**Woman Wins Single Handed.**—One determined woman with one little length of gas-pipe effectually checked Sunday morning operations of the Northwestern Electric company at 507 North Twenty-fourth street. Today one company workman is nursing a set of bruised knuckles, and Mrs. Ida Ingles is triumphant. The company has been trying for some time to find a place to put a pole in that locality, but has been refused permission by several lot-owners. Mrs. Ingles heard of the effort to place it at the foot of the lot she occupies and notified her landlord, August Eschle, who sent her a note to be delivered to the foreman. The foreman got the note. Sunday but refused to discontinue work until Mrs. Ingles rapped one of his men. Patrolman Rudolph advised the foreman to stop work until some agreement was reached.

**Damage Suits Are Filed.**—Because as a passenger he was injured in a wreck at Lakeview, Wash., May 12, 1913, suit was yesterday filed with the federal court by counsel for Adolph Swanson, a machinist, against the O. W. R. & N. and the Northern Pacific, asking damages of \$50,000. A broken back, with crushed chest and lungs are injuries the complaint alleges Swanson received. An insecurely spiked track, badly washed away by storms is alleged to have been the cause for the derailment of the train. Suit was also filed at the same time by J. J. Manos, a Greek, against the Southern Pacific. Manos, a common laborer, the complaint states, was injured June 7, when his left arm was crushed under rails that were being loaded on a flat car. Damages of \$40,000 are asked.

**East Burnside Luncheon.**—Its first luncheon of the year will be given by the East Burnside District Improvement club at 12:30 tomorrow at the Grand Union Grill. The referendum against the East seventeenth street franchise of the Portland and Oregon City Railway will be discussed, as well as securing the proposed new Trade school on an east side site. Progress will be reported on the movement for the extension of East Burnside street to a connection with the Base Line Road at Mount Tabor, in which the Center Addition Improvement club is cooperating.

**Aged Woman Painfully Hurt.**—While alighting from a street car yesterday at Albina and Killingsworth avenue, Mrs. H. E. Forester, 1169 Kirby street, fell and was painfully bruised. Patrolman J. J. Murphy and Dr. Randall assisted the woman to her home. She is 75 years old.

**Wood to Have No Parole.**—Word was received this morning by the municipal department for safety of women from Governor West, in regard to the petition to the governor for a parole for Prof. DeRome Wood, who is serving

a term in state prison for a crime against a minor girl. The governor indicated in his letter that clemency would not be shown Prof. Wood, as his crime is of such nature that leniency is not in order. The man was a music teacher on the east side, and is serving from three to 15 years.

**Unassisted Wife Draws Pay.**—The county commissioners have authorized Elizabeth Close to draw \$9 under the law which makes possible payment of \$1 a day for the support of women whose husbands are serving time for non-support. John Close, the husband, was sentenced to six months on the rockpile when he pleaded guilty to the charge on December 24, 1913. Mrs. Close has no children so she will be entitled to but \$1 a day for the time he remains in custody.

**Harriman Club to Hold Ball.**—Plans for the Harriman club's second annual ball, to be held January 23 at the new Cottillon hall, fourteenth and Burnside streets, include some elaborate "stunts," according to E. B. Lee, chairman of the club's entertainment committee. The ball will be the first function to be held on the new floor. The club will hold a skating party next Thursday night at the Oaks rink.

**Abatement Proceedings Filed.**—To force the abatement of conditions in a house at 183 Clay street, leased by Rosa Babcock, Deputy District Attorney Maguire has filed suit to enforce the use of the property for such purposes. L. P. Love, owner, C. H. Piggott, lessee, and the Babcock woman, sub-lessee, are named as defendants. Frequent trouble with the place and a police record are the basis of the suit.

**Cruelty Grounds for Divorces.**—Testifying that her husband said he hated the ground she walked on and that he was a fool for marrying her, Pheme L. Heath yesterday secured a divorce from Frank M. Heath on grounds of cruelty. Circuit Judge Morrow granted the decree. Judge Morrow also granted a divorce to Alfred O. A. Hansen from Hattie P. Hansen on grounds of cruelty.
