

HEARINGS ON ASIATIC EXCLUSION BILL ARE CALLED OFF BY BRYAN

Claim Made Wrong Interpretation Put on Baron Makino's Address Yesterday.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, Jan. 22.—Fear of further involving the United States with Japan today caused the hearing on the Asiatic exclusion bill, Secretary Bryan was said to have requested that the hearing be not held.

That there is no danger of any serious break in the friendly relations between this country and Japan was insisted upon in official quarters. A wrong interpretation, it was explained, had been placed on the latest utterances of Baron Nobukuni Makino, Japanese foreign minister. He stated that the negotiations between his government and the state department have failed and that Japan has now come to the necessity of considering some other way for settling the controversy growing out of the California Japanese anti-alien land owning act. The "other ways" are taken to mean either a test suit against the California law or negotiation of another treaty.

It is known Secretary Bryan favors negotiating an entirely new convention which will cover fully the rights of Japanese in America and Americans in Japan.

FOUR PETITIONS FOR RELEASE FROM DEBTS

A petition in bankruptcy was filed in the federal court yesterday by attorneys for the Coppertown Jewelry company of Eugene. The president of the corporation is William R. Coppertown, and its secretary is Raymond L. Perdue. The scheduled indebtedness of the company is \$19,677.03, and its assets are \$24,228. The jewelry stock is valued at \$4,000.

The petition of John Kentia, merchant and farmer of Siletz, Lincoln county, asking to be declared a bankrupt, was also filed today. According to the schedule, Kentia, a Finn, in 1905, became manager for a cooperative commercial institution for a Finnish society, the headquarters to be at Siletz. The venture proved to be a losing one, and in the debt schedule there is a total of \$12,120.53 in liabilities, with \$18,436.70 assets.

Other petitioners today were Gust Rex, cement contractor, Portland, debt \$806.46 and assets \$787.76, and LeRoy Barnard, 1524 Olympia street, a shipping clerk, debts \$1098.13 and no assets.

SCHOOL DISTRICT 12 WILL ISSUE BONDS

Sealed bids for \$100,000 worth of bonds to be issued by school district No. 12, which includes The Dalles, will be opened by the directors at The Dalles at 5 p. m. March 1.

The bonds will bear 5 per cent interest payable semi-annually, and the principal is payable 10 years from the date of issue, and collectible 20 years from date.

The bonds are in denominations of \$1000, and each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for 1 per cent par value of the bid.

The population of the district is 6000, the present bonded indebtedness is \$10,000 and there is no floating indebtedness.

Mr. McMurray Withdraws.
The nominating committee of the Commercial club has so far selected no tenth man to take the place of William McMurray on the list of nominees for the board of governors. Mr. McMurray, who was in the east when his name was put on, found upon his return that his request to have it removed had not been heeded and he sent a letter to John F. Logan of the committee formally denying the nomination. The voting at the annual meeting next Saturday night will be by ballot, five governors to be elected from the list of 10.

Singer Released Without Bail.
Over the objection of Deputy District Attorney Maguire, Circuit Judge Gatens allowed Joseph F. Singer, under indictment for extortion, to go on his own recognizance when he was arraigned yesterday afternoon. Singer was allowed five days in which to plead.

Special homeseekers' excursion, trains will be operated around the Portland, Eugene & Eastern's McMinnville loop soon after the return of General Passenger Agent John M. Scott from San Francisco, it was announced today. Two or three special trains, besides the regular service, will be run each week, according to the plan being worked out by Mr. Scott in conference with Passenger Traffic Manager C. S. Fee.

Complaint generally made by those interested in development, has been that the average homeseeker has little chance actually to see the Willamette valley. Schedules will be arranged so that the sufficient time will be allowed at each town and visitors may learn first hand what the valley offers. The movement for this special service is the outgrowth of numerous development meetings held through the Willamette valley during the last few weeks.

After hearing the story, Judge Stevenson said it would do no good to put her in the county jail, but that she should be sent to her father at Baker. The girl is 18 years old.

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ROAD WILL OPERATE DEMONSTRATION TRAIN

Southern Pacific to Aid Plan to Educate Farmers on the Line.

