

AUTO STRUCK BY FIVE-TON MOTOR TRUCK FIGURATIVELY WRAPPED AROUND TREE

When a five-ton truck belonging to the Portland Gas & Coke company hit the four passenger automobile of John Mathieson, a hotel man of 204 Columbia street shortly after noon yesterday, something had to give. In this instance it was Mathieson's car and it gave considerably when it came in contact with a sturdy tree close to the curb. The car was reduced to comparative wreckage on one side and was, figuratively, wrapped around the tree.

The accident occurred at the corner of Broadway and Clay streets with the auto going north on Broadway driven by O. F. Borsini. Mathieson, accompanied by his son, was going east on Clay. The truck driver applied his

brakes doing down grade but the ponderous vehicle skidded on the wet pavement, the rear end swinging into the lighter auto.

While Mathieson and his son received a severe shaking up neither was injured, due to the fact that the front part of the auto did not strike directly against the tree. The truck was but slightly damaged.

MORE DEVELOPMENTS IN 'RUNAWAY' CASE

Promised That Oregon City
Will Be Cleaned Along
Certain Lines.

Oregon City, Or., Jan. 7.—New developments in the case against Jack Davis and the three runaway Oregon City girls, Margaret Curtis, Ethel Forsythe and Viola Monahan, who were caught in Astoria, are promised by the authorities who are investigating the matter. With this case as a starter, County Attorney Gilbert L. Hedges said this morning that he intends to "clean up" certain conditions in Oregon City, and in his opinion there is plenty of it to "clean."

It is rumored that not only these four people but others in this city will be made to answer charges. Davis and the three girls were given a preliminary hearing in the justice court yesterday. The former was bound over to the grand jury on a statutory charge.

In default of \$500 bail he was put in the county jail at Oregon City. The Forsythe girl is out on \$200 bail and the other two girls were released on their own recognizance.

It has been stated that County Attorney Gilbert L. Hedges put up the \$200 bail for Ethel Forsythe. There was a mistake in the initials. County Attorney Hedges' brother, Joseph E. Hedges, was the attorney who put up the bail.

SHERIFF RAND ON HIS WAY TO COPPERFIELD

Liquor supply without the consent of the owners, but nothing more serious is apt to result from the governor's "invasion" of Baker county, while on the other hand, there is a new spirit of law enforcement and a desire to see the state law as to the sale of liquor, gambling and disorderly houses obeyed to the letter.

No Trouble Over Machines.
No better proof of that could have been had than the ease with which Colonel Lawson and Special Agent Snodgrass rounded up the saloonmen of Huntington yesterday and got them to give up their slot machines. These machines have not been in use for more than a year, but Lawson decided it would be better to have them out of the way altogether. He and Snodgrass visited the various saloons, told the proprietors what was wanted, and within half an hour 21 slot machines were on the sidewalk ready to be shipped to Baker to join Copperfield's contribution.

While the "cleanup" was in progress the militiamen were looting around the hotel, ignorant that the moral crusade was on in Huntington. That was as near as Huntington came to having martial law. The lesson of Copperfield had sunk in deep and while Colonel Lawson will probably visit Baker and several smaller cities of the county to round up any gambling devices and warn saloonkeepers not to violate the Sunday closing, selling liquor to minors and to habitual drunkards.

Huntington itself was never in any danger of martial law and is probably one of the most law abiding cities in Oregon.

Lawson and Collier have some hopes that the old city council of Copperfield, deposed by Colonel Lawson when he

and Miss Hobbs took possession of that place last Friday, will be induced to resign peaceably today and give way to a new lot of city officials to be chosen at a special election. If this is not done it is probable the city government will have to be left in the hands of the citizens' committee appointed by Lawson for the present, which would necessitate the maintenance of at least nominal martial law in the district until such time as the election could be held.

Witnesses to Lawlessness.
The state is not going to let the injunction go by the boards by any means. Lawson and Collier will bring back with them tonight, they expect, names of enough material witnesses to conditions as they were in Copperfield to show that the lawlessness existing there was sufficient cause for the declaration of martial law by the governor. Some of the women who feared to go on the street and who hardly dared go to sleep at night for fear their homes would be burned over them will be brought back and taken to the Baker hearing. Some of the boys who bought liquor from the Copperfield saloons and were feeling drunk at the dances in the hall adjoining Mayor Stewart's home will be brought to testify where they secured the liquor. As many of the decent citizens of Copperfield can leave their business will be asked to come to Baker for the hearing.

