Civil Service Examinations.—The United States civil service commission announces that on February 9, 1914, the following examination will be held at this city: Research chemist, male, for position in the bureau of animal industry, department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., at \$1800 a year. On February 19, assistant in road economics, male, for positions in the office of public roads, department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., at \$1500 a year. On February 21, railway mail clerk, male, at \$900 per annum. On March 11-12, assistant men, teachers, men and women, industrial teacher, man, for positions in the Philippine service, from \$1000 to \$2000 a year. Socialist Lectures to Speak.—Edward Adams Cantrell of Los Angeles, a national lecturer of the Socialist party, will deliver a lecture next Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at Women of Woodcraft hall, Tenth and Taylor streets, on the subject of "The Socialist Politicians and the Dynamiting Program." Mr. Cantrell will trace the history of the dynamite outrage at Los Angeles from its inception to its culmination, showing that so far as the California end is concerned, it was a scheme of Socialist and labor politicians to develop a mob spirit for the purpose of reaping political advantage.

Wants Will Produced.—A petition asking that Leo Harms be forced to produce the will of Florence L. Barker, who died in Oakland, Cal., last October, was filed yesterday by Norman J. Barker, her husband. Harms, according to the petition, was named executor of the will of Mrs. Barker and has possession of the document, which he has failed to produce. Barker asks that he be appointed administrator of the estate, which is valued at \$1200, if Harms does not desire to become executor. Lester L. Nickerson, Mrs. Barker's brother, is the only other heir, the petition states.

Prohibitionists' Banquet.—Prohibitionists will hold an "out to win" banquet in the auditorium of the Y. M. C. A. tonight. An imposing toast list has been arranged and at the conclusion of the meal the auditorium will open to all who wish to hear the speakers. Among those on the program are E. Lee Paget, S. W. Grathwell, Captain Charles H. Stanley, the converted comedian; George C. Pendell, in charge of the state publicity work; Ernest G. Taylor, state secretary, and the Rev. F. W. Emerson of Albany, member of the national committee.

Charged With Highway Robbery.—Charged with holding up J. B. Shaw at West Park and Planders streets last evening, James Steel is under arrest and is held on a charge of highway robbery. Shaw lost \$30. A diamond stickpin was taken from Shaw but this was found near the scene of the holdup. William Freeman was taken into custody later as a partner of Steel. Both Steel and Freeman are colored.

Masamas' Sunday Hike.—For their Sunday trip the Masamas will leave town in the Oregon Electric from Jefferson street depot at 1:25 p. m. and go to Garden Home. From there they will hike by way of Sylvan to Mount Calvary, and thence by trail past south side of the city park to Ford and Madison streets. The tramp is between seven and eight miles long.

"Bagging Credentials" Stolen.—Someone stole the credentials belonging to the "bagging committee" of the Unemployed league at the Gipsy Smith tabernacle. Such a report was made to the police last evening, warning that a search be made to locate the credentials, as the committee cannot solicit food and clothing without the lost papers.

Delta Upsilon Luncheon.—The Portland Delta Upsilon club will hold its monthly luncheon at the University club tomorrow.

Boy Wants to Work.—Vernon Emmerick, 13 years old, wants to work in

stead of going to school. So strongly is the lad determined that he threatened suicide last November, and now has run away from his home in Albion. The boy left home Wednesday stating he wanted to go to Camas, Wash. Yesterday he was seen boarding a boat at Astoria to take him but the lad ran ashore and escaped.

Trouble Over Dye Works.—Arrested yesterday on a charge of defrauding H. G. McDonald out of \$225 by selling him the American Dye Works, 727 Thurman street, without holding title to the concern, R. M. Hurlbut declares that he was an innocent purchaser and practiced no fraud when he gave McDonald a bill of sale. Deputy Constable Hunter arrested him and he gave \$250 cash bail. Hurlbut alleges that H. G. Axt sold him the place and that J. Brown gave Axt a bill of sale. Both of the latter are named in the complaint. Mark Schuster claims that he has a bill of sale ante-dating the others and that he is the real owner of the plant, according to McDonald.

Registration Active.—No evening hours for registration will be kept by County Clerk Coffey for the present, he announced this morning. Later he will keep the office open for the accommodation of those unable to register during the regular hours from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. The total registration at closing time last night numbered 4907, yesterday's portion being 551. The men registered so far numbered 4058 and the women but 849. The breakdown by political party is: Republican, 3272; Democrat, 1027; Progressive, 258; Independents, 198; Socialist, 88; Prohibition, 64.

