ONLY 4 MEMBERS OF 'UNEMPLOYED ARMY' WILLING TO WORK

Sixteen Others Leave Jobs at Salem When "Leader" Requests Them to Do So.

Salem, Or., Jan. 14.—Only four men in the jobless "army," which invaded the capital 100 strong last Sunday, wanted work badly enough to hang on to their jobs when the rest of the army was forced to leave the city. These four refused to obey their leader yesterday when he requested them to leave their jobs at the state hospital for tuberculosis.

When 21 of the idle army were arrested yesterday by the police, the leaders telephoned to those who had been given work at the state institu-

tions and requested them to quit, saying that if part of their number was arrested all and be locked up. Ten of them first employed at the tuberculosis sanitarium, six quit, and four refused to follow them. The 16 employed at the asylum farm quit.

The first "army" headed this way from entering the city. It is reported that the second "army," which left Portland Monday, is coming over the west side railroad tracks and probably will attempt to enter Salem over the new railroad bridge connecting Marion and Polk counties. If it does Chief Shedd said he would meet it at the bridge and prevent it from crossing.

He said if the men cross the river below here and approach the city from the north he will escort them through town and not permit them to stop.

The four refused to leave the city and demanded food. The police station and then took them out of the city over the Oregon Electric road, headed south. They protested against

being separated from those held in jail.

Kale Refused Them.
Those in jail were then fed and conducted out of town over the Southern Pacific tracks. When this division of the "army," which finally numbered 24, stopped at the state training school for boys and demanded supper and place to sleep, Superintendent Hale refused to give it to them.

They camped near the depot until after 8 o'clock, when they proceeded to Turner. There they were met by about 40 citizens, who refused to let them stop.

The first division was reported to have reached East Independence last night, about 12 miles from here.

Have Tobacco and Cigarettes.
Hillsboro, Or., Jan. 14.—The "army of unemployed" to the number of 80 that left Portland Monday morning on a hike for Salem arrived in this city Tuesday afternoon. The advance leaders, James Rice and wife, arrived over the Oregon Electric at 11:27, and were met at the depot by Sheriff Reeves and Chief of Police Blaser. They were escorted to the office of Mayor Bagley, when they made a request that Hillsboro feed the men dinner. The mayor told Rice that he had no authority to feed the "army" at the expense of the municipality.

The men rested in Shute park, near

the Southern Pacific railroad tracks for about an hour, but did not come up town. Rice said that it was the intention of the men to drop out on route to Salem, as they were able to find work, and that if they did not get work before reaching the capital and if no employment was found there, he did not know what they would do.

The marchers were in charge of George Carlson, as leader, and B. Gauswath as first lieutenant. The men are all young. Although they did not have any food with them, they all seemed plentifully supplied with tobacco and cigarettes. Nearly all the men appeared to be foreigners.

Sleep in Opera House.
Forest Grove, Or., Jan. 14.—Seventy-seven of the "unemployed army" were entertained here last night by the city. They were given supper, and beds in the opera house. They were given breakfast this morning. Seven left the ranks and will cut wood for Emil Chop north of this city, at \$1.10 per cord. The rest left late this morning for Salem, through Yamhill and Polk counties. There was no disturbance.
