the present. Included in that is the half mile race track."

The consideration involved in the deal has not been made public. Estimates, however, on the farm with buildings, range from \$40,000 to \$50,000.

POLICE SCANDAL WILL BE INVESTIGATED BY MINISTERS OF CITY

Action Taken Despite Advice
of Dr. Young "Not to Go
Around Hunting Trouble."

The usual monthly meeting at the Y. M. C. A. of the Portland Municipal association was characterized by a number of near-brilliant, none of which was allowed to reach fever heat for the reason that the presiding officer, Dr. L. R. Dyott, was on the job every moment of the two hour session, allowing no situation to get beyond his control or assume proportions not in keeping with the dignity and decorum of a body of ministers.

Threatening to break out all through the meeting was the question of a statewide prohibition campaign in 1914, but Chairman Dyott ruled with a firm hand and refused to recognize speakers who seemed bent on going too far with the subject. Rev. Edith Hill Booker, state president of the W. C. T. U., presented an address signed by several prohibition organizations calling a general conference in Portland, December 19, to discuss the forthcoming anti-saloon campaign to authorize its officers to sign it, but after the matter had been investigated by a special committee, named for the purpose, the association refused to commit itself to that extent.

Rev. Delmar H. Trimble offered a resolution that a committee be appointed to investigate the police scandal and report on suitable action to be taken by the association. Dr. Benjamin Young vigorously opposed the resolution, declaring that Mayor Albee had the matter well in hand and that the confidence of this community in the mayor was such that the people generally would resent the interference of outsiders. Dr. Trimble insisted on the adoption of his resolution, intimating that a frame-up existed, having for its purpose the discrediting of worthy officials in the police department. On a rising vote the resolution was adopted and Messrs. Trimble and Fry named as the investigating committee. As a parting shot Dr. Young advised the association not to go round over town hunting up trouble and particularly not to get mixed up in the police scandal.

In the course of a symposium on the "Necessity for Solidarity in the Ranks of Protestantism," conducted by Rev. M. J. Young, of Roseburg City Park, Dr. Young roundly condemned the practice of raising money for humanitarian purposes by the exhibition of the "tango" dance.

"I am neither dogmatic nor bigoted," said he, "but I am becoming restive over whether we, as an organization, are drifting."

Dr. Benjamin Young attacked the new school law which makes it possible for private and parochial schools to get free text books. He declared the statute to be the most subtle and adroitly drawn law in the statutes of this state.

"This law strikes at the very foundation of Protestantism," said he. "We must be on guard; we must keep the state in one place and the church in another."

Rev. C. C. Poling and Rev. A. J. Montgomery also took part in the symposium discussion. Chairman Dyott called attention to the general conference on the state-wide prohibition campaign which is to be held this afternoon in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium.

**NICARAGUA WITHDRAWS
REQUEST FOR ZELAYA**

Washington, Dec. 1.—Through its legal representatives here, the Nicaraguan government today withdrew its request for the extradition of ex-President Jose Santos Zelaya, who was detained in New York.

The Nicaraguan lawyers told Solicitor Joseph W. Acker of Eugene, Oregon, that they would be satisfied if the United States deported the ex-president to his home in Barcelona, Spain. From the fact that the extradition application was withdrawn, it was surmised that some such promise was given.

The final guess today was that the Nicaraguan government suspected he was in New York, where he was arrested, to cook up a plot for another descent on the little republic, and wanted either to get him into its own hands or scare him out of the hemisphere.

BRITISH ADMIRAL IN MEXICO CITY TO SEE SIR LIONEL GARDEN

Mohena Returns From Vera
Cruz Without Having Seen
John Lind Again.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Mexico City, Dec. 1.—The rebels were reported at San Luis Potosi today, the key to the capital's railroad connections. They had burned the new station at Ajuno. General Villa, it was predicted, would speedily capture Chihuahua City. Tampico and Mazatlan were said to be tottering. Moreover, Huerta was complaining publicly of the disloyalty of his ostensible supporters.

