COUNTY COURT NEWS

Whidden & Lewis, architects of the courthouse, reported that the Lewis A. Hicks company estimated the cost of a new partition in Assessor Reed's office would be \$480, but the estimate was considered too high. The commissioners ordered that the matter be held in abeyance until Mr. Whidden returns to the city.
E. J. Grabs, 368 Victoria street, petitioned for the straightening out of road 362 between Bertha boulevard and the Miller's Ferry road. The petition was referred to Roadmaster Yeon.
The protest of Joseph Packard concerning the condition of a road on Saucier's island for about four miles between the Taylor place and the Howell place was referred to Roadmaster Yeon.
Whidden & Lewis, architects of the courthouse, advised the commissioners that they could see no reason why the board should not insist that the Lewis A. Hicks company pay the Washington Brick, Lime & Sewer Pipe company \$15,263.17 due for terra cotta furnished for the courthouse. The letter was referred to District Attorney Evans.
Assessor Reed reported he could see no reason why taxes on the Gipsy Smith auditorium building should be cancelled as requested by City Commissioner Brewster and the report was sent to Commissioner Brewster. The building is owned by the city but occupies land belonging to the Kamm estate.
County Surveyor Holbrook reported that he believed not more than one resident of Multnomah county lives along the Rocky Point road, for reduction of grades on which J. S. Tannock of Scappoose, Or., petitioned. He said the grades could be eliminated largely by doubling the length, now three miles, and building two miles of new road. The report was sent to Mr. Tannock.
The Fulton Park Land company petitioned for a return of premiums of \$226.22 realized on the sale of blocks 222 and "M" Fulton Park, for taxes due, in 1910. The petition was referred to District Attorney Evans.
Roadmaster Yeon was directed to serve Louis Wagner, Lents, with a copy of a letter notifying him that any attempt to close road No. 824 near Gilbert Station would be contrary to law.

Mr. Wagner was mailed a copy of the letter but claimed he did not receive it. Superintendent Murnane, of the bridges, was ordered to investigate a report by B. W. Paul that the Broadway bridge draw was open 11 minutes at noon February 17 for the passage of a boat.
Emil Abplanalp, Lents, was allowed \$12.50 indemnity for the slaughter of a diseased cow.
New Citizens at Astoria.
Astoria, Or., Feb. 20.—The past two days in circuit court have been devoted to the hearing of applications for citizenship. The examination is being conducted by Henry B. Hazard, and thus far 23 applicants have been admitted out of a total of 58 who have applied.

REBUILDING PLANTS DESTROYED BY FIRE
Raymond, Wash., Feb. 20.—Work of rebuilding the Southwest Manufacturing company's shingle mill, which was destroyed by fire last September, has been started by the Willapa Construction company. The contract calls for the completion of the plant within 60 days. The mill, which will be 36 by 200, will be one of the most modern shingle mills in the Pacific northwest and will have a daily capacity of 500,000 shingles. As soon as the mill is completed and placed in operation the company plans to immediately begin the work of rebuilding the cedar siding mill which was destroyed with the shingle mill.
Start Work at Albany.
Albany, Or., Feb. 20.—Indicating that preliminary construction work for the new Albany postoffice and federal building will be started in the near future, the site at the corner of Broadway and Second streets, yesterday was cleared by city workmen.