Farmers along the lines of the Southern Pacific Railway in Oregon will hear stories of the hog and dairy cow from the lips of scientists when the railway company's demonstration train passes over a system beginning February 2. The itinerary, issued today after a conference last night between General Freight Agent H. A. Hinshaw and Prof. Ralph D. Hetzel, director of extension of the Oregon Agricultural college, covers the Willamette, Rogue River and Umpqua valleys and all the territory pierced by the main and branch lines.

The train will be out 13 days, starting at Independence February 2, and ending at Albany February 14. In the lecturing party will be Prof. Hetzel, Dr. James Withycombe, Prof. H. R. Graves, Prof. E. L. Potter, Prof. E. B. Pitts, Prof. G. H. Sampson, and Prof. W. A. Barr. Dr. Robinson will go as herdsman and demonstrate the physical care of cattle and hogs.

W. K. Newell, president of the state board of horticulture, J. M. Dickson, William Schulmerich, J. Carey, and Chris Myers, farmers, will be with the party throughout the trip and the railroad will be represented by Mr. Hinshaw, H. Mulvihill, John M. Scott, and A. G. Roachke, President Robert E. Strahorn of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern, will accompany the train over the line.

The train, besides the lecture cars, will include stock cars for the cattle and hogs taken along, flat cars for demonstration, and a car equipped with the most modern appliances for use in the dairy.

CONVICTED MEN CLAIM JURY WAS PREJUDICED

Frank Richet and J. T. Conway Seek New Trial in Land Case.

Alleging that articles printed in The Journal during the progress of the trial of Frank Richet and J. T. Conway prejudiced the jury, Attorneys Fulton and Bowerman, who represented them, yesterday filed in the federal court a motion for a new trial. Richet and Conway, the defendants in a case involving the Oregon Inland Development company, were convicted early in December, after a three-week trial, of using the mails to defraud in connection with a scheme to sell eastern Oregon mountain lands.

Accompanying the motion is an affidavit, jointly made by Conway and Richet, in which they declare that the editorial in the columns of The Journal of Friday, November 28, was generally distributed over the city, and that its publication created a wide prejudicial impression against the defendants. The second article was published the following Sunday, the affidavit states. Under a Salem date line, it is pointed out, the article stated that Attorney Commissioner Watson had asked Governor West to cancel the charter of the Oregon Inland Development company, because it was conducting a fraudulent business.

Saturday morning, Mr. Reames announced today, he will file an affidavit answering the one introduced yesterday by Conway and Richet and he will include this statement of the jurors in his affidavit. Judge Bean will hear the motion argued Monday.

SKILLMAN TO BE SENT TO ASYLUM FOR INSANE

County Commissioner Hart was before the grand jury yesterday afternoon relating his story of alleged attempts to bribe him in connection with the selection of the engineer for the interstate bridge, which he recently declared had been made. He told the names of the three firms which he said approached him, but District Attorney Evans declines to make them public until the investigation is ended.

Hart went before the investigating board yesterday, but his physical condition made an operation necessary this morning. Evans said that nothing further would be done in the matter until the routine matters now before the grand jury are disposed of.

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SINGLE PERSONS WITH INCOMES SUBJECT TO TAXATION MUST ACT

Any single person whose income for 1913 was \$2500, is advised to file at once with the internal revenue collector a schedule of income, which can be levied ordinarily on a single person whose income is over \$2000. The law, however, did not go into effect last year until March 1, and for that reason the tax computations must be made upon the five-sixths of a year. Every one whose income is subject to taxation is required to file a schedule of the amount with the internal revenue collector by March 1, after which date the taxes will be considered delinquent and subject to fine and imprisonment.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES ELECTION

Reports of the achievements of the past year and the nominating of seven new directors to succeed the members whose terms expire shortly featured the meeting of the Associated Charities, held in the auditorium of the Central library last night. W. L. Brewster, C. Henri Labbe, W. B. Mackay, J. F. Daly, W. P. Jones, Mrs. Harry Corbett and Mrs. A. F. Biles were the directors nominated.

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AID OF CITY SOUGHT IN PLAN FOR ROAD THROUGH BULL RUN

Representative of Hood River Commercial Club Makes Appeal.

