

ALLEGED ROBBERS ARE CAUGHT WITH \$5000 IN GOLD IN THEIR ROOM

Two Young Cowboys Suspected of Being Blythe Bank Bandits Surprised Asleep.

(United Press Pressed Wire.)
El Centro, Cal., Dec. 5.—Two cowboys, declared by officers to be the men who robbed the Verde Valley bank at Blythe of \$5000 and killed Cashier A. W. Bowles, were arrested here today.
They had in their possession between \$4500 and \$5000 in gold. The prisoners gave their names as Paul Case and Tom Green, and their residence as Los Angeles. They are about 24 years of age.
The two men were arrested in the Franklin hotel by City Marshal Blaney and Deputy Sheriff Cummins. They had arrived here shortly after midnight. The officers were watching for them following the receipt of a telegram from Sheriff Mel Greenleaf of Yuma county, Ariz., who trailed them from Holtville last night.
The men readily gave names, but refused to talk of the Blythe affair. They refused to make a statement, even when the bags of gold they were thought to have stolen were found in their room.
The Blythe bank robbers entered the bank as it was being closed Tuesday. The two horsemen entered the bank, covered Bowles with their guns and looted the vault. Bowles was shot through the neck by one of the robbers as he leaped on the back of the other as the pair were leaving the building.

WITNESS DISAPPOINTS IN TRIAL OF DR. CRAIG

Says Defendant Looks Like Man She Saw Peering in Window.

Shelbyville, Ky., Dec. 5.—Arnold Moore, another of the state's main witnesses in the trial of Dr. William Craig, accused of murdering Dr. Helen Knabe, proved a disappointment to the witness stand today.
Moore saw a man looking in at Dr. Knabe's window one night shortly before she was killed, and the prosecution expected him to identify Craig as the "peeper."
He did, in fact, give a description which easily might have fitted Craig. When Prosecutor Inman turned dramatically to the witness, however, and asked Moore: "Do you see that man?" the witness answered: "Yes, sir, I see him, but I won't swear he is the man I saw at the window, though he does look like him."
Alleged to be the other woman in the case, Miss Katherine Fleming, an Avon, Ind., waitress, was a witness yesterday at the trial of Dr. William B. Craig, charged with murdering Dr. Helen Knabe. The witness had known Craig, she said, for 17 years and he had been attentive to her for the last three of them.
Mrs. J. W. Smith, who occupied an apartment opposite Dr. Knabe's, and who testified to having seen a man peering through the window into the Knabe apartment some time before the killing, had been relied on by the prosecution to identify the "peeper" as Craig.
Instead, she said, on cross-examination, that the man was no more than medium sized. Craig is six feet tall.
The inference having been drawn that the witness intended to attack Dr. Knabe's character, Attorney Stuart Craig's lawyer, took pains to repudiate any such plan. "We shall not attack Dr. Knabe's character under any circumstances," he said. "The defendant believes no sweeter or purer woman ever lived."

MEADE POST BACKS COMRADE IN DEMAND

Oregon City, Or., Dec. 5.—Backing up the Grand Army posts of Portland and condemning Commissioner Brewster for dismissing Russell Chamberlain from city employment, Meade Post No. 2 adopted the following resolution at yesterday's meeting.
"Resolved, That the recent removal of Comrade Russell Chamberlain from a position in the city hall at Portland, by Commissioner Brewster, is an act of inhumanity that should record the unanimous condemnation, not only of all Grand Army posts, but all loyal citizens of the state of Oregon. It is a gross violation of not only the spirit and letter of the law, but also a violation of the solemn pledge made to comrades when they placed their names on the muster rolls of the army during the dark days of the rebellion."
"Resolved, further, that we heartily commend the action of the Grand Army posts of Portland in appealing the case to higher authority in order that justice may be done to a deserving comrade."

BOYS, WEARIED FROM LONG TRAMP, GIVEN LODGINGS AT JAIL

Three boys, footsore and weary, called at the police station last evening for lodging. They are George Schule, William Boyle and George Davis, from Cheyenne, Wyo. They started out to tramp to Portland to visit an uncle of the Davis boy. The lads are each 15 years old. This morning the jailer gave them a steaming hot breakfast and the hunt for the uncle, whose name is Thomas Gaffney, was taken up.

NORWEGIAN HURRICANE FATAL TO SMALL CRAFT

Christiania, Dec. 5.—Some loss of life was reported in a hurricane which swept the Norwegian coast yesterday and today. Several small boats were lost, probably with their entire crews. Considerable damage was done also on shore.

"OUTSIDE OF THAT" CHAMBERS IS O. K.

Blasted, Shipwrecked, Lost in Fog and Finally Is Rescued.

Bellingham, Wash., Dec. 5.—Ralph Chambers, of La Conner, Wash., lies in an Anacortes hospital today after being blown through a window by an explosion, shipwrecked, thrown into the water, lost in the fog and finally rescued by the steamer Rosalie. The trouble all started when the young man mistook a five gallon can of gasoline for coal oil and tried to build a fire with it. His head, arms and legs are severely burned.
Chambers was employed at the Pacific American Fisheries on Eliza Island. Wednesday he decided to build a fire in the bunk house and used what he thought was kerosene, but poured a few drops of gasoline in the stove instead. The explosion which followed wrecked the house and blew Chambers into the yard. A launch started with the injured man for Bellingham through the fog which hung over the bay. The injured man was wrapped in greased blankets and placed on a mattress on the deck of the launch. The boat was making good headway through the fog when it struck a rock. The force of the shock threw Chambers overboard. He was dragged aboard unconscious.
The boat was wedged tight on the rocks and her captain began sending "S. O. S." calls with his whistle. Men on the island heard the distress calls and made their way to the launch in a dory, being guided by the whistle.
The crew had about abandoned hope of bringing Chambers to land alive when the fog whistle of the steamer Rosalie was heard. The men rowed in the direction from whence the sound came. The steamer was approaching the boat and as she passed the cries of the men attracted the steamer's crew.
The steamer turned in her course and soon had the injured man and his companions aboard. Chambers was taken to Anacortes.

