EDUCATION'S ADVANCE AGAINST VICE IS TOLD

Dr. Calvin S. White Declares Work Accomplished Has Been Remarkable.

"The law gives power to place a policeman on guard in front of the house where contagious disease is found, but the law provides no protection against the only weapon we have is education," said Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer and president of the Oregon Social Hygiene society, in an address yesterday before the Progressive Business Men's club at luncheon in the Multnomah hotel.

In the work of education remarkable progress has been made," continued Dr. White, who said that 417 meetings had been held in theatres, shops and other places. Notices to the number of 1400 had been issued by authority of the state board of health, and the society, he said, a social hygiene exhibit of unique value, which was seen by 35,000 people, and had so many friends that it was worth both California and Paris, had been distributed to men, women, boys and girls, and 3000 notices had been placed in the advisory department, of whom but half were found infected with diseases, which told them they had.

"The law has never advocated teaching social hygiene in the schools, because there were no teachers trained for the work and no texts prepared that were fit for the study," said Dr. White.

He spoke highly of the newspaper cooperation in the work of the society, saying all Portland papers had helped and that the same tribute was merited generally by the state press. No greater blessing, he declared, could have been visited on any community than that which has been accomplished here in getting rid of the quacks and charlatans.

"And I want to say," he added warningly, "that, in my opinion, the sneak who reaches your house from the porch and asks you to buy a jewel is a scholar and a gentleman compared to those miserable quacks and charlatans who fatten off ignorance."

"The biggest single cause of vice is ignorance," President Kanzer announced yesterday the appointment of Wilfrid P. Jones, Philip S. Bates and Dr. Henry Waldo Coe as the club's delegates to the Oregon irrigation congress to be held here in February. On the membership committee he appointed J. H. Dundore, J. J. Stritzel, H. Dorey, J. C. Gilson, Frank S. Glover. On the auditing committee, G. F. Peck, Washburn, Orion P. Fisher were appointed; on finance committee, Ernest H. Morgan and C. W. Wohl.
