

SENTIMENT STRONG FOR MARION COUNTY GOOD ROADS BONDS

Taxpayers Crowd Big Mass Meeting to Hear What is to Be Said on Measure.

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.) Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—It is probable that the county court will issue the next few days the call for the special election to vote upon the issuance of \$850,000 bonds for building good roads. The petition has been checked and found sufficient.

For the purpose of feeling the public pulse on the county court invited those interested in the proposed bond issue to meet with the court yesterday afternoon. Farmers and others from various parts of the county packed into the county court room for the meeting was adjourned to the Commercial club auditorium, where there was room for the crowd.

With but a few exceptions all who had anything to say were in favor of the bond issue. Mrs. Pettyjohn, of St. Paul, speaking from the woman's viewpoint, talked for good roads.

The question now concerning many is where the road building is to be done. A delegation from St. Paul presented a petition asking for a hard surface road between Hubbard and the Marion county approach of the Newberg bridge. Representatives from various parts of the county spoke in favor of roads in their sections. The general sentiment seemed to be that the money, if voted, should not be spent on one main highway, but on a number of main roads.

Boosters to Eugene. Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—The Salem boosters expect to take a delegation of 125 business men to the booster meeting at Eugene next Thursday. The boosters have joined with the Commercial club in the movement for creating interest in an exhibit to be made by the various counties at Ashland during the week of Feb. 15-17.

DATES ARE SET BY R. R. COMMISSION Numerous Petitions to Be Passed Upon at Hearings Next Week.

Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—Hearings in the case of the application of the United Railways to increase its rates between Portland and Wilkesboro and intermediate points has been set by the railroad commission to be held at Portland, March 15. Both the cities of Portland and Linnton have filed answers.

The case of the city of Salem vs. Salem Water, Light & Power company has been set for hearing here on March 4. The city alleges the company is charging excessive rates and is furnishing inadequate service.

At the time of the hearing in the United Railways case the commission will also take up the complaint of the Tualatin Valley Transportation association against the Oregon Electric.

At La Grande, March 9, the commission will hear the application of the Home Independent Telephone company for a connection with the city with the exchanges of the Eastern Oregon Cooperative Telephone association at Summerville, Elgin and Cove.

On the same day the commission will hear the complaint of the La Grande Commercial club against the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company. The club alleges that the rates are excessive.

Mails Are Mixed. Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—Corporation Commissioner Watson is receiving many statements from corporations in the state intended for the income tax collector. He says it appears that many corporation officials are careless in not noting that income tax matters are handled by the internal revenue officials of the government.

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
