

## THIRD PARTY MISTAKE SAYS SPRECKELS, WHO MAY AID JOHNSON

Rudolph Says He Is for Progressive Principles But Not for the Party.

(United Press Landed Wire.)

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 15.—Rudolph Spreckels, millionaire San Francisco banker and politician, does not believe a third party is necessary. This announcement was forthcoming from Spreckels in a statement today, in which he asserted he would support Governor Hiram Johnson for reelection, unless the Republican party nominated a candidate pledged to progressive principles. Spreckels' statement follows in part:

"I am, and have always been, a Republican. I also have consistently fought for progressive principles. I was, therefore, gratified when the Republican party machinery and our state officials were elected in the state of California. With these facts established, in my opinion, there was no justification for the formation of a third party in California, and certainly not on the ground that it would help promote progressive principles.

"My attitude toward the candidacy of Governor Johnson is consistent with what I have always believed to be the duty of every sincere progressive citizen, irrespective of what party he or she may belong to, namely, to organize and fight for progressive principles within his or her party; to vote for progressive candidates of that party at the primary election, but, if reactionary candidates are nominated, to vote at the general election for the best progressive candidates nominated by some other party.

"If the Republican party will nominate a truly progressive candidate for governor, I shall continue to support his candidacy against any and all candidates; but I would unhesitatingly vote for Governor Johnson at the general election before I would support or vote for a reactionary candidate."

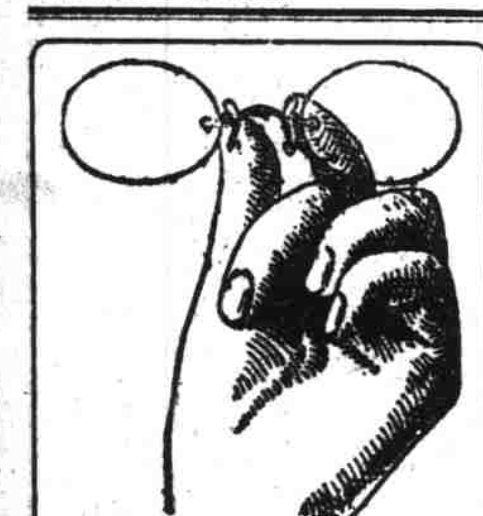
## COMPLAINT AGAINST ATTORNEY DISMISSED

When Deputy District Attorney Deich discovered that a complaint against Charles Yates, an attorney, charging him with having been signed by a collection agency, he had the case dismissed by District Judge Dayton on the ground that the district attorney's office was not meant for use in collecting bills. E. R. Thomas and P. A. McDonald, collectors, filed the complaint charging that Yates took \$5 belonging to Williams & Carter, contractors. It was alleged that the contractors paid the money to Yates to file a lien for \$185 for them and that he failed to file the lien, causing them to lose their money, and also to account for the money advanced. Yates was arrested Saturday night and later furnished bail for appearance in court.

## NEW DREDGE CAN'T BE ACTED UPON JUST YET

Washington, Jan. 15.—Replying to the chamber of commerce, Senator Chamberlain wired today that the bill calling for \$150,000 for a new dredge cannot be acted upon pending a report from the chief of engineers. A dredge would cost \$1,500,000, and take two years to build, by which time it might not be needed.

## CRAWFORD'S SCHOOL LAND PLANK 'ROTTEN'

Governor West Says Attorney General Is Astray on the Facts.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)

Salem, Or., Jan. 15.—Governor West says Attorney General Crawford must be very poorly informed about the school lands of the state or else his "school land" plank in his gubernatorial platform is a "rotten plank for a meaningless platform."

"Intelligence of the people being the assurance of free government and personal liberty, liberal support should be given our schools and colleges. To this end, the common school fund should be sacredly guarded and it may not be too late to save a portion of the \$150,000 worth of indemnity that has been lost during the last few years been practically lost to the state, the yearly interest of which amounts to over \$40,000 to be used in support of schools."

"The good attorney general must have had a 'hop' dream about the time this plank was written," said the governor. "Intelligence is either evidence of the attorney general's gross ignorance of land matters in this state or it is evidence of a deliberate attempt to furnish a rotten plank for a meaningless platform."

"The records of the state land board will show that selections have been made to cover practically all losses in school sections in this state and that such selections have either been approved, or are now pending before congress or the departments at Washington. There are about 3000 acres. There are other surveyed sections amounting to 4000 acres within the boundaries of forest reserves for which we had hoped to secure indemnity, but the department is holding against such selections and if an exchange is secured it must come through an act of congress."

was a great desert of ashes, sprinkled thick with cooling volcanic rock and humped here and there by what had once been a building. Most of the city being of frail Japanese construction, however, was completely consumed. The bottom of the crater, which had been so changed by the earth shocks that it was dangerous for the warships to navigate.

The naval authorities were distributing food among the refugees. There was no shelter, however.