A desperate effort will be made by counsel for Stewart and Wiegand, also, it is said, to show that their clients were model saloonkeepers and never did anything to violate the law. Stewart and Wiegand place most of the blame for Copperfield's troubles on their rival saloonkeeper, Martin Knezevich, but the state will not use Knezevich as a witness, basing its case on the stories told by distressed people of Copperfield and vicinity.

COPPERFIELD NEEDED CLEANING UP, SAYS OFFICER WHO HELPED

Conditions at Copperfield were frightful, and fully warranted the action of Governor West in sending the militia to clean up the town, in the opinion of Adjutant Richard W. Holman of the Second Battalion, O. N. G., who is in Portland from Copperfield, where he was detailed to duty under Lieutenant Colonel Lawson.

"Copperfield has been cleaned up, all right," said Holman, "and we did not have very much trouble doing it, either. The majority of citizens there were either neutral or leaning toward our side."

"The deputy who served the injunction papers on us was a good fellow. He did his job up, and we kept right on loading up the car with the saloons' fixtures and wet goods. We also confiscated a lot of gambling paraphernalia, including slot machines and roulette wheels and tables used for shooting craps and playing '21'."

"At first the saloon people were openly antagonistic, but when they learned that we would not stand for any monkey business they quieted down. After Miss Hobbs read her communication (and right here let me say she is a 'brick'), Colonel Lawson declared martial law, and we searched every man in the saloon hall for guns. We got a varied assortment and added to the pile when we went after outside weapons. When we left Copperfield yesterday Captain Metcalf and seven militiamen stayed behind. The rest went to Huntington, and I came on to Portland, as I was instructed."

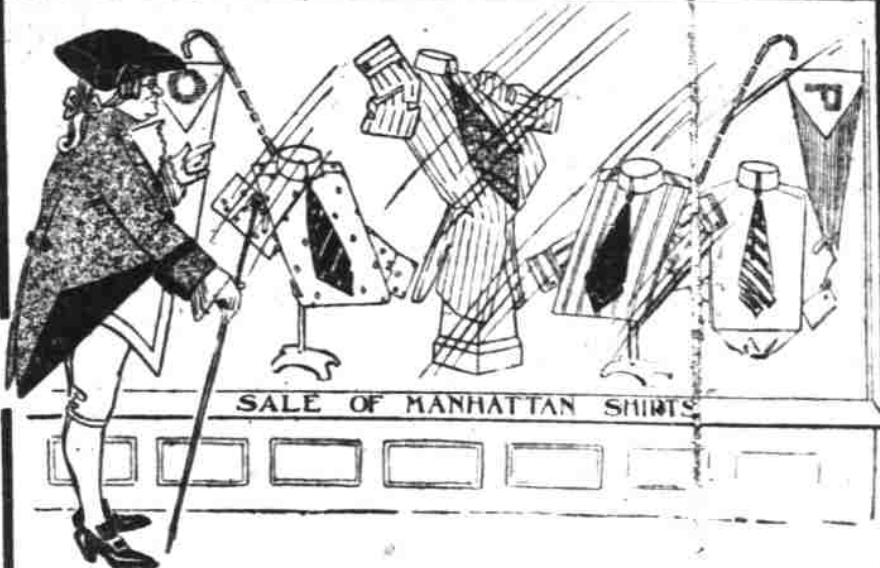

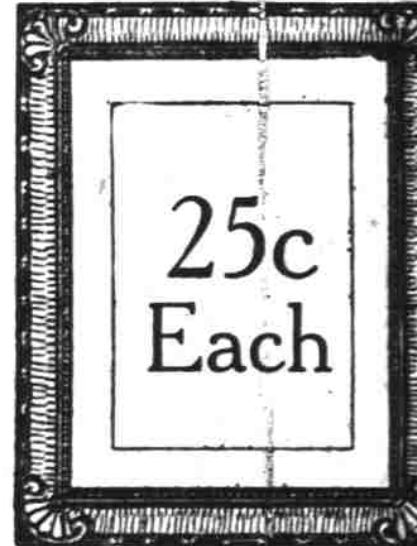
