KOETTERS CLAIMS HE CAN PROVE AN ALIBI

San Francisco, Feb. 12.—"I've been thinking it over and now I remember where I was the night of November 14, 1912, when Mrs. Emma Kraft was killed," said "Handsome Jack" Koettters today. "I am pretty certain I can find witnesses to prove I was nowhere near the Maratona hotel that night."

Koettters received a telegram last night conveying the message, "Good luck be with you and best wishes," and signed "A True Friend." The prisoner spent a good night and was more cheerful today.

The police got a message from Chicago notifying them that a certified indictment against Koettters had been forwarded and that detectives were on their way to take charge of him.

COOLEY WINNER IN BROWNSVILLE ELECTION

Brownsville, Or., Feb. 12.—Lenora Powell, only woman candidate for postmaster in the election held here Saturday, is taking her defeat philosophically, and argues that there is "another time coming." J. P. Cooley, the successful candidate, received 204 votes to Miss Powell's 177. All patrons of the postoffice, whether residents of Brownsville or not, were permitted to vote. The present postmaster, Ed Stuart, holds office until the first of next year, and the election was merely to get a line on the people's choice for his successor. Other candidates agreed to leave the field to the successful one. J. W. Boll received 162 votes; Henry Blakely, 136, and B. S. Martin, 81.

RONGGENG, A DANCE AS INTERESTING AS TANGO

An effort may be made in London to introduce Ronggeng, a dance which is practiced by the Javanese for their princes, who maintain regular corps of dancers. The Javanese do not believe in promiscuous dancing as in Europe and the United States. Such is immoral, they believe, and they leave the dancing to professionals.

"The court dancers of Java, scrims and bedoyos, are chosen among the relatives of the reigning prince," says J. F. Shetler in his work on Java. "Their sons and daughters, however, are excepted from the choice. The scrims dances are always performed by girls of whom the corps de ballet of the Sultan of Jogja contains some 30 or 40 between 13 and 17 years of age. The bedoyos dances may be performed by either girls or boys in female attire.

"The dance might not be called such by us. For the action is slow and stately; there is hopping and skipping, but the expression is by the

upper part of the body with the motions of the arms and hands in conformity with well known rules."

Willapa Lumber CUT SHOWS DECREASE

Raymond, Wash., Feb. 12.—Figures on the lumber cut on Willapa Harbor just made public show that at least 10,000,000 feet less was cut in 1913 than 1912. The total cut for this harbor is placed at 279,388,300 feet, as against 303,170,029 feet in 1912. The total output of shingles for 1913 was 249,862,000 pieces, as against 313,353,000 pieces in 1912.
