

MULTNOMAH COUNTY TO HAVE A CRIMINAL COURT DEPARTMENT

Four Circuit Judges Sign Order; Judge Gatens Refuses to Sign.

Multnomah county will have a criminal department of the circuit court beginning next Monday, for the trial of all state cases. Four of the six circuit judges signed the order this morning, Judge Gatens refusing and Judge Clifton being in Pendleton.

The judge of the department, 1, Circuit Judge Kavanagh will preside over the newly created department for the next three months. After that it will go in succession to Judges Morrow, McGinn, Davis, Gatens and Clifton, each for three months, then beginning again with Department 1.

The reason for the change is because civil matters have congested the criminal department and are holding back trials of criminal cases, according to District Attorney Evans, and by means of the new department it is expected that accused persons can come to trial without great delay as at present. Another feature which the district attorney pointed out was that arraignments, pleas, and matters connected with criminal matters will all be handled in the one court and deputies will not become confused as to departments in which cases are to be tried.

That no delays may occur in civil cases already set for trial before Circuit Judge Kavanagh or more circuit judges will be called in to try cases now ready for trial. Cases on Judge Kavanagh's docket which are not ready for trial will be reassigned to the remaining five departments and in the future all civil cases will be assigned to the other courts. When Judge Kavanagh relinquishes the criminal department, the judge will take over the civil cases of Judge Morrow, who will succeed him. In the same way civil cases will be cared for by the other judges.

Judge Gatens refused to sign the order on the ground that the present system is the best. He said that he would not oppose the measure, however. He believed that under the new system all deputies of the district attorney's office could be kept busy, as only two or three can be utilized at a time owing to the fact that but one case can be tried at a time.

District Attorney Evans said that while one case is being heard other deputies can be preparing other cases. For example, he will be the first to be tried under the new system. He is charged with murdering an unknown man in a cabin across from his home near Troutdale. On completion of that trial the trial of County School Superintendent Armstrong, charged with malfeasance while a member of the city civil service commission, with bribery and with giving out advance information as to the results of a police examination, will be taken up. Robert Armstrong, his brother, is jointly indicted on the last charge.

At present there are 27 criminal cases pending. Last month 55 cases were disposed of by trial pleas of guilty or dismissal. Mr. Evans expects to increase this number largely during the coming month.

A commissioner or merely a supervisor over the commissioners will also be established.
Judge Morrow was free to state that he believed the present charter had practically killed civil service and that he knew it was never the intention of the voters that it should be so. Under the present conditions, employees under civil service can be discharged merely on statement of the reasons by letter to the officer involved, and that a copy of the charges must be filed with the civil service board," said Judge Morrow.
He pointed out that from this, an appeal can only be taken on the grounds that the dismissal was the result of political or religious reasons or not in good faith, and the commissioners are only allowed to conduct a hearing on those points. From a ruling of the civil service commissioners there can be no appeal.

H. L. Chapin of the committee on management of boys' work, urged that fathers and sons should be brought into closer contact and that fathers should enter more into their interests and activities. J. C. Meehan, who has had charge of the Y. M. C. A. camp at Spirit Lake for the past three years, showed a number of interesting slides illustrative of camp life at Spirit Lake, and Assistant Physical Director Harry T. Smith was in charge of a exhibition drill. At the close of the drill fathers went to the pool and watched their sons do fancy swimming and diving.

STRICKEN IN BATH; RESULT IS FATAL

SMELTER TRUST NEXT IS WASHINGTON RUMOR

Department of Justice Said to Be Preparing Suit to Dissolve Concern.

Washington, Jan. 31.—A bill in equity to dissolve the American Smelting & Refining company is being drawn by the department of justice, according to reports today. The decision to prosecute the smelter trust, as it is called, came after months of investigation by agents of the department. The alleged trust is owned by the Guggenheim company, which has a capital of about \$150,000,000, owns 12 smelters and two refineries, as well as many mines and steamship lines. It holds a perpetual charter from New Jersey.

