

SECOND BIG GALE OF MONTH VISITED THIS CITY DURING NIGHT

Plate Glass Windows Worst Sufferers; Crossed Wires Interfered With Lights.

Portland was last night visited by the second big wind storm of the month. A southerly breeze turned into a stiff gale early in the evening, reaching a maximum velocity of 39 miles an hour at 1:52 o'clock this morning. Trees and fences fell in its path while crossing telephone and electric light wires were responsible for many short circuits throwing some portions of the city in darkness and impairing the telephone service.

While the velocity attained by the wind last night was three miles in excess of the storm of Saturday, January 17, the amount of damage done was nearly as great. Plate glass windows were the worst sufferers. A terrific gust of wind blew out a 10 by 12 window in the show rooms of the Overland Automobile company at Sixteenth and Washington streets, while a wooden frame used by the Northwestern Electric company to cover up street excavations was driven clear through the corner of the Broadway show windows of the Wiley B. Allen Music company, corner Broadway and Morrison. The window was completely demolished, and flying bits of glass scratched and cut several persons.

Ivy Fence Is Ruined.
An awning in front of the Rose City bar, Fourteenth and Marshall, was ripped off its frame, taking part of a window with it. A sharp gust blew down the door of the Acme theatre, a motion picture place at 265 Russell street.

At the home of J. B. Morgan at the corner of East Eighth street, north, and Schuyler street, 60 feet of a beautiful ivy fence that has been standing beside the house for the past 24 years, was blown to the ground with a crash that awoke the neighborhood. Buried under the fence were many rosebushes and shrubs that were almost completely ruined.

Umbrellas were particularly hardy of last night's storm, many being telescoped and blown from the hands of those who carried them. The downtown streets at an early hour this morning were strewn with these torn and twisted rain protectors, later to be picked up and consigned to street corner refuse boxes.

Low Record for Barometer.
Last night's storm established a record for low barometric pressure, being the lowest barometer reading in 34 years. The barometer stood at 28.56 January 9, 1880, while last night it fell to 28.55.

The storm had its low pressure point in British Columbia working its way inland and back from the Oregon coast. Velocities were reported by the United States weather bureau at Tacoma, 34 miles southwest; Walla Walla, 44 miles southwest; Baker, 48 southwest; Seattle, 55 miles southwest; Tacoma, 60 miles south, and at North Head, 76 south.

A portion of the roof of the Northern Pacific Terminal company's engine house at the foot of Johnson street was blown away last night. The whole roof was torn away by the earlier storm of the month.

The Willamette is steadily rising and will reach a stage of about 13 feet above low water Wednesday.

deated a rifle over 29. According to records kept by Mr. Pratt, this is the lowest ever experienced in Oregon City since the day of the terrific wind storm which did so much damage in the winter of 1880. The reading of his barometer Sunday was identical as it was on that day.

A heavy wind storm prevailed last night, but not nearly so bad as was expected. As far as has been reported, no damage was done.

Seventy Miles at Tillamook.
Tillamook, Or., Jan. 26.—A storm is raging here and it is not probable that railway service will be resumed this month. The wind reached a velocity of 70 miles yesterday and rain fell in torrents. A concrete wall of the Tillamook creamery, just south of this city, was destroyed by the wind. It is reported that a small slide occurred near Bay City. Several tons

of mail, mostly second class, arrived here Saturday aboard the gasoline schooner Patsy. Food supplies and gasoline were also replenished at that time. For several days it had been impossible to buy butter here. All travel is by way of Willamina. This road is in fairly good repair. A bridge which was washed out near Beaver has been replaced and regular stages are being run outside. These also bring the first class mail.

Damage at Tacoma.
Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 26.—Considerable damage was done by a wind and rain storm which subsided here this forenoon after raging furiously all night. Electric light feed wires were broken down in several sections of the city and telephone and telegraph service was crippled. Awnings and signs were torn from their fastenings and other damage done.

Several small towns south of Chehalis were left in darkness last night when the wires from the Central Electric power plant were carried away. Up to 5 o'clock this morning 10.23 inches of rain had fallen so far in January. This is the heaviest fall noted here in that month since the establishment of the weather bureau. The normal precipitation for the month is 5.78.

Bridge Blown Open.
Corvallis, Or., Jan. 26.—The draw bridge across the Willamette river at this city, which is not anchored when closed, was blown open yesterday afternoon by the high wind. George Way, a Japanese student, was walking across the draw when the bridge blew open and was marooned in the middle of the river. He hailed help, which came from him after he had been on the draw long enough for his clothing to become drenched by the rain. Three men in a launch propelled to the turning pier, climbed to the bridge and cranked the draw, which is hand turned, back to its position. The county court will take immediate action to prevent another occurrence of the kind.

Umatilla Wires Down.
Umatilla, Or., Jan. 26.—A north wind covering this section has blown the great lines of telegraph and telephone lines down near this point. One line that is all but out of service carries all the train wires of the Umatilla and is so important that the Western Union will be put out of service.

Orencia in Darkness.
Orencia, Or., Jan. 26.—For the second time during the past 10 days the town is without electric light service, the wind storm of last night blowing obstructions across the lines. Just before the audience at the Presbyterian church began singing the closing hymn, there is Sunshine in My Soul today, the lights went out.

Shade Trees Suffer.
Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 26.—A strong south wind struck Vancouver at 8 o'clock last night, attaining its greatest force about 1 o'clock this morning. Shade trees suffered throughout the city and numerous signs and awnings were torn from their fastenings.

No Damage at Astoria.
Astoria, Or., Jan. 26.—Although a southwest gale raged here last night, no damage whatever is reported. The bar is rough this morning and the eight windjammers in the lower harbor were unable to get to sea. Weather conditions are improved today.

