

WILLARD CLEARED AND BOXING IS HELD TO BE LEGAL IN CALIFORNIA

MICREDIE IS PEEVED AT "OUTLAWS" FOR CHADBOURNE

Doesn't Anticipate Absentees When Time Comes to Report at Santa Monica.

Walter McCredie is sorely tried. A plunge into a cold tub this morning did not cool off his temper. And it is all because the Federals are flitting with Chester Chadbourne, his star outfielder. Chester has given them a bit of encouragement, too, for he says if they offer him enough money he'll go.

"Well they can all go if they want to," growled Mac over the telephone this morning. "But I don't see how the Federals are going to fight the major leagues with minor league ball players."

"Of course Chadbourne will go if they give him enough money. So will any of them. I'm not going to worry, though. I've heard this same line of chatter for years. It's not going to cause me to lose any sleep."

"The contracts we sent out are coming in. Fisher and Kores have signed their contracts. Doane is satisfied and so is Hagerman, according to reports I guess there won't be any trouble when it gets time to report to Santa Monica."

It's funny what a turn baseball takes. Walter McCredie figures that he would be worth a fortune if he could assemble the money value of all the players that he has turned down. There's Earl Yingling, whom Cleveland tried to wish on him in 1910 when the Beavers were training at Santa Maria. McCredie would have none of the big pitcher, so he went to the Southern league and was drafted by Brooklyn. Just the other day Cincinnati paid \$500 for the big fellow. What do you suppose Chick Gandil is valued at by the Washington Americans? You couldn't buy him for less than \$10,000 or \$12,000, yet McCredie refused to trade Ole Olson to Montreal in 1911 for both Gandil and Pitcher Jim Wiggs. Both Olson and Gandil are now in the majors, but you'd have to throw in four or five other Naps to go in a trade now, so highly does Clark Griffith think of Chick.

In the east they have cleared up the "Mystery of Missing Miller," which has been puzzling baseball for some little time. Back in 1905, promising looking young kid received a contract from Hugh Duffy, then managing the Phillies, and reported to the club on their southern tour. Miller, as he couldn't agree with Duffy or the other players and when he wasn't put in for regular work, disappeared. He said his name was Miller and as such was kept for several years on the Philadelphia reserve, but was finally dropped. At last Charley Herzog, the former Giant and now manager of the Cincinnati club, cheerfully admits that he is Missing Miller. He says he went back to semi-pro baseball, then, into the minors under his own name and was finally purchased by New York because he looked promising. Then he hit less than .220 when McGraw consummated the deal.

Another one on Larry: Jack Hayden was talking to Larry McLean about Earl Mack, manager of the Raleigh team. Both were giving the youth a boost.

Hayden, who is a college man, turned to Larry and said: "I saw Earl's pater familias last week."

"Is that so?" replied Larry. "Well, Earl had better be careful and not let Connie hear about it."

An eastern writer suggests as a solution of the wonderful team work of the Athletics and the remarkable harmony on the club, the fact that practically all of the players have come to Connie without previous experience.

GILMORE SAYS FEDS ARE NOT TRYING TO SUPPLANT NATIONALS

Denies Outlaws Raiding Older League in Preference to American; Room for All.

Buffalo, N. Y., Jan. 13.—President Gilmore of the Federal league denied here today that his organization was raiding the National league for players in preference to the American league.

"We are not trying to supplant the National league in the favor of the feds," said Gilmore. "We do not wish to supplant either league. We only wish to compete with them in a fair business way. I believe the country is big enough for three major leagues."

Says He'll Enjoin Tinker.

New York, Jan. 13.—Charles Ebbetts, president of the Brooklyn club of the National league, returned today from Porto Rico. He confirmed reports that Joe Tinker, recently named manager of the Chicago club of the Federal league, would be enjoined if he plays with the outlaw club. Ebbetts declared that no action would be taken until the Federal league season opens and that Tinker would not be considered a deserter until he failed to report to the Brooklyn club in April.

Tupper has played stellar ball at Forest Grove for the last two seasons. Although he weighs only 130 pounds, he has proved a wonder for his sensational line bucks and short end runs. He always strikes hard and low and has been a consistent yardage-maker since he has been on the team.

Besides football he is a star distance man and a real point winner in basketball. He played guard on last year's team, but has been out of the game this year at the physician's orders on account of a slight injury to his arm, sustained during the football season.

JURY OUT FOR HOURS FINALLY REACHES A VERDICT SAVING RING

Decision Coincides With That Given by Judge Willis Two Years Ago in Boxing Case.

Los Angeles, Jan. 13.—Boxing, as conducted in the "right centers" of California, was given legal approval by the superior court of Los Angeles county today, when a jury found Jesse Willard, a heavyweight pugilist, not guilty of prizefighting. In a case that grew out of the fatal match between himself and Bull Young here last August.

The verdict was returned at 10:07 o'clock this morning after the jury had deliberated the evidence since late yesterday. Early ballots had shown two votes for conviction, but these jurors later were convinced by the majority.

In the trial the state sought to prove that Willard had violated the state law which prohibits prizefighting. By the decision the court defined the present status of the glove game in California, its decision coinciding with a decision given two years ago by Superior Judge Willis in a similar case in which Ad Wolgast and George Mensie were defendants.

The end of the sixth round found the Californian leg weary. Gibbons came right after his man with the tap of the gong the seventh.

A stinging right hand wallop to the jaw was the beginning of the end. Bob's legs sagged and then Gibbons rushed the blow reached its mark each time. But the light jabs were brushed off by Gibbons, who kept forcing his man about the ring. The fourth round was McAllister's best session. In this round he opened up and fought his opponent through the ropes. The fifth round also belonged to the Californian, but Mike was as fresh as if he had just entered the ring. He started out to finish his man in the sixth, and carried out his plan in the seventh.