TAKING "EXAMS" FOR PLACE AT ANNAPOLIS

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 31.—Examinations are being conducted by Superintendent J. S. Landers of the Pendleton district, for the purpose of selecting applicants for appointment to the United States naval academy from the second congressional district. Only two applicants have appeared to take the test, Irwin Rand, son of a Baker attorney, and Clarence L. Carson, of Hermiston. Examinations have also been held in Klamath Falls. The applicant making the highest average will be named principal by Representative Sinnott, and the second highest, first alternate. The principal must then pass the entrance examination before he receives his appointment. The applicants are being examined in geometry, algebra, arithmetic, geography, history and spelling. Grades for punctuation and spelling will be given from the papers in the other subjects.

SOUTH BEND DEBATORS WIN THIRD CONTEST

South Bend, Or., Jan. 31.—The South Bend high school won its third successive debate in the state series last night, when it defeated the Tenino high school team in the Grand Opera house. The question was the one that is being debated by all of the state schools and was the proposition that laborers unskilled from southern and eastern Europe should be excluded from the United States. The South Bend team, which has already defeated Raymond and Castle Rock high teams, consisted of Carleton Dark, Clinton Cull and Glen R. Bush, of Bay Center, Superintendent William F. Geiger, of Tacoma, and Charles Timblin, of Spokane. The Tenino debaters were Floyd Astelle, Floyd Rambo and Jefferson Howe. The next debate of the series will be held on February 28.

PEGGY RAYE ARRESTED ON PORTLAND CHARGE

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 31.—Thelma Raye, 22 years old, alias Mrs. Jack Bund, and Peggy Raye were arrested today by the police of the city of San Francisco on telegraphic advices from Constable Weinberger of Portland that she had a felony warrant for her. She refused to make any statements.

Peggy Raye is charged with stealing jewelry and clothes from the apartment of Mrs. J. C. Ford, alias Mrs. McBride, at the Norton apartments. Miss La Fond claimed her loss to be about \$250. Frank Beatty, a detective, furnished the clew to her capture on the charge. Constable Weinberger expects to leave at once to bring her back to Portland.

STEAMERS COLLIDE IN FOG AT SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Jan. 31.—The steam schooners Redondo and San Jacinto collided in the bay in the dense fog early today. The Redondo was damaged to the extent of \$2000. The San Jacinto escaped injury.

Road Strip Recommended.

Washington, Jan. 31.—The interior department informs Representative Hawley the superintendent of Salem Forest Grove be given a strip 35 feet wide and 377 feet long across the old road, on payment of \$250, and that the remainder of the site be sold at auction.

Second Class for Sportsman.

Washington, Jan. 31.—The postoffice department has assured Representative Hawley that it will admit the Oregon Sportsman, a state publication, to the privilege of second class rates.

Bag of Flour Starts Panic.

Los Angeles, Jan. 31.—Newsboys are believed to be guilty of hurling the contents of a bag of flour from the fire escape of an office building into a theatre crowd. Panic resulted. The boys escaped.

TWO PORTLAND FIRMS LOSE PERMITS TO DO BUSINESS IN STATE

Another Concern Is Chided for Making Misrepresentations in Advertising.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Jan. 31.—Because the company's operations are questionable, the Oregon Commission on R. A. Watson today canceled the permit issued to the Investors' Building & Trust company of Portland and notified the officers that any negotiation of stocks or other securities will be in violation of the law.

Commissioner Watson also canceled the permit issued to the State Deposit & Mortgage company of Portland, as a result of the conditions found to prevail in connection with the Building & Trust company, and because of the interlocking association of the two concerns.
The commissioner also today chided the Herion Cider Glass & Development company, Ltd., a Canadian concern with offices in Portland, for advertising in the Portland papers that it had been approved by the corporation department.

"These advertisements state that the company has complied with and is duly registered under the Oregon blue sky law," said Mr. Watson. "This statement is misleading and untrue. The company has filed its report with this department. Its showing is such that no permit for the sale of its stock could be given without an examination of the holdings of the company, and the field in which it operates. No permit will be given until such an examination has been made, and the company has been so notified. The sale of its stock at this time is in violation of the law. The advertisement and representations of the company are misleading and unwarranted."

