

THIRTY-ONE SENATORS ARE TO BE ELECTED BY THE VARIOUS STATES

Most of the Retiring Ones Seek Reelection; Progressives Cause Uncertainty.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 30.—The United States senate is so organized that at no one time can a majority of its members, or more than the third, in fact go out of office. It is a continuing body in more senses than one. Not only is its membership fixed for long terms, but with every new Congress it begins business as if it had left off only the day before although eight months may intervene between the sessions.

Regular senatorial terms expire on the fourth of March, which ends the first or "short" term of every congress. One year from next March, when Congress will suspend its sessions until December, thirty-one of the ninety-six senators would retire to private life, unless they had been re-elected meantime. Most of the thirty-one want to come back and several of them do not know whether they can.

The outgoing list, which numbers seventeen republicans and fourteen democrats, is as follows: Marcus A. Smith, democrat, Arizona; James P. Clarke, democrat, Arkansas; George C. Bradley, republican, Kentucky; John R. Thornton, democrat, Louisiana; John Walter Smith, democrat, Maryland; William J. Stone, democrat, Missouri; Francis G. Newlands, democrat, Nevada; Jacob H. Gallinger, republican, New Hampshire; Elihu Root, republican, New York; Lee S. Overman, democrat, North Carolina; Asie J. Gordon, republican, North Dakota; Theodore E. Burton, republican, Ohio; Thomas P. Gore, democrat, Oklahoma; George E. Chamberlain, democrat, Oregon; Eyles Penrose, republican, Pennsylvania; Ellison D. Smith, democrat, South Carolina; C. I. Crawford, republican, South Dakota; Reed Smoot, republican, Utah; William P. Dillingham, republican, Vermont; Wesley L. Jones, republican, Washington; Isaac Stephenson, republican, Wisconsin.

Very few of those in the above list have any assurance that they will be members of the upper house after March 4, 1915. Gallinger of New Hampshire, who is the ranking member of the senate, has not announced whether he intends to be a candidate for reelection, though the presumption is that he will try for another term.

Neither Stephenson of Wisconsin nor Perkins of California, two of the oldest members in years, will seek reelection. In both states the fight has already begun for their successors.

Penrose of Pennsylvania will have a hard fight on his hands and so will Root of New York, if he decides to be a candidate. Senator Bristow of Kansas would like to know what will happen to him. In his case the progressives, with Victor Murdock as their candidate, are the real menace. Bristow wavered between the two parties for a long time, but finally came out with the announcement that he would stand for reelection as a republican.

Kentucky is expected to send a democrat to the senate to succeed Bradley, republican. The choice will be made in a general primary, with Governor McCreary, former Governor Beckham and Representative Stanley as the contestants.

Hoke Smith of Georgia, who is filling the unexpired term of the late Senator Clay, must go before the people this year for the regular term. Should Governor Slaters or ex-Governor Brown enter the race it would mean a renewal of the old political warfare in Georgia, with the results very much up in the air.

Alabama is in the heat of a bitter fight for the seat of the late Senator Johnston, to which Congressman Clayton was appointed by the governor. Clayton would like to retain the seat, but the real fight is believed to be between Representatives Underwood and Hobson. The contest will be settled in the primary this spring.

Crawford of South Dakota has opposition for reelection in several other progressive republicans. Conditions in Ohio are shaping for a hot contest for the seat of Senator Burton. Democrats, republicans and progressives will put up a hard fight. Overman of

North Carolina will have opposition in his own party, and so will Stone of Missouri. Several of the democratic senators from the south are virtually the only ones on the list who can look forward to reelection with anything approaching confidence. The republicans naturally are more nervous over their political future, for they must face a divided party in almost every state, and while some signs of reunion have been noted in many places, nevertheless the power of the progressives to defeat if not to elect is conceded over a large political area.

URGE "EXPERT" PLAN IN BAKER COUNTY

Baker, Or., Jan. 30.—H. T. French, state leader of the agricultural extension work of the Oregon Agricultural college, and C. L. Smith, the agricultural expert of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, have closed a week's campaign in Baker county in the interest of an appropriation by the Baker county court for hiring a county expert or agricultural field agent, under the law providing for a state fund for this purpose, by the terms of which the county must appropriate one half. It has been proposed that Baker and Grant counties form a district, sharing jointly the expense of an agent for the two counties.

