Grievance of Other Commissioners. In the brief presented to Governor West it stated that the principal grievance of the resigned commissioners against Mr. Kinney is due to a few of his personal idiosyncrasics. The brief admits that at times Mr. Kinney's zeal may have gotten on the nerves of his fellow commissioners but at the same time asserts that his charges and com

plaints should have received the con-

sideration of the members of the commission and been investigated. Mr. Kinney denies any grounds for charges against him in the Rogue River fish tax affair and reiterates the charge that the Bonneville hatchery has been mismanaged, one of the original bones of contention between Mr. Kinney and his fellow commissioners. It has been asserted by Kinney that the small fish at the Bonneville hatchery have been starved. This assertion is based on the comparative rate of gain in weight between the fish at the Clatskanie and

Bonneville hatcheries. The Bonneville fish for some reason, not yet determined, gained only about a quarter as much as the Clatskanie fish during a similar period of time. Mr. Kinney contended that the fish were not fed properly and that the ponds at Bon-peville were overcrowded. Much of the trouble in the fish commission has been due to Kinney's repeated insistence in bringing that matter up before the commission after it had been disposed of as business. It is in this contingency that Mr. Kinney's indignation and zeal are said to have gotten the better of his temper, and as the brief expresses it, "gotten on the nerves" of his fellow

commissioners. Through his attorneys Kinney asks that the commissioners retract their resignations, take some consideration for his personality and let him state his case and repeat the charges he has already made, and that then, after an examination, if he is found in the wrong he will voluntarily resign.