LINEMEN COMPLAIN AGAINST COMPANY

Charges made by members of the Linemen's union that the Home Telephone company has violated the terms of its franchise in numerous ways are being investigated by the state railroad commission. H. L. Christensen, president of the union, said that he brought the complaint to the commission. The company alleges that the result of the linemen's strike some months ago, which resulted in the employment of nonunion linemen by the company.

The complaint alleges that the company used iron wire in place of copper wire in places, has not put its lines underground in places, has party lines for which main line charges are made, and uses some manual telephone instruments in place of automatic instruments. All of the charges are admitted to certain extents by the company but reasons are given for each alleged violation.

SPEER TAKES STAND TO CONTRADICT ACCUSERS

Savannah, Ga., Jan. 31.—Yielding to the importunities of the accused jurist, a sub-committee of the house judiciary committee this afternoon permitted United States Senator Alexander C. Speer, charged with nepotism, to take the stand in his own behalf. He denied every one of the allegations against him.

NEW TRIAL DENIED IN GERLINGER CASE

The motion of Attorney Arthur I. Moulton for a new trial of the \$50,000 suit of promise suit of Mrs. Gertrude Gerlinger, divorced wife of Edward E. Gerlinger, against Lloyd Frank was denied by Circuit Judge Davis this morning. Attorney Moulton said he was not certain whether an appeal would be taken or not.

STATE IS CONSIDERING BRIDGE BOND PURCHASE

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 31.—The state board of finance is considering this morning to consider the proposition of the state purchasing \$500,000 of the interstate bridge bond issue of Clarke county. There is sufficient money in the permanent school and accident fund to purchase the entire issue.

FIRE DAMP KILLS SIX IN GERMAN COLLIERY

Dortmund, Germany, Jan. 31.—Six men were known to have met death today in a fire explosion at the Achenbach colliery. The exact number of fatalities had not been learned up to a late hour today. Rescue parties were sent into the colliery from adjacent mines.

Sues City for Money.

To secure the return of \$500 paid by J. B. Noyes for a saloon license for Joseph W. Ireland, who died after the license was granted, suit was started by Noyes as administrator of Ireland's estate against the city this morning.

O. W. R. & N. AWARDS PRIZES TO EMPLOYEES WHO KEEP EYES OPEN

Premium Put on Work Which Results in Getting Business That Might Have Escaped.

Prizes were awarded today by the O. W. R. & N. company to employees who for the year 1913 kept eyes open to business prospects sufficiently to enable the traffic department to gain business which otherwise might have escaped. President J. D. Farrell instituted the idea two years ago where by it was made attractive for employees in other departments to "go after" income producing shipments.

A. B. Apperson, a clerk in the passenger accounting department, took first prize in the passenger getting contest and third in the freight soliciting contest, making him \$70 to the good in addition to his regular salary.

E. G. Kinsman, a telegraph operator, turned in most "prospects" for freight business and took down the \$50 prize. Winners of the other prizes are: M. P. Picken, clerk freight accounting department, second freight prize with 1355 credits; Mr. Apperson, third freight prize with 870 credits; Herbert Brasel, clerk engineering department, second passenger prize with 1440 points; H. O. Muckler, clerk passenger accounting department, third passenger prize with 1395 points.

A system of credits was arranged, whereby employees who turned in "prospects" were allowed so many points for each lead. A similar basis, so many for less than carload shipments, so many in addition for business actually secured by the employee's efforts. A similar basis was employed in solicitation of passengers.

H. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent, said the showing of Mr. Kinsman, the operator who won first honors in the freight contest, when he secured 4200 credits for carload lots and 2015 for less than carload lots, was remarkable. This work was done in necessity outside of working hours, and followed suggestions from friends and acquaintances.

William McMurray, general passenger agent, said Mr. Apperson's securing of first place in the passenger contest with 2655 points, and third in freight showed that he, too, is keeping his eyes open, and is loyal enough to the company to see a business chance, even though it were not in his department.

President Farrell's idea in instituting the contests was to encourage cooperation among the various departments and "discover" men who possibly could do better work in some line in which their best talents did not lie. Each contestant is being notified by letter of the showing he made in the contest.

Will Announce Plans Soon.

