

SALEM MERCHANT IS PNEUMONIA VICTIM

Oscar Johnson, Resident for 30 Years in Capital City, Succumbs Suddenly.

Salem, Or., Feb. 13.—Oscar Johnson, one of the leading merchants of Salem, died unexpectedly early this morning of pneumonia. He was taken sick last Sunday.

For more than 30 years Mr. Johnson had lived in Salem. He was 46 years old and was formerly associated with his father, G. W. Johnson, in the Johnson & Co. clothing store. About 10 years ago he established the Oscar Johnson clothing store, of which he was the head at the time of his death. He leaves a widow and step-daughter, besides his father and three brothers and a sister. The brothers are G. W. Johnson Jr., Claude Johnson and Paul Johnson, all engaged in business here, and the sister is Mrs. Rose McElroy of Portland.

The funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from the Rigdon chapel.

City Honors Lincoln

Two Linn Candidates.

Albany, Or., Feb. 13.—With the announcement Wednesday of Grant Pirie's candidacy for the Republican nomination to the office of sheriff, there are now two active candidates in the field. W. J. Moore of Brownsville having announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination last week. Sheriff Bodine will be a candidate for re-nomination on the Republican ticket, but thus far has not filed his petition.

Adna Resident Succumbs.

Chehalis, Wash., Feb. 13.—J. H. Fay of Adna died Monday after a brief illness of pneumonia. Mr. and Mrs. Fay celebrated their sixty-third wedding anniversary October 30, 1913, the latter and a family of grown children survive him. Mr. Fay was born in Sullivan, Mass., April 12, 1857.

REPUBLICAN JUSTICES SEEK REELECTION

Terms Expire First of Next Year and Declarations Are Filed.

Salem, Or., Feb. 13.—The three Republican justices of the supreme court whose terms expire the first of next year, today filed their declarations of candidacy for reelection. They are Chief Justice Thomas A. McBride, Justice Henry J. Bean and Justice Charles L. McNary. Justices McBride and McNary asked to have placed on the ballot after their name the words: "Present incumbency." After Justice Bean's name will be: "Equal justice to poor and rich."

Judge McBride was appointed to the supreme court by Governor Benson in 1909 to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Judge R. S. Bean, who was appointed to the federal bench. He was elected in 1910 and is now serving his first term.

Judge Bean was elected in 1910 for a four year term. Judge McNary was appointed June 3, 1913, by Governor West, to fill one of the two new judgeships created by the last legislature.

ILWACO WILL VOTE ON LIQUOR QUESTION

Iiwaco, Wash., Feb. 13.—In conformity with the recently adopted "home rule ordinance," the city council at its meeting Tuesday evening acted favorably upon a petition filed by Herbert Pettit, asking that a special election be called on the question as to whether or not the sale and licensing of malted and distilled liquor shall be permitted within our city limits. The petition contained nearly three times as many signatures as was required and was granted without a dissenting vote. The election will be held Tuesday, March 3.

WOMAN IS BEGGAR OR JUST UNFORTUNATE

Pendleton, Or., Feb. 13.—A woman, giving her name as Mrs. Mary Sides, with six small children, is being held by the local juvenile officers pending an investigation to determine whether she is a professional beggar or the victim of misfortune. She was taken up for soliciting alms from W. G. Bogart, a saloonman, who declares he gave her a dollar in a California town hardly more than a week ago. He states the authorities there, moved by pity, purchased her a ticket to Portland.

Rader Works in Lane.

Eugene, Or., Feb. 13.—F. W. Rader, county agriculturalist, recently appointed by the county court of Lane, has arrived in Eugene and will at once enter upon his duties. Mr. Rader is alumnus of the Washington state college at Pullman, where he was graduated in 1908. He has been in work of the nature of that he is to conduct here for the last five years and has held several positions of responsibility. For the past 18 months he has been county agriculturalist in Walla Walla county, Oregon. In his work in Lane county, Mr. Rader will be relieved of horticultural work, that work being under the supervision of two county inspectors.

Start Mill at Florence.

Florence, Or., Feb. 13.—The mill here has started cutting lumber again, after being shut down for repairs for about three months. Only one side of the mill is being operated at present, and the lumber turned out is to be used in further repairs. Considerable more work has still to be done in remodeling. It will be about 30 days before the mill is run to capacity.
