NEW STOCKYARDS AT THE DALLES, OR.

The Dalles, Or., Jan. 28.—D. P. Ketchum & Son, sheep growers of Wasco county, have a crew of men erecting new stock yards in the eastern part of the city. The ground was leased from the O. W. R. & N. Co. and includes five acres. This will be enclosed and divided into sections. Two feed barns will be constructed, about 25,000 feet of lumber being required for the entire work. The yards when completed will be modern in every particular and will accommodate 1800 sheep.

CHAMBERLAIN'S BILL WOULD GIVE OREGON PERMANENT FOREST

Provides That State Can Exchange Lands in National Forests for Compact Body.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)

Washington, Jan. 28.—Senator Chamberlain's bill for the exchange by the United States government with the state of Oregon of certain school lands and indemnity rights within the national forests of that state for an equal area of national forest land, provides that the state of Oregon is authorized to select, with the approval of the secretary of agriculture, a compact body of not to exceed 40,000 acres of unappropriated non-mineral land, within townships 10 and 11, ranges 6 and 6 east, Willamette meridian, in the Santiam national forest, to be maintained as a state forest to secure its highest permanent usefulness to the state of Oregon and particularly to the common schools to which its resources are devoted and to state forestry demonstration and education and the secretary of the interior is hereby authorized to grant and convey said selection to the state of Oregon for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned.

Section two of the bill provides further: "That in exchange for the selected lands the state shall reconvey and relinquish title to an approximately equal area of unencumbered sections 16 and 36, or parts thereof, of substantial farm values satisfactory to the secretary of agriculture, within the national forests of Oregon, granted to said state, or indemnity rights within such national forests to which the state is entitled; provided, that the lands reconveyed and relinquished as base lands shall immediately become parts of the national forest in which they are situated."

In section three it is provided that the lands conveyed to the state shall be at all times subject to use by the United States for the construction, maintenance and operation of roads, trails, telephone or telegraph lines, or for any other purpose of the contiguous national forest area.

BIGGS-WASCO ROAD TO GIVE WORK TO MANY

Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—To help relieve the unemployed situation in the state, the state highway commission yesterday afternoon decided to build a road between Biggs and Wasco, in Sherman county, where the climatic and soil conditions will permit the employment of a large crew of men to good advantage. Bids will be opened a week from Saturday, and it is expected the contract will have 100 or 400 men on the job by the middle of February.

Activities at Sandy.

Sandy, Or., Jan. 28.—John Affalter has purchased 40 acres near Sandy and intends to locate on it in the spring. Three sawmills in this vicinity are operating again, giving a number of men employment. The Mt. Hood Fruit Growers Association will hold a meeting in Mein's hall Saturday, January 30, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of circulating petitions for the signatures of the voters asking that the county vote at the primary elections this spring, on a bond issue of \$60,000 for the purpose of building roads in the county. "Go to Church Day."

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 28.—Sunday, February 1, will be "Go to Church Sunday" in Pendleton, the local Protestant ministers having joined in asking for such an observance. This announcement is carrying out the movement launched in Chicago some weeks ago, the idea being to have at least one Sunday in the year when everybody will attend church, regardless of whether or not he or she is a member.

Centralia, Wash., Jan. 28.—The Canadian Homestead company, which has been offering to settle prospective homesteaders on Canadian lands for \$25, and which is alleged to be a swindle, operated an office in Centralia until two weeks ago. The local office was opened by George P. Rossman of Seattle.

J. M. EDWARDS WAS CIVIL WAR VETERAN



Cathlamet, Wash., Jan. 28.—Funeral services for J. M. Edwards, a well known resident of this place, were held at the Congregational church. Mr. Edwards had been a sufferer from heart trouble for several years. He was the son of his father, Mr. N. B. Thornton, of Sumner, Wash., January 21.

Mr. Edwards was born June 18, 1837, at Lincoln, Ill. He enlisted in company C, One Hundred and Sixth Illinois regiment, in 1863, and served until the war closed. In October, 1865, he married Susan Chenoweth, who died at her home here in 1902. To them were born eight children, five of whom are living. In 1882 he came to Washington, and in 1894 he came to Cathlamet, where he has resided ever since. Mr. Edwards was a member of the legislature in 1886, and has always taken an active part in politics and local affairs. In 1906 he married Mrs. Elva Barber, who died in June, 1913.

I'LL NAME PRESIDENT OF MEXICO, DEFIANCE HURLED BY CARRANZA

U. S. Need Expect No Favor From Him, He Says, Because of Arms Embargo.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Culcan, Sonora, Mexico, Jan. 28.—"If there is to be a provisional president in Mexico I shall name him." This declaration was the outstanding feature of a public address yesterday by General Venustiano Carranza, leader of the Mexican constitutionalists. Three thousand persons heard the general make his first public remarks since leaving the American border, where he conferred with William Bayard Hale.

Carranza broadly intimated that Americans suffering financial loss in Mexico cannot expect reparation if the constitutionalists are victorious. He charged that the American government has needlessly prolonged the present struggle, causing heavy and unnecessary loss of life, and that, as a result, they should not expect unusual consideration from his party. Regarding the proposal that a new provisional president acceptable to all Mexican factions be named until permanent government may be established, Carranza, after declaring his position, added: "Governments and individuals have been ready always with suggestions as to the conduct of affairs in Mexico, but never ready with the tangible aid they might give. I shall wage a war of extermination upon the Huerta forces. Our success is inevitable, and, therefore, I shall listen to no peace program."

TRANSATLANTIC RATES CUT BY RIVAL LINES

London, Jan. 28.—The rate war promised as the result of the dissolution of the trans-Atlantic pool, materialized when the Cunard and White Star steamship lines announced reductions. Eastbound rates are lowered \$4 and westbound \$1.50 to meet the new schedule announced by the Hamburg-American line.

NEW SCENIC ROAD PETITIONS CIRCULATED

Proposed Highway Will Run Down North Bank of the Sandy River.

Wilson Ross Winans, of Winans City, Hood River county, is in Portland today in the interest of a petition to Chief Forester Henry S. Graves, which he fathered, asking for the immediate construction of a road from Hood River to join with the Portland and Salem and all the Willamette valley roads.

The route proposed is a trail that has already been graded six feet wide on not more than a five per cent grade without bridges, leading from Hood River Valley via the Wallula Pass across the Cascade mountains. The road is to wind down the north fork of the Sandy river, and it is declared by those backing the project that the route through the Bull Run reserve is in such a location as not to interfere with nor contaminate in any way the water supply of Portland.

When the state completes the road up the Columbia river, auto tourists will be able to make a complete loop from Portland through Hood River Valley, making part of the trip at river level and the other part above the clouds.

"The forest officials are in favor of opening the road and the petition is to meet the contention of some of the opponents who claim it would contaminate the Bull Run water supply," said Mr. Winans this morning. "There is a big water shed between the road and the water supply that would make it impossible for any drainage from the road to get into the river."

Mr. Winans will send the first installment of the petition, which has been signed by 280 business men of Hood River, to Congressman N. J. Sinnott tonight, who will take it to Forester Graves. Copies have been left at leading hotels for signatures and Mr. Winans will go to Salem tonight in connection with his work.
