

ATTACK IS MADE IN COURTS ON VALIDITY OF THE BLUE SKY LAW

Four Plaintiffs File Suit Today Alleging Their Constitutional Rights Infringed.

Attacking the validity of the blue sky law passed by the last legislature, suit was filed this morning in the circuit court to enjoin the enforcement of the law. Four plaintiffs are named, the Great Western Mining & Milling company, the United Placer Mines company, the International Cocomat Plantation company and W. E. Davidson & Co. The first is an Oregon corporation, the second was incorporated in Idaho, the third is a Washington corporation and the last is a Portland stock brokerage concern, unincorporated.

Corporation Commissioner R. A. Watson, Attorney General Crawford and District Attorney McGinnis are named as defendants and the injunction is sought to prevent them from carrying out the provisions of the law. Constitutional grounds are the basis of the suit as the complaint alleges that the law violates both the state and federal constitutions.

Business Rights Infringed. It is alleged that the rights of the plaintiffs and others similarly situated are invaded by the law and are destroyed; that the freedom of contract is impaired; that the rights and privileges of citizens of the United States are violated without due process of law; that the interstate commerce laws are violated and that the law is so excessive and cruel as to prevent challenge of the validity of the law because of fear.

Charges are made that in the case of domestic corporations, the articles of incorporation or in reality contracts between the state and the incorporators and stockholders are lawfully violated when they are denied any of the rights of corporations without the consent of stockholders unless that authority is specifically reserved by the state.

It is also alleged that the law gives the corporation commissioners the right to examine into all affairs of companies, whether such affairs relate to securities proposed for sale or not and to make all findings public which greatly damages the companies and is unfair.

Another charge made is that the law attempts to give judicial power to an officer whose office is created as an administrative office and that it denies the right of judicial investigation by due process of law. It alleges that there is no adequate reason for the police powers delegated by the law, as there does not exist any necessity for the law for the health, safety, morals or essential welfare of the people of the state. The allegations are also made that the act has more than one subject matter in its provisions, which is contrary to the constitution of the state.

Attorneys L. D. Mahone and W. A. Leet represent the plaintiffs. They said they had joined together a local and two foreign corporations and a partnership house that all points of the law might be settled at once.

An application for a temporary restraining order is expected to be made to Presiding Judge McGinnis, Judge McGinnis said that he had told the attorneys that if the suit came before him he would declare the law unconstitutional.

SINGERS OF RAIDS ON DENIS QUESTIONED

Court Scents Graft; City Wins In Injunction Suit Tried in Court.

"Every time I hear of the police raiding a Chinese opium den, or a Chinese gambling place I instinctively ask myself, 'How much more do they want the Chinamen to put up with?' said Circuit Judge McGinnis in refusing to grant an injunction asked by Chinese residents of the Chinese quarter against the enforcement of the ordinance against secret passage ways. 'I have little or no patience with a city administration that puts in its time pulling Chinamen. I may be mistaken in my thought, but I have a right to the idea that I have gotten largely from an experience of upwards of 30 years at this bar that wherever these things are done they are done not in the interest of the public morals, but in the interest of graft.'

As Judge Gaynor has pointed out in one of those decisions which counsel read, many captains of police have become extremely wealthy by levying blackmail in this sort of way. But that is not the interest of the public morals here. It has been passed upon by competent authority and it provides for doing things which the law does not prohibit.

If they undertake to use it as an engine of oppression, that is something that can be dealt with at that time, but the state is not now going to enjoin the mayor or the commissioners from doing their duty as they see it. This application for an injunction is denied."

FOREST EXCHANGE BILL IS REPORTED

If Secretary Lane Approves Measure Its Passage by House Is Certain.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, March 5.—Representative McGinnis has succeeded in getting the committee on public lands to report the forest exchange bill on condition that Secretary Lane will give his approval of the measure. The bill was introduced in congress by Senator Chamberlain and has passed the senate.

Oregon is much interested in it. The purpose is to consolidate forest lands and provide a way for foresty instruction in Oregon. The forest land is about twice the value of the lands the state would surrender. Sinnott will consult Secretary Lane at once.

To Reimburse Coal Company. Washington, March 5.—Senator Chamberlain today introduced a bill for the relief of the Port Graham coal company at Seldovia, Alaska, paying that company \$5000 the loss of a 250 ton scow destroyed in Cook Inlet while being used by the navy department.

PROSECUTION FINISHES ITS DIRECT TESTIMONY

The prosecution finished its direct testimony this morning in the case against Harry Connors, charged with obtaining money by false pretenses from Mrs. Daley Riemann and an argument is in progress as to the validity of the indictment. Attorney M. G. Munly attacked the indictment on the ground that the crime alleged, if consummated at all, must have been committed by the state, this morning identified by Police P. E. Downey of New York and Detective H. H. Royle of Portland, who went east to bring Connors back, testified that the New York records showed no arrest of Dan Connors. Downey also testified that Connors admitted the whole scheme to him after his arrest.

COUNCIL NEED NOT ISSUE SALOON LICENSE

Salem, Or., March 5.—Attorney General Crawford rendered an opinion today that as the city charter of Sherwood authorizes the city council to issue saloon licenses in its discretion, the council cannot be compelled to issue a license against its will. He held that the charter provision must be mandatory before a council can be compelled to act.

Two weeks ago Governor West wrote to the mayor and council of Sherwood protesting against the renewal of a saloon license to Fred and Charles, who, he said, had been convicted of violating the liquor law. The opinion of the attorney general supports the governor's stand that the council has authority to refuse to grant the license.

