

HARD SURFACING OF BASE LINE PLANNED

Question Will Be Discussed
at Meeting at Rockwood
Tonight.

A public meeting will be held at Rockwood tonight for the purpose of discussing the proposed hard surfacing of the base line road from the city limits to the top of the hill west of the Upper Sandy river bridge. County Commissioner Rufus C. Holman and Roadmaster John B. Yeon will attend the meeting and explain to property owners what is proposed and the approximate cost of the improvement.

Under the law the county is to pay half of the cost and abutting property, one mile on either side of the road, the other half. Where there are two trunk roads so near together that some property in the district would be assessed for both roads, the county road department has decided to decrease this limit so that there will be no overlapping or double assessment for hard surface roads.

WORK HAS STARTED ON FESTIVAL FLOATS

First Three Cars for Floral
Parade Transformed Into
Things of Beauty.

Out at the Den, the workshop of the Rose Festival, where all kind of mystery reigns, they have begun to build floats 1, 2 and 3 for the floral parade, one of the main events of the Rose Festival.

Charles Ammann, the association artist, made the designs, which have been approved and submitted to the board of directors and are now in the hands of Pierre Tragilo, superintendent of construction, who, with a large force of men is transforming them into things of beauty. These two men have done similar work in all parts of the world. To render assistance to those who have decided to enter floats and to those desirous of getting ideas for a float, the festival association has made an interesting collection of photographs of what other cities have done. These may be seen at the headquarters in the Morgan building, any time.

The association has decided that no float shall enter the parade until it has met the approval of the officers.

The Portland Rose society has completed arrangements for the Rose Show in the Central library from June 1st to June 12. Eighty-seven trophies will be awarded. L. A. Brown, chairman of the lecture committee, has arranged for a public meeting, February 19, at the public library, to discuss the show.

REED STUDENT LOAN FUND IS INCREASED

Loan funds for the aid of worthy students in Reed college received a substantial increase this week when one of the most prominent attorneys of Portland called to see President Foster in behalf of one of his clients. He announced that he wished to endow Reed college with income-bearing property sufficient to enable eight or ten students annually to continue their work in Reed college.

The fund will be named for the donor, whose name is withheld for the present and the principal will be held intact as a perpetual memorial. This will be the fourth loan fund established to aid worthy students at Reed college. Loans are made only to students who earn a considerable part of their college expenses.

The Booth loan fund, which was established by R. A. Booth of Eugene, was announced last week. The fund amounts to \$1000. The Fecheimer fund has an income of \$500 annually. The Alice Houston fund was founded in the first year of its existence while the college was still housed in its temporary quarters at Eleventh and Jefferson. It is an endowment of \$3000.

HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM ROCKPILE TERM

"A man is supposed to be woman's protector, instead of her destroyer," said Municipal Judge Stevenson this morning to Sophus Culbertson, an engineer, before the court for beating his wife.

Mrs. Culbertson complained that her husband knocked her down. This morning she repeated the story of cruelty, adding that he had struck his first wife on the head, causing partial paralysis. She also related how Culbertson had struck his sister.

"How long do you want this man kept on the rockpile?" asked Judge Stevenson of the woman. "A man like this should be punished and the best thing I know is to place him on the rockpile."

Culbertson's attorney induced the court to let the man go when he agreed to support her and live apart. Culbertson denied he abused his wife.

OPENING OF MARYLAND AVENUE TO BE URGED

A mass meeting under the joint auspices of the North Portland Commercial club and the Overlook Improvement club will be held at 8 o'clock this evening in the auditorium of the North Portland library, Killingworth avenue and Kerby street, to present to the public the plan for opening Maryland avenue through lower Albina to a connection with Goldsmith and Larrabee streets.

Commissioner Daly has consented to address the meeting. President E. M. Orth of the North Portland club will preside. President Frank Deuster of the Overlook club and several others will speak. All residents of the districts affected by the proposed opening are urged to attend the meeting.