George H. Hopkin, who recently resigned as master mechanic of the Oregon Electric railway, will leave for Tacoma within a day or so to take up his new duties as master mechanic of the Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power company. A. C. Adams, who was announced recently as having secured that position, expects to be ready to announce his plans within a few days.

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STATE GAME AND FISH OFFICES BEING MOVED TO CAPITAL TODAY

Change Made by Commission in the Interest of Economy of Operating.

Offices of the State Game and Fish commission, after having been located in Portland for several years, are being moved to Salem today. Master Fish Warden Robert E. Clanton and State Game Warden William L. Finley, together with Theodore Opsund, secretary of the State Game and Fish commission, will open their offices in Salem Tuesday morning.

In the interests of economy, the newly organized commission, at its meeting in January, ordered removal of these offices to Salem as soon as possible. Commissioner C. H. Evans of Lostine was authorized to secure offices as soon as possible. This week he arranged to occupy the entire third floor of the United States National bank building at Salem. These quarters will be temporary. The offices of the commission departments will be located in the state house soon after the state supreme court moves to the new supreme court building.

At the January meeting a secretary of the commission was authorized to look after the general business affairs of both departments, and Theodore Opsund, chief clerk in the fisheries department, was appointed. Opsund will open his office as secretary Tuesday or Wednesday, when he will qualify for his position. Opsund will occupy quarters in the same suite with the department offices.

Both Clanton and Finley will retain deputies in Portland, with offices, from which the city work will be carried on, but just as these men will be has not yet been fully decided.

VILLA BEGINS MASSING TROOPS AT ESCALON

El Paso, Texas, Jan. 31.—General Villa, at Juarez, gave preliminary orders today looking toward an actual start on the rebel long expected movement to the southward toward the Mexican capital.
He directed the concentration at Escalon, the base of the constitutionalists' operations against Torreon, of 4000 cavalry now at Chihuahua City, Santa Rosalia, Jimenez and Parral, and arranged to dispatch 2000 from the carillon here toward the same destination early next week.

It was believed the concentration meant an immediate attack on Torreon, the next step in the campaign for Mexico City's capture.

TWO HUNDRED MISSING IN BRAZILIAN STORMS

Rio Janeiro, Jan. 31.—More than 200 persons were reported missing this afternoon in the terrible storms which were raging in the state of Bahia. Thousands of houses were reported submerged.

New Pendleton Firm.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 31.—A new business firm to handle automobiles will start February 15 in Pendleton under the name of the City Motor company. D. H. Nelson, a farmer, and Frank Fairbanks, a graduate mechanic, will conduct the business. They are having a garage fitted in the Scheiner building on Cottonwood street.

TOO WEAK TO KILL HIMSELF—IS SAVED FROM SLOW DEATH

Vernonia, Or., Jan. 31.—So weak that he could not raise his gun to shoot himself with the bullet he had saved for his self destruction rather than starve to death, Wesley Eastahl of Nehalem last night was found in the woods some miles from here by a party that had been searching for him since Monday night.

Eastahl became lost while trailing a deer after a companion with whom he started had returned home. He wandered around in the forest day and night, and after killing a deer, but having no matches, ate raw venison until he became nauseated.

Eastahl says he had 16 shots in his gun but fired all but two of them trying to kill himself. He intended killing himself yesterday afternoon, but collapsed and was near death when found. He was carried three miles to the nearest shack. His recovery is doubtful.

MRS. REUTER FREED IN SECOND MURDER TRIAL

Bartlesville, Okla., Jan. 31.—"Not guilty" was the verdict returned here today in the case of Mrs. Laura M. Reuter charged with complicity in the murder of her husband, Charles M. Reuter. This was Mrs. Reuter's second trial. The first trial resulted in conviction of a sentence of life imprisonment.

The prosecution attempted to show that Mrs. Reuter conspired with Guy P. Mackenzie, a quality contractor, and others in the murder of her husband. Mrs. Reuter was shot and killed in his home at Tulsa, May 5, 1912.

FINAL ARRANGEMENTS FOR OPERA BEING MADE

Max Hirsch, representing the Chicago grand opera company, arrived in Portland today for the purpose of making final arrangements for the appearance of the Chicago company here in four performances, April 2, 3, 4, and 5, at a Sunday matinee April 6.

