Directors of the Northern Pacific Terminal company, which owns the Portland union depot, yesterday formally ratified the appointment of M. F. Kincaid as master mechanic of the terminal, a position newly created. Mr.

Kincaid for two months has been foreman of the roundhouse at the terminal yards and his duties, under the new appointment, have been broadened to cover all the mechanical departments under the jurisdiction of the terminal company.

Mr. Kincaid was trainmaster of the North Bank road during its period of construction and later held a state office in Washington. He is regarded as a strong addition to the operating force

n the terminal yards. Judge George T. Reid, assistant to the president of the Northern Pacific rallway, and E. C. Blanchard, general manager of the Northern Pacific, both of facoma, attended yesterday's meeting. The directors formally authorized the building of a double track through the park space south of the depot building

and the erection of train sheds for the use of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern. These tracks will connect with the Fourth street line and will pass through the site of the Wells-Fargo express office. This building will be removed and quarters for the company found in a building near by. The tracks and tarin shed probably will cost the P., E. & E. \$50,000.

Concrete work on the terminal company's own new train sheds was finished today and the crection of the steel work will begin in a few days. It was announced this morning that the new equipment would be ready for use by January 1.