Grant county's commissioners have appropriated their share, \$750, and Baker county is asked for \$1250. The state would appropriate \$2000, giving a total of \$4000 annually for the purpose. The county court of this county, acting on the petitions from many of the ranchers, did not make the appropriation at the last term, but agreed to give those promoting the project time to convert the opponents. To this end, Professor French and Mr. Smith have held many meetings with the farmers in the various sections of the county, and it is believed have won over many supporters to the plan. The matter will probably be up to the county court for final action at the February session.

Railroad has found no use for snow plows

Ready for the emergency that has not yet arisen, General Superintendent M. J. Buckley of the O.-W. R. & N. has the big snow plows all steamed up for service in the mountains. They stand, like fire engines, waiting for the alarm.

"This is almost the first winter in history that we haven't had to dig out some of our mountain lines," said Mr. Buckley today. "Talk about your open winter, this beats every record."

Mr. Buckley had his fingers crossed when he spoke, and said he is watching the daily weather reports with intense scrutiny.

"You never can tell about the mountain drifts," he continued. "This year the snow, while fairly plentiful, has not been piling up and we have been able to keep the tracks clear almost without any delay from that cause."

Roasting Ears in Los Angeles. Los Angeles, Jan. 30.—Roasting ears appeared here today, breaking early season records. They came from the Imperial valley and sold for 75 cents a dozen.

GOVERNOR INSISTS THAT CRAWFORD SUE

Brother-in-Law Must Return Fee Paid in Title Guarantee Case.

Salem, Or., Jan. 30.—Governor West informs Attorney General Crawford, in a letter written yesterday, that he cannot find that Governor Chamberlain had anything to do with Crawford's employment of his brother-in-law, E. B. Watson, as special attorney in the Title Guarantee & Trust company's investigation, and for the third time the governor requests Crawford to bring suit to recover the fee of \$500 paid Watson. The governor's letter says:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the twenty-sixth instant, in reference to bringing suit to recover the \$500 fee paid your brother-in-law, E. B. Watson, as special counsel, and to say that I do not find that Governor Chamberlain had anything, whatever, to do with his employment, but that he was loaded on to the state by your office first, because he was a member of the family and next, because he was attorney for parties suing the Title Guarantee & Trust company, and it was undoubtedly thought that in securing the state job for him he would gather inside information which would

prove advantageous in the prosecution of the said private suit.

I note your suggestion that I have some attorney in whom I have confidence bring this action, and in case he recovers that you will pay the fee, but in case he fails that they shall be paid by me.

I can see no reason why I should be called upon to assume any liability in this matter. You have always insisted that the law plainly requires that the attorney general appear and represent the state in all such suits and the supreme court has so held. I will therefore, have to insist that you bring this suit in accordance with my previous request.

PLAN BIG FEATURES FOR BAKER FAIR

Baker, Or., Jan. 30.—The Baker county fair board for 1914 at its first meeting Tuesday decided that two important features of this year's event will be the school children's industrial exhibit, under the new plan of State Superintendent Churchill, and the livestock display. County School Superintendent J. F. Smith has been named as chairman of the committee to have charge of the first event and President William Doby of the Baker Packing company will head the livestock committee. This latter branch has been somewhat neglected by the fair in the last few years, but as the dairy industry is growing and the cattle business is also on the gain, since the possibility of use of government lands for grazing, the industry is of growing importance to this section of eastern Oregon. J. H. Baisley, a prominent rancher of the Baker valley, has been named as the head of the agricultural committee.

COMMISSION MEN TO BE PROSECUTED

Criminal Actions Ordered by Railroad Commission Against Delinquents.

Salem, Or., Jan. 30.—Instructions to institute criminal prosecutions against all the commission merchants doing business in this state without complying with the law enacted by the last legislature regulating their business have been sent out by the state railroad commission to 10 district attorneys in the state in the counties of Multnomah, Marion, Umatilla, Josephine, Clatsop, Wasco, Linn, Baker, Jackson and Lane. Only one association or firm in the state has complied with the law.

The law provides that persons or firms doing a commission business must obtain a license from the state railroad commission, must put up a bond for the protection of those who consign produce to them, must make weekly reports and remittances to consignors, and in other ways conduct their business in a manner intended to protect the producers.

Suit was brought in Multnomah county to enjoin the railroad commission from enforcing the law, but the lower court held against the commission merchants, and the case was appealed to the supreme court, where it is now pending.