Seeking the assistance of the members of the city commission to have the United States government allow a road to be built through the Bull Run Reserve and a part of the Oregon National forest, where Portland gets its water, W. L. Clark, representing the Hood River Commercial club, appeared before the mayor and city commissioners this morning.

Mr. Clark asked that the members of the city council take no action toward pressing the passage of a measure pending in Congress which would prevent the building or opening of any highways through the Oregon National forest.

Mr. Clark stated that the people of Hood River and those interested in the building of the proposed highway through the National forest did not want the bill to pass.

Will H. Daly, commissioner of public utilities, was not favorably impressed with the proposal to build the highway through the Bull Run Reserve, stating that it would endanger Portland's water supply. He contended that a road through the reserve would make it easier for poachers and others to get into the reserve and that it would be difficult to properly patrol the reserve, as is being done at present.

It is proposed to make Lolo Pass a trail through the reserve now used by forest rangers, a wide highway and connect with the Columbia River highway on the north and with other roads on the south. The matter was taken under consideration.

Klosterman Reduces Price

John Klosterman, owner of property at Tenth and Oak streets, needed for the extension of Oak street and which he had offered to sell to the city for \$1500, has lowered his price to \$1000, according to a petition filed yesterday with the city commissioners, asking that an immediate settlement be made and the street completed.

Recently the city offered Mr. Klosterman \$4500 for the strip, but he asked \$5000. Finally it was dropped to \$4750, but this the city refused to pay.

Police Take Examinations

Twenty-four members of the police department are today taking civil service examinations for the two vacancies existing in the position of captains. The men are being subjected both to a written and oral examination.

SKILLMAN TO BE SENT TO ASYLUM FOR INSANE

A plea that James H. Skillman, 54 years old, of 935 East Fourth street north, be sent to the insane asylum instead of prosecuted for annoying girls in the Alberta district, was received by District Attorney Evans from Skillman's brother, William Skillman, an attorney and clerk of the superior court of Thurston county, Wash., residing in Olympia. The letter stated that Skillman was born when about 12 years old, and his mind is still that of a child. Dr. Sanford Whiting examined Skillman and said he was weak mentally.

Deputy District Attorney Maguire said that Skillman would not be prosecuted if he could be sent to the asylum with provision made that he should not be paroled.

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DUAL PERSONALITY CLAIM OF OFFICERS

Say Man Was Justice of the Peace by Day and Robber at Night.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 22.—A justice of the peace by day and a robber by night is the dual personality charged against Fred Smith, former justice of the peace at Green River Hot Springs, near Seattle. Smith and four companions, one a woman, are held today by the King county authorities charged with looting freight cars at Hot Springs. Those arrested with Smith are Frank Mitchell, Jack McCarthy, Martin Auerdale and Mrs. Hallie Lucore.

Smith was arrested charged with conducting a blind pig at Hot Springs. In searching the premises where Smith was alleged to have operated, deputies Sullivan and Nelson stumbled onto a large quantity of merchandise. It was found on investigation that the goods had been stolen from Northern Pacific freight cars.

Smith will first be tried in Justice Fred Brown's court Friday on a charge of the illegal sale of liquor.

HOTEL HAS NEW NAME, NEW MANAGEMENT

Carl Stanley, Well Known Here, "Big Chief" at the Benson.

A new name was added to the list of Portland hotels today when the new Oregon hotel, known as the Benson hotel, and was taken over by a newly organized company, of which Carl Stanley is manager. For a while, at least, the Benson hotel and the Benson hotel will be run in conjunction with each other, such a time as the Benson hotel is to be opened, but the location has not yet been decided on.

E. K. Drury, formerly assistant manager of the Benson hotel, has been retained by Mr. Stanley as assistant manager. A. T. Lundborg and M. G. Hughes will be retained as room clerks. Hughes has been night clerk, Mel Diamond will also be a room clerk.

Fred Bloch, who has been chief clerk for Wright & Dickinson, will remain in that position, and will be chief clerk at the old Oregon, when it becomes a separate hostelry.

The Benson hotel is to be remodeled in many respects. The lobby is to be redecorated and the dining room made in the crystal dining and fountain grill rooms. Many more sample rooms will be equipped.

