

WOMAN IS DEPORTED FROM STRIKE ZONE BY THE COLORADO MILITIA

"Mother" Mary Jones, Sent
Out of District, Declares
She Will Return.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Denver, Jan. 5.—Deported by the
state militia from the Colorado coal
mine strike zone, "Mother" Mary Jones
declared here today:

"I am going back to Trinidad as soon
as I can get ready. I am going back
to assert my constitutional rights.
General Chase may put me in jail, but
I do not intend to be robbed of my
rights meekly."

"When, after a visit there, I was
leaving darkest Mexico, President Ma-
drazo, since martyred, asked me to re-
turn. But in Colorado, because I dare
to stand up for the downtrodden, I am
deported. It seems to me that the na-
tional government ought to put an end
to such outrages."

Troops Sent to Meet Her.

"Mother" Jones arrived in Trinidad
from El Paso yesterday. Adjutant
General John Chase, commanding the
militia in the strike district, sent a
detail of state troops to meet her at
the railroad station.

As she stepped from her train Cap-
tain Smith, in charge of the detail,
stopped her, accompanied her to the
ticket window, where she purchased
transportation to Denver, took her
back and put her on board the train
and escorted her as far as Walsen-
burg, beyond which point military rule
does not extend.

"Mother" Jones made no protest at
the time, and, indeed, said somewhat
hesitatingly that she was going to
Denver, when Smith asked her destina-
tion. She had no transportation, how-
ever, and said plainly on her arrival
here that she had intended to remain
in Trinidad.

Sentiment Is Aroused.

Should she return, General Chase
said he would have her arrested and
denied communication with any out-
siders. No one but the soldiers was
permitted to approach her while she
was in the strike district.

Not the miners alone, but union men
generally, were much incensed at her
deportation and predicted it would
make instead of prevent trouble.
A militia company, under Captain R.
W. Dorn, left Trinidad today for the
Oak Creek and Steamboat Springs
country, whence a number of strikers
were deported last week by a citizens'
committee, and violence was threat-
ened.

trough of the waves, while about it
circled the Calvo, the Hamburg-Ameri-
can liner Bavaria, Captain C. Graaf; the
Royal Mail liner Caribbean, the
White Star freighter Georgia and the
revenue cutters Seneca, Onondaga and
Gresham.

Lifelines Are Smashed.

The seven ships all made repeated
attempts to launch lifelines, but in the
violent gale they were smashed against
the big ships' sides as soon as the
cables started to lower them. Several
sailors were badly injured in this way
and it was only by the barest margin
that many of them escaped drowning.
The Calvo alone lost two boats in this
way and had three men hurt.

The Oklahoma lost no boat left.
All had been swept away. The loss
made no difference in the result, how-
ever, the shipmasters who saw the
tragedy said, as it would have been
impossible to get them over the side
into the water and it was doubtful if
they would have lived in such a sea in
any case.

Finally, signalling to one another,
the seven captains swung the ships
around, end to end, in an effort to
form a breakwater about the rolling
tanker, hoping thus to protect it to
some extent from the buffeting of the
waves.

Part of Ship Sinks.

All night long, under just enough
speed to give them steerage way,
they circled slowly, in momentary
danger of collision but determined not
to give up the fight.

At dawn the sea grew quieter. Then
it was seen that but part of the Ok-
lahoma, which had previously been
seen only as a smudge in the dark-
ness, its lights having long been out,
remained afloat. A small group of
men still remained on the remaining
fragment of deck, however, and fresh
efforts were made to reach them with
boats.

At 8 a. m. today one of the bobbing
little cockleshells from the Bavaria
accomplished the task. The stern had
gone down with 32 men but the eight
who remained alive, forward, were
taken off.

Strangely enough, the floating frag-
ment of the ship, to which they had
clung, not only survived the night
but at latest accounts was still afloat,
a menace to navigation. From the
tanker Winifred a message was re-
ceived this afternoon reporting that
it was seeking the derelict. If found,
it was believed it would be dynamited.

Details of the wreck were received
by wireless from the ships which
participated in the attempts at rescue.
The eight men saved were on board
the Bavaria, which it was believed
would put in here to land them, on
its way from Philadelphia to Boston.

Vessel Reported Ashore.

Washington, Jan. 5.—A wireless
message was reported today ashore
off Nantucket shoals light. A revenue
cutter was ordered to its rescue.
Another unidentified vessel was in
distress off the Jersey coast 40 miles
from Cape May. The cutter Onondaga
went to its aid. The steamship Din-
more, off Cape Lookout, sent out a
wireless call for help and the cutter
Seminole responded.

Cutter Goes Aground.
Washington, Jan. 5.—A wireless
message received today from the re-
venue cutter Andrea Doria reported the
cutter aground at Cove Point, Chesape-
ake bay. The cutter Apache went to
its assistance.

Aviator's Body Recovered.
Edgemoor, 1, 1, Jan. 5.—A body be-
lieved to be that of A. J. Jewell, who
disappeared Oct. 13 while trying to fly
from Mineola to Staten Island, was
washed up on the sea beach.

Five Killed on Streetcar.
Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 5.—A Nash-
ville, Chattanooga and St. Louis
freight train hit a streetcar, killing
five and injuring two of its passen-
gers.