Associated Press Headquarters Here
Attempt by the Associated Press to make Seattle its news collecting and distributing center for the Pacific northwest to the exclusion of Portland, has been abandoned, and within the next few weeks the bureau abolished here July 1 last will be reestablished. The intention to restore its Portland office is said to be as much a surprise to the local members of the association as to complete outsiders.

The effort to make Seattle its headquarters has, it is said, proved not alone a costly experiment financially, but the telegraph service given Oregon and Washington papers which formerly received their reports from here has been of such character that several have deemed it advisable to discontinue their memberships.

ELECTION DATES ARE FEATURE OF DIGEST OF THE ELECTION LAWS

Secretary of State Issues Pamphlet of Use to Candidates and Others.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Jan. 26.—Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott is issuing a digest of the election laws of the state. The date of every event of the election year is prominently set out in the pamphlet, which is a handy manual for candidates and the many others in the state who wish to keep posted on election affairs.

"By the digest of the laws relating to elections," says Mr. Olcott in the preface of the pamphlet, "it is intended to specifically direct the attention of the elector, the candidate for nomination or election, and those that have to do with administering the laws, to such provisions thereof as relate to or regulate some act or prescribe some duty to be performed in connection with the nomination or election sought, or in the course of their official duties."

"For example, by examining such digest of dates relating to both the primary and general elections, electors, candidates for nomination or election to office, and public officials may ascertain within what time any act or thing required by the statute, be done or performed. Information concerning the matters relating to and to be included in candidates' petitions can also be secured from the several abstracts and statements following."

"Attention is directed to the fact that this pamphlet is not the law, but only the interpretation given to it by the compilers from the best information available. Much care has been exercised in its preparation, and it is respectfully submitted to the people of the state, in the hope that it may be of some assistance in the observance of the laws relating to elections."

Among the important dates preceding the primary election on May 15, are April 10, April 15, May 1 and May 6. April 10 is the last day for filing nominating petitions for any state or district office. These include members of the national committees of the three political parties subject to the primary laws, United States senators, congressmen in the Tenth and Twelfth districts; governor, state treasurer, justices of the supreme court, attorney general, state school superintendent, railroad commissioner at large, superintendents of water divisions one and two; judges of circuit courts, department four, Multnomah county, and in the Tenth and Twelfth judicial districts; district attorney in Union county; state senators in the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Sixth, Ninth, Tenth, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-third senatorial districts, and representatives in the legislative assembly in all districts.

This is also the last day on which candidates may file portraits and statements in their favor, or on which opposing arguments may be filed for publication in the campaign pamphlet.

April 15 is the last day on which nominating petitions may be filed with the county clerk for county or precinct offices.

May 1 is the day the registration books must close, according to an opinion of the attorney general.

May 6 is the last day on which the secretary of state shall forward copies of the election pamphlet to registered voters.

Orencia, Or., Jan. 26.—Prima, the 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bishop, who reside about a mile south of town, died Saturday night from a complication of measles and tonsillitis. This is the second victim from measles since the epidemic started.

NAVAL OFFICERS SHINE AS JUNGLE ANIMALS IN GREAT SOCIETY CIRCUS

Vallejo Scene of Merry Romp in Which Donovan Home Is Turned Into Tent.

San Francisco, Jan. 26.—From the days of P. T. Barnum down to the latest side-ring attraction there has never been presented a circus more thrilling and entertaining than the show staged Saturday night at the home of Lieutenant and Mrs. Kirkwood Donovan in Vallejo. Dignified naval officers grewled at spectators from beneath the hides that disguised them as polar bears and Numidian lions. Lieutenant Commander L. S. Shattley, as the champion fat woman, sat on the customary platform in the side show and sold photographs. Lieutenant Commander F. D. Karna was a trained elephant, led by a keeper, and Mrs. Karna, with Mrs. A. B. Owens, Miss Owens and Mrs. J. D. Jones were participants in a Gypsy dance that proved one of the most fascinating features of the evening.

The circus was held in the two great parlors of the Donovan home, and each was fitted up as a circus ring, covered with sawdust and surrounded by ropes. The spectators, including scores of guests prominent in San Francisco, Oakland and Vallejo, sat on the seats or on regulation circus benches, while pretty maids sold peanuts, popcorn and pink lemonade. Glaring circus posters of gymnasts and showgirls and the navy uniform for pink silk tights, in which he appeared in an exciting series of bicycle tricks. Captain W. M. Crose was ringmaster, and to the crack of his pistol the circus commenced. Captain and Mrs. Donovan, and I. H. MAYOR TO PUT STOP TO CABARET SHOWS

Order to Take Form of Request; Grills Will Probably Acquiesce.

In an endeavor to bring about the discontinuance of every cabaret show in the city, Mayor Albee will take action this week and set a date when all such performances are to stop. This is in conformance with plans formulated before the first of the year, when he issued an order that all performers should confine their exhibitions to a stage.

It is unlikely that the mayor will take any formal action other than requesting the proprietors of the places to discontinue the acts. If his request is not complied with, the council, at the mayor's suggestion, may take action, but Mayor Albee believes that this will not be necessary.

Some of the proprietors are questioning the mayor's power to have them put a stop to the shows, while others are in favor of complying with the request.

When the mayor issued the order to proprietors that the performers would have to confine their activities to a stage, he also told them that it would be a matter of only short time when he would ask that all performances be discontinued and orchestras substituted. Several of the places have already made arrangements for musical programs by orchestras, while others are waiting to see what action the mayor will take if they refuse to comply with his request.