The company will appear in Portland under the local management of the Portland Grand Opera association.

Witness Not Satisfactory.
Because fraud was found in papers issued to Thomas Murnane at Chicago nearly 20 years ago, Circuit Judge Hazard dismissed the application of James Cardigan for citizenship yesterday, and Cardigan must secure a new witness to replace Murnane. Examiner Hazard said that many final papers issued in Chicago 20 years ago are invalid on similar grounds, and that Murnane must begin over if he would legally become a citizen. Seventeen men were granted final papers and seven applications were denied. Half a dozen cases were heard this morning, and all will be completed this afternoon for this term of court.

Coe for Committeeman.
Salem, Or., Jan. 31.—Dr. Henry Waldo Coe has filed his certificate as a candidate for the committee of the Progressive party.

RADIUM REFINERY BILL CALLS APPROPRIATION OF ONE HALF MILLION

Withdrawal of Radium Lands Eliminated; Right of Exclusive U. S. Purchase.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, Jan. 31.—An appropriation of \$500,000 to equip a "radium refinery" was asked in a bill introduced in the house today by Representative Foster, chairman of the house mines committee. An additional \$250,000 to carry on the work until June, 1915, also was asked.

The withdrawal of all radium lands was eliminated from Foster's bill. Instead it reserved to the government the right to purchase exclusively at rates established January 1 and July 1 of each year, all ores from claims located hereafter. It provides that prospectors develop with all reasonable diligence "all claims on penalty of losing them. The sales of ore to anyone except the government is punishable by a fine of \$1000 for each claim. A fine twice the amount of the product sold.

The bill authorizes the secretary of the interior to dispose of the "refining" plant which will best serve the needs of the people.

MILL MANAGER GOES GOOD FOR PRISONER

An offer made by Frank C. Young, manager of the West Side Lumber company, to be responsible for the good conduct of John McConnell, who was charged with many thefts and living a dual life, resulted in McConnell's pleading guilty to a charge of simple larceny this morning and receiving a sentence of 30 days in Circuit Judge McGinn.

Mr. Young said that he would take McConnell into his home when work could be furnished for him and that if there was no work when the sentence expired he would take care of McConnell until work could be provided. McConnell pleaded guilty to stealing a coat from Mary A. McPherson.

FAULTY PUNCTUATION CAUSES MUCH TROUBLE

A tiny comma is making a great deal of trouble for heirs of Sarah C. Woodbury, who died in San Francisco July 15, 1912, as the comma divides the name of her son, Alfred Frank, and in the certified copy of the will filed in the local court makes it appear that there are two sons instead of one. This division invalidates title to real estate in this county valued at \$1800 which was left to the son and the real estate in the state of California but held property here.

Railroad Man En Route.

J. W. Woodson, vice president of the Northern Pacific railway in charge of traffic, will arrive in Portland Monday on his first inspection trip to the executive post. He is making the trip slowly, that it may be a real study of business conditions. Mr. Woodson spent several days in the vicinity of Spokane and will reach here from Puget sound.

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ARTILLERY BAND TO MAKE EXTENDED TOUR

O. N. G. Musicians Will Pay Visit to Western Oregon Towns.

The First Band of the Coast Artillery, O. N. G., leaves tomorrow evening on an extended tour of Western Oregon in the interest of the organization of which it is a prominent part. The band will be in charge of Major Charles E. York, director, and will give concerts in the various cities visited.

While Ashland will be the objective point where Monday evening the band will assist in the ceremonies in celebration of the dedication of the new armory there. Medford, Roseburg, Coquille, Eugene and Albany are included in the itinerary and each city given a day. The band will be on the tour a whole week. At all of these points the band will be accompanied and the band will appear with the local corps in exhibition drills, guard mount and other evolutions.

The itinerary mapped out is as follows: Leave Portland at 8:15 a. m. tomorrow evening; arrive at Ashland Monday for dedication of new armory; Tuesday, Medford; Wednesday, Roseburg; Thursday, Coquille; Friday, Eugene; Saturday, Albany. The band will accompany Governor West and the general staff, who will participate prominently in the exercises at Ashland. At Roseburg the band will probably give a concert at the Old Soldiers' Home.