AVERAGE STATE TAX LEVY IS 4.36 MILLS

Amount to Be Raised Is Million and a Half More Than Ever.

Salem, Or., Dec. 5.—The amount of money to be raised for state purposes next year is \$4,165,000, as determined by the state tax commission. This is \$1,100,000 more than was ever raised for state purposes in any preceding year. The average state tax rate is 4.36 mills.
As the assessments of property in the several counties vary in their relation to actual cash value, the state tax rate will not be the same in any two counties. The rate will vary from 2.1 mills to 6.5 mills. In Multnomah county it will be 4.7 mills. This will raise \$1,582,521.
The total taxable valuation of the property in the state is \$954,282,374, which is over \$50,000,000 more than the valuation last year.
The amount raised for state purposes includes the one-fourth mill levy for the state highway commission, which produces \$238,570, and the one-fifth mill levy for the Monmouth normal, which produces \$38,171.

MORE CHOICE BULLS FOR GRANT COUNTY

John Day, Or., Dec. 5.—J. A. Coombs of this place has returned from the middle west with a shipment of 41 registered bulls for distribution throughout Grant county. The bulls range in age from calves to 2-year-olds, and are from the choicest stock of the middle west. Nineteen of the animals were sold the first day after their arrival. The shipment contained 31 Shorthorns, eight Polled Angus and two Herefords. The selling price of the animals ranges from \$100 to \$300 per head. This is the second shipment of registered bulls to come into the county this fall. The first shipment, which arrived about two weeks ago, consisted of 30 head of yearling Herefords.

MAYOR-ELECT IS OLD-TIME PRINTER

Newport, Or., Dec. 5.—John W. Kelly, who was elected mayor of this city on December 1, was educated in the schools of Oregon City, where he was born June 7, 1863. As a youngster he worked in the office of the Oregon City Enterprise. From there he went on the Oregonian in 1877, and served his apprenticeship, working there off and on for 20 years. He was foreman of the Catholic Sentinel in 1884. In 1893 he was foreman of the Salem Statesman and served there for three years. He was with the Portland Fish company from 1907 to 1911 as fish buyer on the Columbia river and coast boys. From Portland he moved to a farm 10 miles south of Albany. Selling the farm he moved to Newport October 10, 1912, and bought the Irvin house, which is now the Hotel Kelly at Nye Beach.

RAILROAD COMMISSION VISITS AT WHEELER

Wheeler, Or., Dec. 5.—A flutter of excitement was caused here today by the visit of the state railroad commission to hear the various opinions as to the location of a depot at this point. The expressions of a number of citizens were recorded for future consideration by the commission.
The citizens of the incorporated town of Wheeler and the Wheeler Lumber company do not agree upon the depot site, but there is little, if any, acrimony between them over the matter.
A delegation of Garibaldi citizens met the commission at this city to talk over the depot site question at that place. The commission left here in a special car for Tillamook, and while out this way will adjust the demands made by various points along the line.

THOMAS R. SHERIDAN IS UNDER INDICTMENT

Former Roseburg Banker and Prominent Citizen Faces Serious Charges.

Roseburg, Or., Dec. 5.—Thomas R. Sheridan, ex-president of the First National Bank of Roseburg, and one of western Oregon's best known men, was last night indicted by the Douglas county grand jury on two charges—one charge of obtaining money under false pretenses and the other one charging forgery.
Sheridan furnished \$5000 bonds on each charge. His trial is to be held in February.
Sheridan recently made voluntary assignment in favor of his creditors, his stated liabilities being \$153,000 and assets between \$50,000 and \$100,000. Both charges are the result of his transactions with the bank's funds. The forgery charge, it is said, is a result of his using bank funds for speculation, and then to account with the bank examiner by making a dummy note for the amount. A few years ago, it is said, people were proud to loan money to Sheridan but his recent assignment has left some of his creditors practically ruined.
Sheridan's friends say he is being persecuted, and that there is no reason for criminal action. He borrowed money for speculations, they say, and failed to realize on his investments as he expected.

DAIRYMEN HOLD GOOD MEET AT FOREST GROVE

Forest Grove, Or., Dec. 5.—About 400 dairymen met at the Forest Grove condenser yesterday.
The meeting was for the purpose of exchanging views, getting acquainted and for the general welfare of the dairy business in this county. At noon lunch was served.
In the morning J. D. Mickle, the state pure food and dairy commissioner, spoke upon the "Future of Dairying," and H. H. Stewart talked upon the business from a manufacturing standpoint.
In the afternoon P. G. Kinzer was among the speakers.
Dr. James Withycombe, head of the experimental station at Corvallis, gave an address on breeding up the dairy herd and W. A. Linklater of the Western Washington experiment station talked on the feeding problem. J. W. Hughes was master of ceremonies.
