

NAMED FOREMAN OF INCINERATOR PLANT

Appointment Is Made by Commissioner; Heales Promoted.

William G. Heiber, acting superintendent of the municipal incinerator since the death of David E. Otis, a few months ago has been appointed general foreman of the plant, the positions of superintendent and foreman being combined. The appointment was made by Will H. Daly, commissioner of public utilities, this morning, who also promoted William R. Heales to the position of assistant foreman. The new position pays a salary of \$145 a month, to begin with, and gives Mr. Heiber absolute supervision of the plant and the garbage collection system. Mr. Heiber, according to Commissioner Daly, is an all around incinerator expert having been employed by the city for nine years, first in the crematory and later at the incinerator. Since 1906 he has been foreman of the plant at a salary of \$100 a month. Before coming to Portland he was employed in the municipal reduction plant at St. Louis, working there for five years. Prior to that time he had experience in private plants and chemical works.

Since the death of Superintendent Otis, Mr. Heiber has had entire charge and has established a number of new records for garbage incineration. Mr. Heiber is 38 years old and married.

CLATSKANIE CANNERY PLANS IMPROVEMENTS

Last Season Was Good One Considering Incompleteness of Equipment.

(Special to The Journal.) Clatskanie, Or., Jan. 1.—The annual meeting of the stockholders of the cannery company was held here Wednesday afternoon. There was a large attendance and much interest was manifested in the coming year's work. The report of last season's output was very satisfactory, considering that the building was not completed and equipped until late, and but little was attempted before the canning of beans. Eleven hundred cases of beans were put up, which, with the exception of about 60 cases, have been sold. The company was incorporated with a capital stock of \$2500, half of which was sold to raise funds to put up the building and equip the plant. At the meeting considerable more stock was subscribed for and plans were made to be in readiness to operate the plant throughout the season. The following were elected officers and directors for the coming year: President, A. G. Anderson, of the creamery company; vice president, treasurer, Henry Kratz, of the Kratz Milling company; secretary, Nathan Van; directors, W. A. Hall, of the Clatskanie Drug company; E. Kaspar, of Mayer; William Roberts, of Mayer; Nathan Van, A. G. Anderson, J. H. Lewis, John Palm, Henry Kratz and S. M. Hall. William Roberts and S. M. Hall were appointed a committee to amend the by-laws, as it is desired to increase the capital stock of the company.

SENATOR BOURNE WINS IDAHO MINING SUIT

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 16.—A decision favorable to former United States Senator Jonathan Bourne of Oregon was handed down in the United States district court here today by Judge F. S. Dietrich, in the case involving valuable mining property in Coeur d'Alene district, northern Idaho. The action was brought by the Stewart Mining company for possession of ore bodies beneath the surface of the Ontario mine, which was owned by Bourne. The Stewart company owns claims adjoining the Ontario and it was admitted at the trial that the same rich veins that were found in the Stewart company's claims run through Bourne's claim. The property in contest is considered among the richest in the Coeur d'Alene section.

JUDGE STANTON FAVORS BONDS FOR HIGHWAY

Hood River, Jan. 16.—County Judge Stanton favors the issuance of \$200,000 worth of bonds for the construction of roads in Hood River county, \$125,000 to be spent on local roads and \$75,000 to be spent on the Columbia River Highway. Major Bowley has been in conference with the members of the Hood River county court relative to proposed bond issue and states that he is of the opinion that \$75,000 would construct a dirt road from the Multnomah county line to the Weaco county line on the grade now being surveyed by the state engineers. Judge

Stanton advises that the matter of voting on the bond issue be gotten under way as soon as possible in order that the election may be held this summer.

WEST ASKS ACTION ON COPPERFIELD PICTURES

Salem, Or., Jan. 16.—Because District Attorney Godwin of Baker refused to act on information furnished him by Colonel Lawson in regard to obscene pictures taken from the walls of Councilman Weiland's saloon at Copperfield, Governor West today sent the pictures and two American flags that were draped about one of them to Circuit Judge Gustav Anderson with

the request that the matter be presented to the grand jury. In his letter to Judge Anderson the governor said: "If no conviction is had in this matter, I would ask that the flags and pictures be returned that they may be handed over to the federal authorities."

ASHLAND WILL HAVE "BETTER BOYS" CLUB

Ashland, Or., Jan. 16.—Professor Vining, one of the lecturing faculty of Columbia University and a native of Ashland, who has been spending several months here, is interested in the movement for "better boys" and has taken up the matter of organizing a

club. Ashland Lodge No. 844, B. P. O. E., is also interested and will give the use of its dining room free, and is also backing the club in other ways. A meeting this evening will be in the nature of a get-together meeting and will be addressed by E. D. Briggs, E. V. Carter, D. Peroni, E. E. Bagley, C. E. Wolf, Exalted Ruler W. E. Newcombe, Professor Vining and others. Light refreshments will be served. Boys of the ages of from 14 to 20 years will be admitted to membership.

Important Link in Highway. Kelso, Wash., Jan. 16.—One of the most important steps in the building of the Pacific highway through Cowitt county was the awarding by the county commissioners at Kalama of

the contract for the construction of two and a half miles of road between Kelso and Carrollton. The Ambrose-Burdall company of Portland were successful out of five competing companies, and will construct a 15 foot wide bitumated macadam road at a total cost of \$88,519.46.

BELLINGHAM CITIZEN VICTIM OF OPERATION

Bellingham, Wash., Jan. 16.—Unable to combat the effects of a delicate operation performed last Sunday for intestinal ailment, Charles E. Cline died in this city yesterday. Mr. Cline was 55 years old. He was born in Dan-

ville, Ill. He was prominent in state politics in former days and had served as chief clerk of the state legislature and as a member of the house of representatives from Whatcom. In 1897 he was elected speaker of the lower branch of the legislature.

HYDE LAND CASES ARGUED AT EUGENE

Eugene, Or., Jan. 16.—Attorney General Crawford was in Eugene yesterday to argue for the state a demurrer in the case of the state vs. F. A. Hyde, which involves thousands of acres of

valuable timber lands in Lane and five other counties of the state. It is the intention of the attorney general to make a test of the case in Lane county, the arguments and any decision made here to hold good in the other counties in which suit was instituted against Hyde by the attorney general several months ago to annul the deeds to timber lands which it is alleged Hyde obtained fraudulently. Mr. Crawford was assisted in his arguments before the court by A. R. Arundie, special agent of the United States field service, and Hyde was represented by W. Bickford and E. Hirsch of Montana, A. C. Shaw of Portland and E. R. Bryson of Eugene. The attorney general brought suit in Lane, Linn, Jackson, Clackamas, Crook and Klamath counties against

Hyde to cancel the deeds to the timber lands which he acquired through the alleged fraudulent practice of hiring other people to take up public lands, turning them over to him and then securing lieu lands from the government.

Petition in Bankruptcy. A bankruptcy petition was filed with the federal court this morning by M. Silver, a merchant at 126 North Sixth street. The stock in trade of the store, amounting to \$1500, is now attached by the sheriff, according to the petition. The indebtedness is \$8665, with assets of \$2150.