The Benson hotel is being leased from S. Benson by a company of which E. E. Covert is president; Carl Stanley, vice president and manager, and A. Benson, secretary and treasurer.

Articles of incorporation of the Benson Hotel company, capitalized at \$20,000, were filed this morning with County Clerk Coffey. A. S. Benson, E. E. Covert and Carl Stanley were the incorporators.

TRAFFIC MANAGER GOES EAST

Traffic Manager R. B. Miller, of the O. W. R. & N. company, will leave tonight for Chicago to attend the postponed session of the Transcontinental Freight bureau. He will travel in the new business car recently purchased by the company and several men will accompany him. Rearrangement of tariffs will be gone into at length at the meeting. It is probable that schedules may be revised to meet the expected water competition following the opening of the Panama canal.

LUMBER MARKET IN ALASKA

W. F. Swan of Seattle, superintendent of the Pacific Steamship company, addressed informally a gathering of lumbermen at luncheon at the Commercial club today. He touched on the possibilities for a market for Oregon lumber in Alaska when the new service is inaugurated within the next few weeks. A more general meeting will be held in a few days, when Mr. Swan will talk to men of all business lines on the new opportunity.

ORDER ROAD OPENED

Sandy, Or., Jan. 22.—The county court has ordered the opening of the Lanzensand road. This road will run three miles south between townships 4 and 5 and join the county road in the Dover district, thus proving a boon to the farmers of this vicinity.

Mr. Ross states that the club, just organized, already has a membership of 60 and is planning to join the campaign for exploiting the region tributary to it. A new club has been organized at Stayton, Or., with 100 members, which expects to affiliate with the league.

CHINESE IS SENTENCED

Yee Gueng, once found guilty of first degree murder for killing Lee Tal Hoy in March, 1908, and granted a new trial by the supreme court, pleaded guilty to manslaughter before Circuit Judge Gatens this morning and was sentenced to one to 15 years in the penitentiary. An appeal to Governor West for a pardon will be made. Yee Gueng was released about a year ago because of failing health on \$5000 bonds.

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BATTLE AT TORREON SOON TO BEGIN WITH VILLA LEADING FIGHT

Federals Massing Troops There While Rebels Hope to Have 15,000 Men Ready

El Paso, Texas, Jan. 22.—Another battle on Mexican soil as momentous as those fought recently at Tierra Blanca and Oajaca will begin within 10 days at Torreon, according to advices from Chihuahua City today. The constitutionalists troops from all parts of northern Mexico are hurrying to a rendezvous above that point, where General Pancho Villa will take personal command. Realizing that Torreon is the key to the whole territory south of the Colorado River, the federal forces are holding out well and are in a position to defend themselves against a prolonged attack.

Rebels were reported to have defeated about 2000 federalists with heavy loss near Culiacan. In Zacatecas it was understood they had captured the town of Concepcion Dolores. A force of about 60 rurales was wiped out by Zapatistas at Oriental, Puebla. Fresh rebel activity was reported near Tuxpan.

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WOMAN FIRES TWO SHOTS AT ROBBERS

Men Escape After Groceryman Sustains Wound by Bullet in Scuffle.

Two men attempted to rob the grocery store of Otto Heldobler, 750 Kilgusworth avenue, last evening, but were frightened away by the grocer's wife, who fired two shots at them. In the scuffle with the grocer, one of the robbers shot Heldobler through the left leg.

Shortly after 7 o'clock, two men entered the store and commanded Heldobler to throw up his hands. Instead of obeying the grocer reached for the robber's gun. A scuffle followed, and the three men fell to the floor. Mrs. Heldobler, who was in a rear room, heard the disturbance and ran to the front.

As she entered the store, the burglar's revolver was discharged, the bullet entering Heldobler's thigh. Both burglars struggled free from the grocer and ran. Mrs. Heldobler had seized the family pistol and fired two shots at the fleeing men, but neither took effect. One of the men lost his hat, which was later turned over to the detectives.

Motorcycle Officers Bales and Russell were detailed on the case. This morning Detectives Hellyer and Tackberry took up the search. Heldobler was not seriously wounded and is at work today.

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
