

POLICE FAIL TO IDENTIFY BURGLAR

Body of Man Killed in Attempt to Rob Home Still in Morgue.



Unidentified dead burglar.

The burglar shot by A. A. Hatcher, 4534 Forty-fifth avenue, early yesterday morning, has not been identified. Whether or not Hatcher shot the burglar through the temple or whether the burglar was killed by his partner after they left the house is a question upon which the detectives and other investigators are not agreed. The wound is slightly below the eyes, the bullet passing from left to right entirely through the front part of the head. It is evident that the dead burglar was assisted and dragged from the Hatcher home by his partner, who got him as far as Holgate street. Some are of the opinion that the partner, after getting that far, saw the man was dead and abandoned the body. Others believe the wound in the abdomen disabled him to such an extent that the partner helped him, but when he was unable to get farther, shot him through the temples in order to seal his lips.

Bertilson Expert Hunter of the detective bureau yesterday photographed the dead man, took his finger prints and measurements.

The dead burglar had a specially made vest, in which he carried a complete set of burglar tools. The bottom part of the vest had pockets especially made for the tools. Underneath the vest, the man wore a red sweater. The coat had the initials "J. J." on the inside pocket, but the rest of the name, as well as the name of the maker, was torn out. The hat was from a Salt Lake clothing house, having the name of "Jack" cut on the band. A bottle containing a light colored fluid was found in the man's pockets. Some think this was nitroglycerine, while others claim it was used for other purposes. The contents were emptied into the river.

Hatcher found the dead burglar on Holgate street, about 150 feet from his rear door. Later in the day an empty shell was found near this spot.

violators to obey the law. It also calls to the attention of sheriffs and district attorneys the fact that it is their duty to enforce the law. Such officers have something to do besides sitting in their offices and there wait for other persons to make the complaints. It is their business to go out and see that laws are enforced, and when they find they are not to go ahead and enforce them.

Law Should Be Enforced.

John Mannix, avowed candidate for the Democratic nomination for sheriff, gave the following written statement of his views:

"My opinion is invited for publication by your paper as to the propriety of the conduct of Governor West in handling the Copperfield situation.

"This question is now before the circuit court of the state of Oregon for Baker county for determination and property demands that we should avoid expressing ourselves on the merits, whereby it will influence or prejudice the court's decision one way or the other.

"I will say this, that it is the duty of organized government, whether municipal, county or state, to enforce law and order and protect life, liberty and property. If a municipality refuses to do this and persists in such refusal, it is then the duty of the state authorities to avail themselves of the power of the law and maintain the authority of organized government. If it is to appear in any given case that the county authorities either will not or cannot control the situation, it naturally follows that the executive of this state, under the oath he has taken, must take care that the laws be faithfully executed and to perform this duty. In my opinion, the wise course to pursue would be to exhaust every other authority than that of the military, and if that fails, then to see that the laws are executed by calling on the military for such assistance as may be necessary.

"As to the action of Governor West in the specific case at Copperfield, I do not know the facts upon which the governor acted and do not know the circumstances in which the case at Copperfield are situated. Evidently Governor West did, or he would not have pursued the course he has. I do not believe in impeaching the conduct of public officers except upon knowledge of all facts and circumstances and as the matter is before the courts for determination, I believe the question will be decided right."

Rigid Enforcement Advocated.

Dr. J. L. Withycombe of Corvallis, who is credited with an ambition to enter the contest for the Republican nomination, made this brief statement:

"I am not sufficiently informed as to the justifications of the means employed by Governor West, however, will say that I am in favor of a rigid enforcement of the law."

Stevens Is Non-Committal.

"I am not thoroughly enough acquainted with the facts, on account of conflicting reports, to make any statement one way or the other on the efforts of Governor West at law enforcement and his present campaign in Baker county," said Robert L. Stevens, former sheriff of Multnomah county and a possible candidate for Republican nomination for governor.

Laws Must Be Enforced.