Attempt at Extortion.—M. McLain, an unemployed switchman, was arrested last evening for attempting to extort money from Ida Hillebrand, 88 Broadway. Patrolmen Griffith and Everett made the arrest. They also took into custody W. Humphries for carrying concealed weapons. McLain represented to the alien woman that he was a special police officer, and would give her protection for \$10 a week. He secured \$8 a few days ago, but said, returning yesterday, he got more money last evening. The hearing will be Tuesday in the municipal court.

Five men were arrested in the place in connection with the game. The men pleaded guilty. Patrolmen Miller and Wellbrooke made the arrest yesterday afternoon.

Estate of Henry Meyer.—A petition was filed yesterday in the estate of Henry Meyer asking that the inheritance tax to be paid by the widow be reduced. Mrs. Meyer is entitled to receive \$20,347.88 from the estate, according to the petition. The children were each left \$1. Mr. Meyer died May 30, 1913.

Many Seek Citizenship.—Two hundred applicants for final citizenship papers will appear for examination before Circuit Judge Morrow this month. The examinations will commence tomorrow morning and sessions of court will be held Monday and Tuesday of next week. The hearings will adjourn until January 30 and 31.

FUNERAL FOR MAN KILLED IN ELEVATOR

Funeral services were held this afternoon from Holman's undertaking parlors, Third and Salmon streets, for William H. Fenton, who was killed Tuesday in an elevator accident while at work on a building now being constructed at Fifteenth and Hoyt streets. The body of the man, who was 35 years old, was held in the elevator for a short time before it fell, resulting in his death.

Born December 13, 1872, in Indiana, he came to Oregon as a boy and was widely known as a mechanic in the building line. He was 41 years of age. He was married to a widow, Mrs. L. Fenton of 1231 Cora avenue, and had a brother, J. A. Fenton of 268 East Third street, this city.

He was a member of Carpenters' union No. 508 of Portland and Knights of the Macabees camp No. 1. Interment was made in the Pineshola cemetery, the Rev. M. H. St. John conducting the services.

CATHOLIC FORESTERS HOLD INSTALLATION

Impressive Ceremonial Participated in by Archbishop Christie.

Graced by the presence of the Rt. Rev. Archbishop Christie, the installation of officers of the six courts of the Catholic Order of Foresters held at Columbus hall, Wednesday night, was one of the most impressive ceremonies ever held in local Catholic circles.

The exercises were conducted by State Chief Ranger M. J. Malbey, who inducted into office all of the recently elected officers of the six Portland courts.

In response to an appeal by Archbishop Christie to the generosity of the Foresters \$200 was pledged during the course of the evening for maintaining the "chapel" car during the current year. The archbishop's work among the aged and infirm, particularly endeared him to Oregon Catholics and his appeal met with a hearty response.

Following the installation a luncheon was served at which J. C. Kern, high court trustee, presided. State Chief Ranger Malbey was the principal speaker. Music during the evening was furnished by members of the St. Francis court. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Immaculate Heart court.

A get-together campaign is now being planned for this year's work, having as its aim increased membership and a closer alliance between the courts of Portland and those of the state at large. Further joint meetings of the six Portland courts are anticipated in the shape of joint initiations and entertainments.

BUCKMAN FUNERAL TO TAKE PLACE TOMORROW

The funeral of Isiah Buckman, one of the pioneer residents of East Portland, who died Wednesday from a paralytic stroke at the Peninsula apartments, will be held tomorrow forenoon at 11 o'clock from the A. R. Zeller chapel.

Mr. Buckman made Portland his home since 1872, when he came with his parents to East Portland from his birthplace, in Marshall county, Indiana. They established a residence on a site now known as Lydia Buckman's addition to Portland. Mr. Buckman maintained the old home until recently when he removed to the Peninsula apartments.

He was the owner of large property interests, was a member of the Chamber of Commerce, and until it was taken over by the city was president

of the East Side Water company. He was born January 17, 1841, and never married. He is survived by a brother, Theodore Buckman of Vancouver, Wash., and three sisters, Lydia A. Carter, Sarah J. Buckman and Angeline B. Richardson, all of Portland.

6 ELK WILL BE ADDED TO WASHINGTON PARK

Four female and two male elk are soon to be housed in the Washington park zoo, to take the place of the present herd. Park Superintendent Mische yesterday placed an order with H. Anderson, a veteran animal catcher of Yellowstone National park, for capturing and shipping the animals to Portland.

The United States government gave the animals to the city, but the city is required to pay the cost of capture and shipping. They will be sent by express and will occupy the elk corral at the zoo. The change in herds is necessary to prevent inbreeding.