The people simply camped in the open. Men who were rich last week had nothing but the clothes on their backs. Wireless messages said that practically nothing could be saved.

Naval officers reported that they were still unable to form much idea as to the actual loss of life. Unquestionably, it was heavy, but nearly all the victims were buried under the ashes, and it would be difficult to find them before a thorough search could be made.

Eruption Was Like Nightmares. The scenes which attended the eruption were described as more like a hideous nightmare than the reality. The heavens were obscured by a pall of the blackest smoke. Yet there was light enough from the glare of the volcano. The air was so thick with ashes that it would be impossible to breathe. Through them came hurrying great billows of red hot.

People ran helter skelter in every direction. Numbly they were blinded by the clouds. Nearly all suffered terrible burns. Families were separated. Terrified cattle lumbered through the crowds, colliding with human beings.

The heavy rain was coming down in flames. The earth rocked. Breaths cracked open in the streets. There was a suffocating, sulphurous smell. Screams of terror and cries for help sounded on every hand.

Of those who escaped there was hardly one who had not lost near relatives. Many had lost all. Of the aged a considerable number had to leave the town at all, saying they preferred to die in their own homes.

"I did not know she had any amount of money. Her last visit was a short time before Christmas and I saw she was falling, in fact she told me she was feeling badly. I told her she could come and help us at the Bethany home, but I never heard from her again."

"I claim the privilege of taking charge of her funeral services as she was one of our people as such," "Mother" Lawrence secured the permission of Judge Cleaton for taking charge of the funeral this morning. "Lena Kasman lived hard and had a great contempt for laziness," continued "Mother" Lawrence. "Her heart was in the Plisgah work and she expected to end her days with us in the old people's home."

"Mother" Lawrence is inclined to believe that had her Old People's home been finished Lena Kasman's life would have been prolonged, as she would not have been obliged to live in a basement room.

"The life of the scrub woman, Lena Kasman, has been one full of good deeds. She first came to us a year ago next month. She would have come to live with us if only we had our Old People's home finished. It is my great regret that the home is not nearly ready, because of lack of funds, for the reception of deserving old men and women."

## POLICE CAPTAINCY TO BE CONTESTED FOR BY THIRTY-SIX OFFICERS

Twenty-Three Have Already Entered Race and Dozen More Expected.

Salem, Or., Jan. 15.—Suits to annul the incorporation of West Woodburn has been filed in the circuit court by District Attorney E. C. Johnson, at the request of Governor West. This suit is based on the charge that the incorporation was accomplished for fraudulent purposes, the sole object being to license a saloon. The defendants are Charles Vincent, saloonkeeper; A. B. Crosby, J. T. McCormick, John McCormick, J. A. McCormick, Frank Proctor, F. A. Bauer and Charles McCormick, town officials.

The complaint states that on several occasions residents of the precinct petitioned for a saloon, but always a bigger petition was presented in protest, and the license was never issued. Then on August 12, the town was presumably incorporated, and soon after a saloon license was issued to Charles Vincent.

The town is laid out with very irregular lines, and the complaint charges that because an effort was made to exclude the residence of as many prohibitionists as possible.

Miss Fern Hobbs made an investigation of the town's incorporation and since organization a short time ago.

Powell, of the Cobequid, was injured last night. A member of the crew also was hurt, slipping on the ice and breaking a leg.

Sister Baptista, a nun, this afternoon told the story of the wreck. "It was early Tuesday morning," she said, "when the Cobequid went ashore on Trinity Island. The ice was blowing. The shock of the vessel striking the ledge was felt by everyone. It must have struck the ledge between 6 and 7 o'clock."

All the passengers rushed from their staterooms. I was one of the first on deck. I could hear the high seas breaking above the roar of the blizzard. It was terrible. I went above and heard the wireless operator snapping out his appeals for aid.

The storm increased in fury as the day advanced. The high seas flooded the floor. Keeping of live chickens or other fowl in rooms adjacent to where food is stored is also to be prohibited. One of the provisions of the ordinance is aimed at all cold storage plants.

An ordinance regulating the killing and disposing of meat is now being prepared and will be enforced in conjunction with the new ordinance. It will likely pass the council tomorrow. It is also planned to regulate bakeries and restaurants by requiring a small license fee.

San law the offenses charged are misdemeanors. That the remaining indictments are more serious was indicated by the fact that Judge O'Brien ordered them withheld until arrests were made. The new indictments charge that these indictments refer to the offenses alleged to have been committed prior to the shooting and deportation of Moyer.

The grand jury exonerated 27 members of the federation, charged with conspiracy to destroy life and property in connection with the South Range riots of December 10-11. It was reported that the jury returned a number of indictments in connection with the murders at Seeberville.

Moyer Expected Indictment. Denver, Colo., Jan. 15.—Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, charged with surprise when told here today that he had been indicted with 38 others by a grand jury at Houghton, Mich., on charges of conspiracy.

