

TREASURY SECRETARY SPEAKS IN PRAISE OF GEO. E. CHAMBERLAIN

Alaska Railroad Bill Declared by Cabinet Officer to Be Great Piece of Legislation.

William G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, in a short interview with Milton A. Miller, collector of internal revenue, and Thomas A. Burke, collector of customs, in the private car National, this morning, highly commended United States Senator George E. Chamberlain on the passage of the Alaska railroad bill.

"The Alaska railroad bill, I regard as a great piece of legislation," declared Mr. McAdoo. "I take it to be one of the big things that the administration will be remembered by. That I will prove a very special benefit to the great northwest, I have no doubt. Senator George Chamberlain of Oregon, I understand, was behind the measure, and it is certainly a great compliment to him," the secretary asserted.

"Since I have been in the northwest, I have been very much impressed with the possibilities of great future development. The chances that have taken place since I was last here are marvelous."

Both had met McAdoo, Miller and Burke boarded the car 10 minutes before the secretary was ready to leave it and meet the official reception committee. Both had met Mr. McAdoo at the Baltimore convention, and Miller and Burke had met the secretary of the treasury at New York.

As they stepped into the reception room at the back of the car, the secretary advanced to meet them and Mr. McAdoo recognized them both instantly and greeted them by their names. The Portland men were somewhat taken aback by the greeting, claiming no readily and cordially, in account of their previous acquaintance with Mr. McAdoo, most of the conversation passed between him and these two Portland men.

In commenting on the trip, Mr. McAdoo said the journey had been very hard on both members of the cabinet committee. He expressed the desire to walk down to the room.

He wanted to get out and break away from the "grind" for a while, he said, and indicated that he would like to take a little rest.

Spoke at Gratifying.

"The administration is certainly meeting with the approval of the people," remarked Miller.

The secretary replied that he had noticed that wherever he had gone and was especially gratified with the spirit. The good work, Mr. McAdoo said, would continue.

Miller especially congratulated him on his financial policy.

Secretary David Francis Houston of the department of agriculture, the other member of the committee, remarked that this was his first trip to the northwest, and he said that he was quite enthusiastic over it.

"The hospitality of our northwestern people has been so great that it has been almost impossible to keep up under it," asserted Mr. Houston.

Secretary McAdoo remarked that he wanted to give some time to his daughter, Miss Nona McAdoo, who is a member of the party, this afternoon. I have been so busy that I have been almost neglecting her since the trip started," he said.

young man, having just passed his fortieth birthday. He is perhaps the youngest man that ever occupied the important post of speaker of the Oregon house of representatives, having been elected to preside over that body in 1903 when he was 29 years old. He is also one of the youngest circuit judges that Oregon has known—Governor Chamberlain having appointed him in 1905 after the legislature had created an additional judge in the Lane county district. In 1906 Judge Harris was nominated and elected judge without opposition, in fact, with the nomination of both the Democratic and Republican parties. In 1912 he was again elected without opposition and was again the nominee of both political parties.

Judge Harris is a native Oregonian. He was born at Albany, Linn county, in 1874 of pioneer parents. He graduated from the University of Oregon in 1898, before he was 20 years of age. Three years later he took the degree of bachelor of laws at the University of Michigan. Returning to Eugene he immediately commenced the practice of law. Soon afterwards he was appointed deputy district attorney for Lane county, which was filled until his first election to the legislature in 1900. In 1902 he was again elected to the legislature and was chosen speaker of the house in January, 1903. He took an active part in the important legislation of that session, especially in behalf of the measure to reduce the railroad tax in this state from four cents to three cents a mile. This bill failed but the railroad soon thereafter voluntarily made the reduction. He introduced a bill taxing the gross earnings of such corporations as the Standard Oil and Pullman company. He introduced a bill to alleviate the condition before the law of the workmen of Oregon. While both these bills were defeated, the people have since put on the statute books identical legislation.

Judge Harris has the unique distinction of having had his charge to the jury in a personal injury case incorporated in a decision handed down by the supreme court in deciding the case on appeal. Judge King wrote the opinion and thought so well of Judge Harris' charge to the jury that he quoted it. Among the jurymen of the case, Judge Harris is regarded as one of the best trial judges in Oregon. He has a splendid record before the supreme court, having suffered small percentage of reversals.

Adams Goes to Tacoma.

A. C. Adams, who has just resigned as superintendent of motive power of the North Bank lines, has taken himself with the Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power company, in the capacity of master mechanic at Tacoma. It was said today that Adams is now on the sound but will return tonight for the transfer of his office to John Dickson, general master mechanic, under the reorganization.

