Electric Men to Meet.—The February meeting of the Portland section of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers and the National Electric Light Association will be held Tuesday day at 8 o'clock at the Hawthorne building, East water and Hawthorne. R. L. Hazra will present a paper on new and proposed regulations affecting water power development. C. N. Huggins, secretary and treasurer of the P. R. L. & P. company will discuss a paper by R. D. McMahon on "Some Things Engineers Should Know Concerning the Rudiments of Corporate Finance."

Delighted With School.—Ralph Hubbard, son of Elbertus Hubbard, or "a cub of the Franks," as he puts it, was an interested visitor at the Laid school several weeks ago and from Gold Hill, Or., he wrote a letter of appreciation to Principal C. M. Kiggins on the hospitality shown, on the joyful willingness of everybody and on the "rhythmic, frictionless movement by which the daily program progressed." He said that the atmosphere of the school was sweet, homelike and practical.

Brings Suit for Damages.—Claming damages of \$250 because the Perkins Hotel company has taken possession of the office fixtures belonging to the Republican club and to himself, Charles E. Lockwood yesterday filed suit in the district court to recover the furniture and books, valued at \$250, and to collect the damages. Lockwood said in the complaint that the paraphernalia is being held because the hotel company claims an account of \$193 against the club and himself, as secretary.

One Day To Be Saved.—On the theory that a day saved is a day earned, the schools will not as formerly convene one week from Monday morning for the sole purpose of handing out book lists for the coming year. Instead the entire day will be utilized in organization of classes that regular work may be started the following day. The book lists will be given out this coming Wednesday when the cards for the term just ending are distributed and the pupils will be given until Monday to purchase their books.

How To Out Meet.—Actual demonstration of the science of cutting meals has been made one of the features of the domestic science classes of the night schools. Monday night the class from Jefferson school spent the evening at a large market, where the members were taught how to cut meat and what not to do. The Lincoln high school class witnessed a similar demonstration some days ago.

Watchman Improving.—T. J. Healy, special watchman on Portland Heights, shot Tuesday night by Louis Stros, a prowler, who was also shot by the watchman, is being held at the St. Vincent hospital. The condition of Stros is still serious. The second prowler with Stros has not been captured.

Lost Money, Takes Life.—Dominico Gargia, an Italian laborer, committed suicide last night by taking an overdose of carbolic acid. Dependancy over losing \$240 from his room early this

month is considered the cause of the act. The person guilty of taking the money was never found.

Mr. Forging Is Heard.—Portland, Jan. 29.—To the Editor of The Journal—Yesterday's Journal honors me too highly, and at the same time makes me say things I had no thought of saying. I am not a public servant on a salary. I never pretended to be an expert penman and see no reason for being credited with a clerkship. A year ago I did assist the county assessor in the outside work and for a few months was a deputy.

At the preliminary meeting for organizing a Republican club, no resolution was offered by me. I did not ask or seek to have the club endorse one or any number of candidates. I did not suggest that the Republican party would not be likely to give any candidate for governor of Oregon a large enough vote to make him appear to be a real choice of the party if the primary vote was divided among a large number of candidates, each drawing the voter some clue as to whom he might support and not waste his vote. I urged that a system of clubs be organized and steps be taken to secure a test vote permitting a first, second and third choice for governor, and let the result be known, not to bind any club or any voter as to his duty but to throw light on the real strength of candidates, so that a voter need not waste his vote if his first choice proved to be weak, and on the other hand, that he should not be deceived into deserting a friend who has real strength. Believing as I do that the plan would tend to unite the party, I expect the opposition of all Democrats or men of other parties whose ideas of honor and integrity are not in the past to meddle with Republican primaries in order to nominate a man whom they hope to defeat in election. I shall not be surprised at opposition from The Journal, which usually gives more space to creating Republican confusion than it finds necessary to devote to Democratic harmony. I can forgive such strategy and regard with complacency the opposition of a known enemy as a genuine compliment, but I object to any wilful or mistaken misrepresentation, and in the face of the misstatement that "I sought to have the club select a candidate for every office," I ask that you give to my claims the publicity that you have given to belittle me in the esteem of your readers. Now let us be honest. If any healthy man can't earn enough in seven months to feed himself the next five months, he surely should go without. If a man who has no wife nor children to support can't provide for himself alone, the state is better off without him. W. J. GARRISON.

By American workingman I mean Irish, English, Scotch, Norwegians, Swedes, Bohemians, Germans, French, Canadians, etc., native or foreign born, who make their homes in Uncle Sam's country and

blow or invest their earnings here.

Company and contract camps have some responsible employes at dining room doors which makes it impossible for outsiders to secure meals. Contractors are good judges of human nature. It is hard work for easy marks to get started in the contracting game in the United States. Possibly A. M. R. will start contracting in some foreign land, but if he decides to do contracting in the United States, won't he please give us Americans a tryout? I would suggest that he contract some difficult team work and get foreigners for "skinner."
