GRANT IS SPEAKER AT KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS GATHERING IN BAKER

Annual Rollcall and Golden Anniversary Is Occasion of Big Celebration.

Baker, Or., Feb. 21.—The golden jubilee in celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Knights of Pythias and the annual roll call, was the double purpose of a banquet Thursday, held by the members of Gauntlet lodge No. 8 of this city.

It was one of the most important lodge events of the year in eastern Oregon, and about 200 persons participated.

The principal speaker of the evening was Frank S. Grant, Grand Chancellor of the Grand Lodge of Oregon. He complimented the local lodge highly on its present flourishing condition, noted the beautiful Pythian castle hall which is the home of the lodge, commended the increased membership of the past year, and expressed appreciation of the honor accorded him.

A feature of the evening was the presentation of a banner to those who have been continuous members of the organization for 25 years. Those entitled to receive them were George B. Small, A. Shockley and Carl Adler.

Visitors were present from many outside points and during the evening telegrams of congratulations were received from the Commercial club.

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WHITE SLAVE PICTURE FILM WILL BE SHOWN

Judge Stevenson Believes It Will Aid Campaign on nefarious Practices.

A picture film known as "The Inside of the White Slave Traffic" will be allowed in Portland.

Municipal Judge Stevenson yesterday gave his approval to the picture, which the local censorship board refused to pass.

Mayor Albee sought to uphold the board and ordered Chief of Police Clark to stop it. Then the matter went into the municipal court on appeal.

R. E. Alderman, superintendent of city schools, told the judge yesterday he considered the film proper, as it teaches a great object lesson.

He thought there should be an age limit, however. Circuit Judge Gatens favored the film. L. Levinge, member of the vice commission, said the value of the film is that it tends to disclose the idea that the ways of vice are easy and profitable.

W. H. Warren, representing Mayor Albee, objected to the film, chiefly on the ground that it arouses the moral curiosity of the film proper, as it teaches a great object lesson.

Attorney John F. Logan, representing Captain Heilig and Ralph Pheasant, who have charge of the film, offered

CASE AGAINST YOUNG WRESTLER DISMISSED Glen Bailey, a wrestler 21 years old, arrested yesterday morning upon the arrival of a Southern Pacific train from Havana, Cal., at Lake Park, Minn. She has been held by Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin, who arranged today to have her continue the journey under the direction of the Travelers Aid association.

When the girl left home, Bailey told the mother he would accompany her as far as Portland, as he is on his way to British Columbia. At Portland he was to see that she boarded the right train. Before the train reached Portland, the train crew wired for officers to take charge of the couple, as both had occupied the same berth. Bailey denied improper conduct, which was substantiated by a statement from a woman physician.

DEPUTY SHERIFF CURTIS HANDS IN RESIGNATION Deputy Sheriff Frank Curtis, under indictment for accepting a bribe and for attempting to extort \$25 from P. J. Hendon, proprietor of the Arcade rooming house, turned in his star and resignation which were accepted Thursday night by Sheriff Word.

Sheriff Word said that he had absolute faith in the ability of his former deputy to show his innocence of the crimes alleged and that he believes the charges are the result of a frame-up but that Curtis did not desire to remain as a deputy while the charges were pending.

PROPERTY OWNERS OBJECT TO PROJECT

At a meeting of property owners on East Stark street between East Seventieth street and the city limits at the Base Line road, held last night at the home of Mrs. Sarah Hinds Wilder, 1908 East Stark street, it was unanimously agreed that the grade on the street for that distance should not be lowered. Nearly every property owner affected was present or represented.

The county commissioners wish to cut down the grade and have the city take over the street and improve it. Mrs. Wilder was instructed to state the sentiments of the property owners to Commissioner Dieck, who has promised to go over the district under discussion soon.

LEPPER TAKES ISSUE WITH SELLWOOD BOARD L. M. Lepper, secretary of the East Side Business Men's club, declares, in regard to the protest of the Sellwood board of trade against locating the auditorium on the east side, that by placing a third rail on Grand avenue, cars from Sellwood and other districts can run past the auditorium site without transferring passengers, continuing to the west side via the Broadway bridge.

Mr. Lepper also vents out that owing to the fact that the proposed east side site is equidistant from the outlying districts, residents of Sellwood could reach it as quickly as residents of other suburbs. He declares present congestion downtown on the west side, which will increase yearly, calls for spreading the public buildings out over a greater area, the first step in which plan should be the location of the auditorium on the east side.

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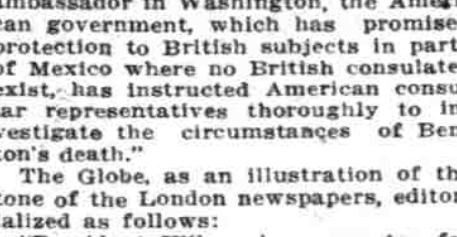
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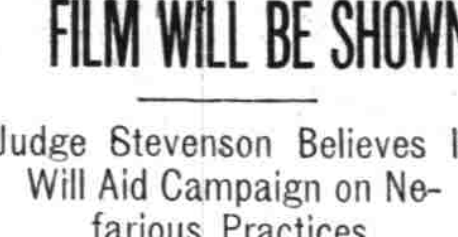
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