E. Henry Wemme Becomes Owner; New Articles Are Filed.

Resolutions passed by the Wemme Investment company reducing the capital stock of the concern from \$1,000,000 to \$100,000 and declaring a dividend which transfers title to a quarter block at Broadway and Oak streets to E. Henry Wemme, president and principal stockholder of the company, were filed with County Clerk Coffey. Supplementary articles of incorporation of the E. C. Barnes company, increasing the capital stock from \$100,000 to \$150,000, were also filed. The Lewiston-Sweetwater Irrigation company, operating a number of irrigating ditches in Nez Perce county, Idaho, filed supplementary articles increasing the powers of the company. Amended articles increasing the powers of Beal & Co. and also of A. Eastman, Frank McCallis and J. A. Pateneau, incorporators.

HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF LANGUAGES NAMED

Dr. A. P. McKinlay Chosen by Board to Position in Lincoln High School.

Dr. A. P. McKinlay, a former teacher in the Lincoln high school, was elected head of a newly created department of languages at the same school by the board of directors at a meeting last night. He will receive a salary of \$2,200 a year, and will have supervision of all languages taught in the school. Miss Jessie English, head of the department of English of that school, has been asked to resign which was accepted to take effect at the end of the present term.

A two year course in commercial studies and stenography was added at the Jefferson high school to give students who do not desire the four year course an opportunity to complete their work sooner. As far as possible the two year course will be added in the other high schools.

The end of the term "pupil teacher" was marked when nine pupil teachers were given regular berths and five other were made substitutes with regular salaries. No more remain to be assigned to regular or substitute work as that class of teachers has been abolished. TIMBER DEALER IS PUT UNDER ARREST

George Sorenson, timber dealer, was arrested this morning by Detective Swenness at Fifth and Main streets on a warrant issued in the district court. The warrant is based on a complaint made and filed by Fred M. Clark of 451 Washington street, in which Sorenson is alleged to have accepted \$400 from Clark several months ago to locate a timber claim for him but failed to do so. Sorenson is in the county jail.

It is alleged that the money was received by Sorenson as a first payment to be made on some school lands which he was to secure for Clark but that the money was pocketed by Sorenson instead of applied to the land payment. Sorenson is at present under indictment on a similar charge brought by Charles Dierke who alleged that Sorenson secured \$300 from him as a first payment and used the money for private purposes.

Slight Decrease in Clearings.

SLOVER HEARING WILL BE COMMENCED IN CITY HALL TOMORROW

Mayor Albee and Ex-Mayor Rushlight Are Among Witnesses for Accused.

Mayor H. R. Albee, ex-Mayor A. G. Rushlight and 43 other witnesses, are to be heard before the municipal civil service board meeting in the city hall at 1:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon in the appeal case of E. A. Slover, discharged captain of police, who was formerly acting chief of the department.

Both Mayor Albee and ex-Mayor Rushlight are to be witnesses for Slover, although Mayor Albee is responsible for the former acting chief's dismissal. There will be 27 other witnesses appear in Slover's behalf, while the city will have only 14 witnesses.

Benbow, former deputy city attorney; Miss M. C. White, Cliff Maddux, Charles Backey, C. Glantz, George Thatcher, a member of the old vice commission; Fred McNeil, Jack Reavis and Grant Kellogg.

In several instances both sides have the same witnesses subpoenaed.

ACTION ON LINE IS DELAYED

Council Postpones Matter of Cross-Town Service.

Once again action on the proposed cross-town car line franchise of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, has been postponed and will not come before the council again until the first meeting in March. The franchise has been pending for months and it was proposed to build the line this spring.

Action was postponed this morning to allow those who were opposed to the routing on Halsey street from the East Twenty-eighth street bridge, to learn what could be done toward the purchase of corner property at East Twenty-eighth and Halsey in order to eliminate curves if the tracks should be laid on Twenty-eighth to Broadway.

CITY TO BID ON HYDRANTS

Purchasing Agent Wood Will Be Competitor.

That the city in its municipal workshop can build fire hydrants as cheap as outside concerns, is the statement of Purchasing Agent Wood, who is to bid along with the other manufacturers on 600 fire hydrants for the city during the coming summer.

The bids for the hydrants will be opened tomorrow and Superintendent Phillips in charge of the shop, believes that the city will secure a part of the contract. Should the contract be captured, the profit will revert to the shop fund.

WILL MAKE OFFER OF \$40,000

Ordinance for Purchase of Klosterman Piece Introduced.

By the terms of an ordinance introduced before the city council this morning, John Klosterman, owner of a piece of property consisting of approximately 160 square feet at Tenth and Oak streets, is to be offered \$40,000 for the strip by the city. This is \$1500 less than the price asked by Mr. Klosterman.

When negotiations between the city and Mr. Klosterman started he agreed to sell the property to the city for \$47,500. An ordinance authorizing the purchase for this amount was introduced before the council, but met defeat. Later Mr. Klosterman offered the piece for \$47,000.

