

CARABAO'S OFFICERS ARE REPRIMANDED BY WILSON IN MEMORIAL

President Says the Nation's
Servants Should Have
Higher Sense of Loyalty.

Washington, Dec. 22.—President Wilson issued today a memorial reprimanding those responsible for the program and skits at the recent annual dinner of the Carabao society, an organization of army and navy officers who have served in the Philippines, in which he considered that his insular policy was satirized and members of his cabinet were ridiculed.

"The officers responsible for the program of the evening," the president wrote, in part, addressing Secretaries Garrison and Daniels, of the war and navy departments, "certainly are deserving of very serious reprimand, which I hereby request be administered and I cannot rid myself of a feeling of great disappointment that the general body of officers assembled at the dinner should have greeted the carrying out of such a program with apparent indifference to the fact that it violated some of the most dignified and sacred traditions of the service."

"What are we to think of officers of the army and navy who regard it as 'fun' to bring their official superior into ridicule and policies of the government they are sworn to serve with unquestioning loyalty into contempt? If this is their idea of fun, what is their idea of duty? If they do not hold loyalty above all silly effervescence of childish wit, what about their profession do they hold sacred?"

"My purpose in administering this reprimand is to recall the men responsible for this lowering of the standard to their ideals, to remind them of the high conscience with which they ought to put duty above personal indulgence and to think of themselves as responsible men and as trusted soldiers, even while amusing themselves as diners-out."

It was announced that the members of the banquet committee, including Admiral Howard, Major General Biddle, Brigadier General McIntyre and Colonel Heistand, will be reprimanded publicly.

of the conference bill, and were extremely bitter.

"For the first time in 18 years," said Senator Nelson of Minnesota, "the minority members of a conference committee have been barred on other than party questions. I hope to live until the Republican party is again restored to power so it may give the Democrats some of their medicine."

Senator Bristow of Kansas was highly incensed.

"Certainly I did not sign the conference report," he declared. "Do you suppose I would sign something I know nothing about. If I thought I could beat the bill in the senate I would certainly try, but I do not want to delay other matters. The inclusion of the bank deposits guarantee feature into the bill and its withdrawal in conference were just plain buncombe. It was originally put in the measure to bluff the people."

Prospects for action on the currency bill this afternoon grew darker.

Republican members of the senate were expected to block immediate action by objecting to the suspension of the rules, which require that conference reports must lie over a day before they are called up.

The formal report of the conference was expected to reach both houses of congress late today.

Democratic house leaders obtained the consent of the minority members to begin immediate consideration of the report. Majority Leader Underwood promising to allow at least two hours for debate.

ORDERS WORK STARTED ON UMATILLA PROJECT

TALKATIVE COLONEL ANNOYS WILLIAMS

Senator Regrets Roosevelt's
Row in Chile Over the
Monroe Doctrine.

Washington, Dec. 22.—"If," groaned Senator John Sharp Williams of Mississippi today, "Theodore Roosevelt only understood the Monroe doctrine, or if he would stop trying to twist it into a policy for making the United States the globe trotting, overbearing protector and regulator of other American countries, all this trouble in Chile might have been avoided."

Williams was commenting on stories of the clash at Santiago between the ex-president and Dr. Marcel Martinez, former Chilean minister to Washington. The incident occurred during the reception tendered Colonel Roosevelt at the University of Santiago, Dr. Martinez, who, as well as Colonel Roosevelt, was scheduled to speak, referred to the Monroe doctrine as obsolete, saying the conditions which caused President Monroe to promulgate it in 1823 had practically disappeared.

To this the colonel somewhat hotly replied that the doctrine was still a vital American principle, suggesting incidentally that it was not a very appropriate time for Dr. Martinez to start such a controversy. His own speech, he added, had been submitted to the Chilean foreign office, which found it all right. Dr. Martinez' reply to this thrust was that so had his been submitted to the foreign office and found all right, too.

A disagreeable sequel to the dispute was that a number of Central American students made a demonstration against the ex-president as he left the university.

The Chilean foreign office did its best to smooth the affair over, but it left a disagreeable impression nevertheless.

"However," continued Senator Williams, "of course this government isn't helping Roosevelt. He is a private citizen. He's not our accredited representative and whatever he says he says merely as a private citizen."

RESCUER OVERCOME AT FIRE EARLY TODAY

Firemen fighting a blaze in a three story frame building on Twenty-third street, between Lovejoy and Marshall streets, were just getting the fire well under control about 2 o'clock this morning when an owl car speeding along Twenty-third street ran over the lines of hose stretched across the tracks at Lovejoy street. Handicapped by the loss of water as an extinguisher, the fire fighters were forced to take recourse to chemicals alone. After a valiant struggle the blaze, which extended through the corner of two stories up to a hotel, the rooms of which were filled with sleeping lodgers, was put out.

The fire originated in the kitchen of a small bakery and restaurant owned by Mrs. Bertha Fisher at 227 Twenty-third street.

The blaze making headway crept into the rear of the drug store of L. L. Crocker at 229 Twenty-third street, and up the walls to the rooms of the Hotel Lavina, occupying the second and third stories of the structure.

The fire was first discovered by Scotty Gordon, a roomer at the Hotel Lavina, who telephoned the fire department and with the assistance of Mrs. J. W. Beade aroused the inmates of the 27 rooms of the hotel. Dr. Max Bloom, another lodger, was overcome by smoke in an effort to alarm the occupants of a room on the third floor.