"I had to be indicted," said Moyer, "but I had no idea what the charges would allege. I do not believe the prosecution is doing any injury to officials of our federation entered into any conspiracy. I have no fear of the outcome. I shall return to Michigan and face the charges."

On Request of Governor West, Suit Filed to Annul Incorporation.

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## UNEMPLOYED 'AGENTS' TRAVEL TO ALBANY

Rank and File Reported to Be Tramping Along on Short Rations.

Albany, Or., Jan. 15.—Declaring that the people have been misled as to understanding the character and sincerity of the unemployed "army," E. W. Rimer, leader of the "army" which tramped from Portland, asserted here yesterday afternoon that the men are absolutely sincere in their desire for work, that they are a well organized bunch, that they represent the better class of workmen and that being strictly up against it have gone on the pilgrimage. Rimer and his wife arrived here from Salem on the Oregon Electric at 3 o'clock and took lodging in a rooming house. They are awaiting the arrival of the trampers.

Mayor Cull said yesterday that he can not supply the men with work and that he will therefore encourage them to move on. He made it plain that he would not stand for any annoyance from them and intimated that the city might feed the men, upon the promise that they move on. The matter was discussed at the city council meeting last night and the mayor was upheld.

"Our plan is to keep going," said Rimer, "until all of the men find work. We have an age limit of from 20 to 35. We started from Portland with 38 men. Two quit before we got to Salem to join the ranks. At Salem four remained on the jobs offered them and two joined our ranks there. We now have 34 and they are divided into three divisions. About 10 per cent of the men are foreigners, five are Mexicans. There are only three I. W. W.'s among us."

Thirty men roaming the streets last night were picked up by the police and given lodging in the city jail. Only a few of them claimed to be members of the "army." The rest are believed to be common hoboes. The last heard of the "army" after it left Salem was that it spent the night at East Independence in box cars offered them by Oregon Electric employees. Rimer doesn't appear to know where the men are or when to expect them. He declared, however, that the three divisions will probably be here by night-fall.

## 4000 OREGON PEOPLE AT LEAST, WILL PAY TAX ON INCOMES

the source or by the receiver of the rent or salary was settled by an order received this morning at the local internal revenue office from Washington.

This states that on sums of \$3000 or over, paid as rent, to any one individual by another since November 1, the deduction of 1 per cent or more, according to the size of the sum, shall be made by the payer. The payee is not taxed for it.

But on sums large enough to be taxed that were paid by one individual to another for either rent or salaries between March 1 and November 1, the payee of such salary or rent shall be taxed the 1 per cent.

In other words, on taxable sums in rent or salary paid since November 1, the taxes are withheld at the source by the payer himself. On taxable sums paid before November 1 and since March 1, the payee pays the tax.

The department is now appointing men all over the country who are to investigate the matter. In case of suspicion that some one is not making a correct statement of his income, the inspectors will make a personal investigation of the suspect's assets.

Astoria, Or., Jan. 15.—At 11:20 last night the jury in the case of the state against Paddy Lynch, charged with living in a house of ill-fame, returned a verdict of "not guilty." The case was given to the jury at 8:45 p. m. This is the second case arising as a result of the crusade instigated by Governor West against the vice district of this city. Last week a circuit court jury found Arthur Peters not guilty of felony on a charge of placing his wife in a house of prostitution. A number of cases are pending, but action on any of them has not been announced.

That other changes will occur, particularly in the purchasing department, was rumored in railway circles today. The Astoria division, which includes the Astoria and Portland, Spokane & Inland Empire, now but loosely allied with the Northern Pacific, has also been hinted.

## THE JOURNAL CHIMES TO ONE COUPLE HERE ARE WEDDING CHIMES

Says She Will Charge Assaultants With Assault, Burglary and Arson.

South Bend, Wash., Jan. 15.—Mrs. Margaret Ross who says she was driven from her quarters' claim on North River Sunday night by a band of armed men wearing black masks, arrived here last night in a pitiable state but with fighting spirit fully aroused. She says she intends to have all of the men arrested and declares that when they are all serving time, she will be back on her claim.

Inasmuch as she claims they fired upon her and her two sons, broke into their cabin and finally set fire to it, she says she will charge all of those whom she recognized with first degree assault, burglary and arson. Deputy Attorney Allen and Deputy Sheriff Foster have been in North River for the last two days, working on the case and upon their return Mrs. Ross maintains she will ask for warrants for eight of the men whom she knew and serve John Doe warrants.

## PURCHASE OF DOCK SITE PROPERTY CONSIDERED

The dock commission at a special meeting today considered the contract for the purchase of the property for dock No. 2 from William Reid for the sum of \$250,000. It was decided to refer the contract to the city attorney for revision, providing for the withholding of the sum of \$13,500 until title to a disputed frontage of 53 feet, known as the Elwert property, is cleared, as well as any possible cloud on other sections.

Ben Selling recorded a dissenting vote, contending that it was up to Mr. Reid to bear the expenses of litigation in clearing title to the property.