"What I think is what I think about Governor West's action at Copperfield," said Senator George C. Brownell at Oregon City. "If the laws in Baker county, which includes Copperfield, are not enforced, then the state of Oregon is not to be congratulated on having a governor who has got nerve enough to brush aside all technicalities and enforce the law."

Grant V. Dimick, another of Oregon City's Republican candidates, said:

"I believe in the strict enforcement of every criminal statute on the books. If the civil authorities who have charge of the enforcement of the law fail to accomplish their duties, I believe the governor, who is charged with the enforcement of the laws also, has the right to insist that they be enforced strictly and punctiliously.

If the allegations concerning conditions at Copperfield are true, and the laws have been openly defied, there has been non-enforcement of the laws, then I say the course Governor West pursued was the right one."

Not Informed of Facts.

Colonel Robert A. Miller, Democrat, had no desire to opinion to express, merely saying: "Ordinarily I believe in the normal course of law enforcement, but the executive must enforce the law if the city and county officials fail to do so. Whether the governor is justified in his course in Baker county and at Copperfield I am not sufficiently informed as to the facts to say."

Sheriff Tom Word, who has been mentioned as a possible candidate for the Democratic nomination but who has not yet declared his intentions, expressed himself as follows: "If the facts are as represented, the governor is doing exactly right. These liquor and gambling joints send 75 per cent of the young men who go wrong to the penitentiary, committing crime and finally to hell. I don't believe in them and I am not a church member, either. The sooner we get rid of such joints, the sooner we get control of crime and problem of unemployment."

"But what strikes me as queer is that Frank T. Collier is the governor's representative in eastern Oregon in questioning the joint and the joint of the firm of Stott & Collier, is defending the joints in Portland. I heard this morning he was going to cite me for contempt of court for making the joints in Portland. All I have to say is that if I am cited I will gladly go to jail in such a cause, and I have seen that will continue my work, and I will myself continue until I am stopped by law."

Moser Strongly Condemns.

Gus C. Moser, state senator from Multnomah county and an avowed candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, submitted a lengthy statement, much of it devoted to criticism of Governor West's administration. Commenting on the recent occurrences in Baker county, he said:

"So far as the Copperfield matter is concerned, a mountain has been made out of a molehill. Just when we are seeking to have located here a regional bank, and to induce capital to invest here, the news is flashed over the country and published in all the great newspapers that parts of Oregon are under martial law, and the governor has called out a part of the militia, and will call out all if necessary, and will enforce the lawless. The people in the east do not understand this.

"Now the governor appears to have called on the sheriff and district attorney to enforce the law. They could not find any law that would authorize or warrant them to do so, and they called on the governor to refer them to the legislature for any such law. His response, instead of showing them lawful authority, if there is any, was evidently intended to belittle and humiliate those officers. He got his headlines in the papers over his statement that he would show these officers that a mere slip of a woman could do what he asked them to do, and that his secretary, Miss Hobbs, would go there and close the saloons in an hour—and she was going to do it single-handed and alone. But did she? No, she was accompanied by Colonel Lawton and his soldiers, and all she did was to read a proclamation declaring martial law, and the Colonel did the rest. Now, why send Miss Hobbs? Could not the colonel have read that proclamation just as well, and the state been spared the expense of Miss Hobbs' pleasure trip? Pretty soon, after Miss Hobbs takes a few more trips, he will be convening the emergency board again to get another appropriation because the legislature did not give him enough money to enforce the laws.

"If the saloons in Copperfield were being conducted illegally, they could have been enjoined, in my opinion, upon a proper proceeding in court, but this could not be done in a day, for every man who is entitled to a day in court. If the law was being violated, the proprietors could be arrested daily, and after trial fined and imprisoned, and this would soon have ended their existence in Copperfield. There was no necessity for military interference, in my judgment."

W. A. Carter of Portland, who is numbered among the Republican candidates for governor, said:

"From all appearances there has been flagrant violation of the law in Baker county and all advances on the part of the governor to settle the matter quietly have failed. Conditions being notoriously bad, the governor was compelled to enforce the law drastically by declaring martial law."