Foreign Minister Mohena was announced to be returning from Vera Cruz without meeting John Lind, President Wilson's personal representative. Mohena denied, to be sure, that he went to Vera Cruz to meet Lind, but it was the general opinion that his trip really was taken in the hope of reopening negotiations with him.

U. S. Will Protect Japanese.

Charge d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy of the United States embassy announced that he would afford protection to Japanese residents here.

The war office issued a statement that two government gunboats were off Mazatlan ready to assist the federal garrison in the event of a rebel attack. With foreigners leaving the Mexican capital on every train, there was one notable arrival here today—that of Admiral Sir Christopher Cradock, commanding England's naval force in Mexican waters.

"I have made no arrangement to meet President Huerta," he told a United Press representative, as he stepped from his train. "If I do meet him the press will be informed. It will be an entirely informal meeting in any event. I did not come to see the Mexican chief executive, but to confer with the English minister, Sir Lionel Garden."

**PORTLAND BOY MAY
GET BIG SCHOLARSHIP**

Eugene, Or., Dec. 1.—Raphael Geisler of Portland, Luther Acker of Eugene and Paul Homan of Salem, were this morning selected by the examining board for Oxford university, England, as will receive the Rhoades scholarship at Oxford, granted to an Oregon man. Geisler and Acker are students at the University of Oregon. Homan is registered at Willamette university, Salem. The scholarship carries \$1500 annually.

DEADLY FUMES DRIVE SLAYER LOPEZ BACK INTO MINE RECESSES

Escape of Wholesale Murderer
in Utah Shaft Made Impos-
sible by Poisonous Smoke.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Salt Lake City, Utah, Dec. 1.—In a deliberate attempt to asphyxiate Ralph Lopez, the Mexican sought as a sextuple murderer, who took refuge in the Utah-Apex mine near Bingham last week and stood off several hundred pursuers with his rifle, fires were started today at the entrance to the mine's 700 foot level.

The 15 other exits from the mine had previously been battened up from outside, the fire was fed with cayenne pepper, sulphur and damp gunpowder, and back of it a squad of riflemen was stationed to shoot down Lopez if he should attempt to rush past and escape.

The fugitive apparently was trying to build a bulkhead to keep the fumes out.

Evidently giving up this task as hopeless after a time, Lopez retreated, as his besiegers could tell from sounds carried by an air pipe into the mine, tunnel by tunnel, to the 300 foot level.

The officers marveled at the man's endurance, but declared his escape impossible. The mine, they said, was steadily filling with the suffocating smoke, and it was only a question of time before he must succumb or break through one of the bulkheads to be shot to death.

Shariff Smith, in charge of the besiegers, would allow no more of his men to enter the mine.

BRYAN WOULD GIVE SWEET SOME CHANCE

Will Hear His Answer to Pro-
tests if He Cares to Go to
Washington.

Washington, Dec. 1.—Representative Sinnott has introduced a bill authorizing and directing the secretary of war to appoint two members of the project board of consulting engineers to assist and cooperate with a committee appointed by Bryan to investigate and examine the Dulles power project.

The senate failed to confirm the nomination of Alex Sweek of Portland among others. Secretary of State Bryan has offered to hear Sweek's answer to the protests against him if he wishes to come on to Washington and present his case.

The estimate of the secretary of the treasury for the surveyor general of Oregon includes \$2500 for increased office force, the total salaries amounting to \$15,900.

**COUNTY AIDS WIFE OF
MAN UPON ROCKPILE**

The county commissioners this morning ordered a warrant for \$21 drawn in favor of Mrs. Will Kelly, whose husband was sent to the rockpile for failure to support her. The law allows the wife of a man convicted of nonsupport \$1 a day during his incarceration and 25 cents for each child under 16 years old to a maximum of \$1.75 a day. Mrs. Kelly has no children, so drew but \$21. Her husband was sentenced on November 7. Mrs. B. P. McGinnis, with five children, is entitled to the full amount, but has not applied for the assistance as yet. Her husband was also sent to the rockpile.