Mrs. Fisher, proprietress of the bakery, together with her small son and Mr. A. Sheldon, slept in a room back of the kitchen of the bakery. They were first aroused by smoke but not until after the alarm had been given.

The bakery sustained the greatest amount of damage of the three places touched by the flames, and was partially insured. Mrs. Fisher, the proprietress, is on the verge of a collapse due to the shock and fact that the bakery was her sole means of making a livelihood for herself and little boy.

The stock and walls of the Crocker drug store were damaged to the extent of about \$300. It is fully covered by insurance. The hats and four rooms of the Hotel Lavina, the entrance to which is at 231½ Twenty-third street, suffered principally from water.

SETTLERS TO CONTEST CLAIMS OF RAILROAD; APPLICATIONS FILED

70 Are Seeking Homesteads
on Which the Railroad Laid
Scrip.

Determined to contest the claim of the Northern Pacific Railroad company to approximately 16,000 acres of land east of Albany in Linn county, township 12 south, range 4 east, on which the company laid scrip in 1899, 70 settlers today filed application at the United States land office for homestead entries on the same lands.

When the office in the Worcester building were opened at 9 o'clock about 50 settlers, including several women, were on hand.

There was no fight for position in line. Most of them have lived on the lands for periods ranging up to three years.

Owing to the fact that the land was never surveyed by the government until recently, they were compelled to wait until today before filing their homestead applications, when the approved plat of the land became an official part of the land office records.

It will be contended by the settlers that the railroad could not make a non-occupancy affidavit for certain lands when unsurveyed, because it cannot be properly described.

The railroad has another step to take, before it can legally claim the lands on its scrip. This is called reconsidering the lines to harmonize with the government survey. At this point the real contest starts, because in taking this step the "non-occupancy" affidavit must be sworn to, and with settlers on the land, the oath cannot be made truly.

For this reason, the settlers contend, the railroad cannot legally claim the land on its scrip selections. Under the law, settlers have a right to go upon unsurveyed government land and take credit for the time they reside thereon in homesteading it later.

SUICIDE WILLS BODY TO MEDICAL STUDENTS

Baker, Or., Dec. 22.—W. B. Benson, aged 60, committed suicide by taking cyanide of potassium in a restaurant last night. He took the drug in a capsule, after ordering a dinner. The waiter thought him choking and summoned a doctor. Benson died before help arrived. He left a letter saying that he was tired of living, and that he was no good to himself or anyone else.

Benson had been at Baker about a year. He was engaged in mining at Cornucopia for a time. No relatives known except one brother in east, not yet located.

In his letter Benson willed his body to the medical profession.

**HANDWRITING EXPERT
TESTIFIES AT TRIAL**

W. W. Williams, a handwriting expert, testified in the prosecution of E. E. C. Von Klein for polygamy this morning that the signature of George Bertrand Lewis to a marriage affidavit signed in San Francisco two years ago, the signature of E. E. C. Von Klein on the Portland hotel register in October, 1911, and the writing on an envelope taken from Louis Von Klein after the latter had visited his brother in the county jail are in the same handwriting.

"Von Klein is alleged to have taken the name of Lewis as an alias. The marriage affidavit was introduced in evidence after Milton W. Davis, a deputy county clerk from San Francisco, had identified it as a record of that county. The record showed that George Bertrand Lewis had secured the license to wed Ethel May Newcomb on October 5, 1911, giving San Francisco addresses for each. Miss Newcomb had also signed the affidavit.

Sheriff Word and Night Jailor Thornton were placed on the stand to identify the five letters which were taken from Lewis Von Klein after a visit to Lewis Von Klein had paid to his brother. At noon the state rested its case, and the defense will be started this afternoon.

The case is on trial before Circuit Judge Kavanaugh.

DISCHARGED CAPTAIN MUST APPEAL TODAY

Former Acting Chief Slover
Undecided As to What
Action He Will Take.

E. A. Slover, discharged captain of police, who was acting chief under the Rushlight administration, has not filed his application for an appeal with the Municipal Civil Service Board and if the application is not filed before 5 o'clock this afternoon he will be out of the police department for good with no chance of ever being reinstated to his position.

The charter provides that any employee removed from the service may file an appeal with the Civil Service board and demand a hearing of the charges against him. Captain Slover was discharged on the order of Mayor Albee about two weeks ago, being charged with conduct unbecoming an officer and for the good of the service.

Eleven others who have filed petitions for appeal with the board, Sergeant Rupert filed his application late Saturday as did Patrolman Hutchings.

When asked this morning if he was going to appeal from the decision of the mayor Captain Slover stated that he had decided not to petition the board for a hearing.

"A great number of my friends," said Slover, "have urged me to fight the charges, but as yet I have not made up my mind what action to take. I have no money to fight the case. However, I believe I will seek the advice of an attorney and if he tells me to file a petition for appeal I will do so."

It is stated that the time for hearing

the cases will be set by the Civil Service board at its next meeting Wednesday morning to be held in the city hall.

ATTACK IS MADE ON EIGHT-HOUR LAW

Attacks on the eight hour labor law were made this morning when attorneys for the Columbia Contract company, and Manager C. A. Puarlea, filed demurrers to indictments against the company and manager charging violations of the law and failure to pay double wages for overtime. Constitutional grounds are taken as the basis of the demurrers. A hearing will be given on the demurrers by Circuit Judge Cleaton next Friday afternoon.

Arthur D. Kern is also under indictment on the same charges. Both the company and Kern are alleged to have worked auto truck drivers over 16 hours a day while hauling for street contractors for which they did not pay double wages for the overtime.