"I am of the opinion that this step will hurt Oregon outside of the state far more than inside. Martial law should be invoked only in case of last resort, for other states are certain to gain the impression that Oregon is filled with lawlessness and the state will gain an unsavory reputation if abuse is made of this executive prerogative."

I believe thoroughly in the enforcement of the law and I am convinced that Governor West has always acted with sincerity and has done what he has believed to be right. I feel compelled to criticize on one score, however—that of acting too hastily, as in the case of the cannery dispute on the east side last summer. In this instance he was forced to recede from his original position. I believe that a governor should know that he is right and then hammer a thing through, then there is no danger of having to back water.

"The governor does not make laws, and he is supposed to enforce them, and if county and city officials, officers of integral parts of the state, fail to enforce laws in certain parts

of the state, then it is the governor's duty to do so. If by reason of the law being obnoxious it is not enforced in particular localities then the strictest enforcement will be the surest way of getting it off the statute books."

"Oregon has so many facilities for both getting and repealing laws that I feel the governor of the state should go slow in taking any stern action."

John Burgard of Portland, who has been mentioned as a possible aspirant for the Republican nomination for governor, had no opinion to express. "I don't care to discuss the matter at this time," he said.

MEN CAUGHT BEGGING AGREE TO SEEK WORK

Three unemployed men lodging at the city auditorium were arrested yesterday afternoon by Patrolman Sims at the U. S. Bakery, East Eleventh and Glisan streets, where they were found

asking for bread. The patrolman questioned the men, who said they had not worked or applied for work furnished by the city. Before Judge Stevenson of the municipal court, the men made a plea they would work if given a chance. The judge allowed them to go, provided they would apply for work this morning. The men gave the names of Willard Collins, William Kampton and H. Groen.

Joe Smith and O. Shafer were before the court this morning for "rushing" a restaurant at Fourth and Burnside streets. They promised to go to work and were discharged.

Must Boil Water.

Chehalis, Wash., Jan. 8.—Chehalis residents have been ordered to boil water used for domestic purposes by Dr. J. M. Schleicher, deputy county health officer. A general cleanup of all filth is urged by Dr. Schleicher in a poster warning to the public. Chehalis has no typhoid and has had less sickness than for many winters.

CAMP OF RUSTON IS ARMED AFTER ONE IS KILLED IN DISORDERS

Rumored Again That Lister Is to Send Troops to Restore Order at the Smelter.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 8.—The village of Ruston is an armed camp today, following the killing of Andrew Aronke, a striking employee of the Tacoma

smelter in a battle in the dark with officers guarding the company's property. Rumors were revived today that Governor Lister would be asked to send a militia company here to restore order. This probability, however, is not taken seriously by Sheriff Jamieson, in charge of the force of men at the smelter plant.

Aronke was shot in the abdomen early last night during a fusillade of shots between strikers posted on a bluff overlooking the smelter and the deputy sheriffs and town marshals. He was taken to a hospital, where he died about midnight.

Aronke was standing in front of the home of John Krusick, watching the firing, but taking no part, when he was struck. As he pitched headlong over the edge of the cliff, the wounded man uttered a cry of pain and called feebly for help. A young Austrian girl, Staela Thomas, 18 years old, employed as a domestic in the Krusick home, heard Aronke's cries and despite the bullets that rained all about the plucky girl, made her way down the slope, guided

by groans, to where Aronke lay in a heap in the pitchy darkness. Unmindful of her own peril, Miss Thomas half dragged and half carried the wounded striker up the steep slope, and after a hard struggle succeeded in landing her burden in the Krusick home and summoning a physician.

OFFICER AFTER OUT-OF-SEASON HUNTERS

Hood River, Or., Jan. 8.—Deputy District Game and Fish Warden Louis Fritz of The Dalles has been making a search for the hunters who have been killing deer in the Hood River section this winter. He has secured evidence that will probably lead to the arrest of several persons. A short time ago Mr. Fritz found venison stored underneath eight or 10 cords of oak wood in a woodshed, and in another instance found a lot of deer meat hidden beneath a bed in the attic of a mountain cabin.