Should the new ordinance pass, Mr. Klosterman will receive \$15,000 and will have to pay the taxes for 1914. If the purchase is made, \$500 is to be retained by the city and 60 days allowed Mr. Klosterman to remove existing buildings. At the end of that time if the buildings are not removed the city is to keep the \$500 and take control of both the property and the buildings.

This property is at the present head of Oak street, and is needed in the extension of the street to Burnside. Of the amount, it is proposed to pay \$35,000 from the Oak street extension fund and \$10,500 from the general fund.

UNEMPLOYED TO BE OUT OF WORK SOON

Terwilliger Boulevard Rockpile Has About Served Its Purpose.

According to an announcement made at the city council meeting this morning after this week there will be no further employment on the Terwilliger boulevard rockpile, which has been maintained to provide work for the unemployed. It was thought that the work would continue until Tuesday, but Commissioner Brewster says that the city now has on hand more rock than can be used during the ensuing year.

Just what is to be done after this week in providing for those quartered at the Gipsy Smith auditorium is a matter of conjecture. It is hoped by the city officials that work can be provided at wood chipping.

Commissioner Brewster suggested this new work and was authorized by Mayor Albee to see what could be done in securing work for the men in this line. Attempts are to be made to have those who own timbered property to get in communication with the members of the city commission as soon as possible.

For the rock breaking work alone, according to Commissioner Brewster, the city has expended \$7250 for salaries and \$1000 for overhead expenses. Most of this work has been done by those who are now making their home in the Gipsy Smith auditorium, which the city is also maintaining for their benefit.

LOOKS FOR INFLUX OF SETTLERS FROM EAST

Fred W. Graham, Industrial Agents, Receives Many Inquiries.

Prospects for immigration to the northwest never were better than right now, today declared Fred W. Graham, general western immigration agent of the Great Northern railway, who arrived from Seattle in company with M. J. Costello, assistant freight traffic manager, and C. W. Meldrum, assistant general passenger agent.

"My office is receiving daily letters by the dozen inquiring for locations in the northwest," said Mr. Graham. "Some are from men with ample means who seek to locate new industries; others are from farmers who are looking for fruitful ranches, there are letters from men of no means, too, who ask about the prospects for labor. Whatever else it may mean, it shows that the eyes of the nation are on this section and that the time is ripe for the opening of the Panama canal and the crowding of people west to the San Francisco fair, we will see such a throng of homeseekers as we hardly dreamed of."

"Another thing these inquiries show is that people are willing to find homes in a new land. That looks to me like a restoration of confidence—the only thing needed now to put business on its feet."

Mr. Costello and Mr. Meldrum are here on routine business and Mr. Graham accompanied them partly to hear the regional bank arguments and partly to look up further data for the information of correspondents.

Little Delay in Traffic.

Report received today by General Superintendent D. W. Campbell, of the Southern Pacific's northern district, show that, despite high water troubles in the southern district, trains between here and San Francisco are practically on time. In the last two days only one passenger train was delayed, the cause being the puncturing of an air hose on a freight train which set the brakes and broke the train in two. This trick Mr. Campbell attributes to malicious idlers. Mr. Campbell has received no intimation of the plans of the operating heads of the company with regard to any reorganization that may follow the resignation of Vice President E. E. Calvin.

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MAIL CARRIER GIVES TESTIMONY THAT MAY CAUSE HIS CONVICTION

Star Witness in Federal Court Trial, W. M. Chandler, Now Faces Serious Trouble.

Coming as the star witness before the federal grand jury investigating the case of Eugene Saxton, charged with defrauding through the mails, W. M. Chandler, a star route mail carrier of Tule Lake, Klamath county, made such admissions that he was arrested on instructions of Assistant United States Attorney Johnson Tuesday night as the culprit. Saxton will probably be released shortly.

The arrest was kept secret so that friends of Chandler would have no chance to make away with evidence. Deputy United States Marshal Fuller and Postoffice Inspector Durand left for Tule Lake Tuesday night to go through the papers that might be found in Chandler's home.

Saxton was kept in the Klamath county jail for six months, the district attorney of Klamath county failing to present his case to two grand juries that sat in that district. Government officers, following the grand jury investigation here, state that Saxton is a victim of mistaken identity.

Letters bearing the name "Saxton, Eugene" were sent from Tule Lake during the first six months of 1913 to various banks of the northwest, containing promissory notes, later proven to be forgeries and which the sender wanted to discount. The notes were in favor of the First Trust & Savings bank of Klamath Falls.

Officers of Klamath county, on hearing the complaint, investigated, and found no Mrs. Hunthorne. About that time the letters ceased going out. Eugene Saxton, itinerant barber and horse doctor, drifted into the county at that time, and was arrested.

Laying in jail without any action being taken in his case, he appealed to friends broadcast over the country, to Socialists and to Governor West, with the result that the prosecuting attorney of Klamath county got busy. He was not indicted there, but feeling that a mail fraud case existed, it was turned over to the government and Saxton was arrested three weeks ago by federal officers.