STEAMER LINE WILL NAME LOCAL AGENT

The appointment of a local agent to represent W. R. Grace & Co. in this city will probably be made in the near future, as a result of the company's constantly growing business here. A well known Portland man has practically been selected already for the position.

The firm of W. R. Grace & Co. operates a line of large steamers from ports on this coast to South America and the Atlantic coast, under the name of the Santa Cecilia, Santa Catalina, Santa Cruz and Santa Clara. It also operates a number of vessels in the foreign lumber trade under charter. The headquarters are in San Francisco.

THIRTY APPLICANTS TAKE EXAMINATIONS AT CITY HALL TODAY

Clerkships Under the Municipal Civil Service Attract Many to Positions.

That clerkships under municipal civil service are desirable positions is shown by the large number of men taking the examination being held in the city hall today. Thirty applicants for the positions are taking the examination and of this number are several middle aged men.

Questions pertaining to the work in the fire, engineering department and auditor's office are being asked. The position of clerk is ranging from \$55 to \$125 a month.

A meeting of the municipal civil service board is scheduled for 10 o'clock this afternoon at which time the results of the recent civil service examinations for captains of police are to be made public.

There are two of these positions now vacant but which are being filled temporarily. It is believed that as soon as the civil service rules are given the head of the department the right to select any one of the first three on the list but the mayor has insisted on having the first man selected.

WOULD HAVE FEES REFUNDED

Ordinance Proposed to Regulate Employment Agencies. By the terms of an ordinance introduced before the council yesterday, all employment agencies will be required to refund the employment fee of men who are discharged by the employer within a week, and should there be no position existing the agency will be required to pay the railroad fare of the men sent out to the various places where work was represented that work existed.

It is also proposed to cut the fees of the employment agencies from \$1 to 50 cents each case which work is supplied. This ordinance is the result of many complaints received by C. A. Bigelow, commissioner of finance, from men who have been employed by agencies but when arriving at their destination found that no work existed.

PROPOSED MEAT ORDINANCE

Argument for and Against to Be Heard. Objectors to the proposed meat ordinance and those who favor the measure will be given an opportunity to be heard when the council holds a public hearing on the ordinance this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, in the council chamber. The measure requires the inspection of all meat sold in the city and fixes a charge for inspection of a number of meat dealers.

They have hired attorneys to fight the ordinance, they contending that by charging for inspection service practically the business of the independent packers and the farmers.

BACK SALARIES DEMANDED

Ex-Patrolman and Ex-Sergeant File Claims. Charles F. Fry, ex-patrolman, and Clyde Rupert, ex-sergeant of police, have filed claims with City Auditor Barbur for salaries which they allege is due them since December 11, when they were discharged by Mayor Albert.

If the claims are not paid it is stated that the men will sue the city.

Fry presented the claims in person yesterday and served the mayor and commissioners each with a copy.

EX-POLICEMAN FULLER SUES SHERIFF WORD

Guy Fuller, recently discharged patrolman, this afternoon filed suit against Sheriff Word for alleged false imprisonment and maltreatment at the hands of the sheriff, growing out of his detention last Saturday in connection with the arrest of a man named the character of the sheriff. He asks for \$5000 damages.

Soap Company Is Fined. Distributing advertising matter was held a violation of the city ordinance governing licenses this morning in the municipal court in the case brought against the J. J. Chemical Soap company of Rutherford, N. J. The case was made upon the information furnished by the license inspectors. In distributing the advertising one of the agents was present at the home of City Commissioner C. A. Bigelow. Judge Stevenson held that the company must take out a license covering work done the past three weeks and pay a fine of \$10 for not complying with the ordinance.

EVICTED MOTHER WITH 3 CHILDREN NEEDS FURNITURE

CHARLES STARR MAY HAVE BEEN MURDERED

Aberdeen, Wash., March 5.—That Charles Starr, son of Henry Starr of Portland, met with foul play here, is being stated today. The body of Starr, a sailor, was found in a street lodging house, lying on the bed with a bullet in the brain. Starr was found there Monday afternoon. He was found the next evening by the landlady, who did not go to make up Starr's room with the others during the day. She forgot it, she says. Starr was known to have considerable money. When his effects were examined at the morgue, no money was found. No one heard the pistol shot. Starr came here to find a ship to sail on. He was in the best of health and the best of spirits, it is said. He was not a drinking man.

Constant rumor is going to local two men who were last seen with Starr.

BOY WITH GUN SCARES MOTHER AND FATHER

Pendleton, Or., March 5.—Sheriff's deputies are today in pursuit of George Howard, 17 years old, who is alleged, attempted to kill his father this morning. Young Howard has a 22 rifle with him but it is not believed he has been using it. He is out on parole from the state reformatory school, to which he has been committed twice, once for shooting through the windows of a passing train, and once for robbing a hardware store.

Since his parole he has been arrested for shooting peasants. This morning he secured a gun and terrified his father and mother.

ELEVATOR MEN OWN COMMISSION HOUSES

Washington, March 5.—The existence of a big interlocking organization between elevator owners, commission merchants and grain buyers charged today by Attorney Benjamin Drake of the Equity Cooperative Exchange, Minneapolis, a witness before the house committee on commerce.

The elevator proprietors, he asserted, own more than half the commission houses, which supposedly represent the business of the city of Minneapolis.

MARSHFIELD DUDS OPERATE IN SALOON

Lehto had been drinking about the saloon and talking with friends in the rear room when he was left alone, two masked men entered, and one held him by the throat, while the other took his money.

SPECIAL PATROLMAN HEALY BETTER TODAY

Tim Healy, a special patrolman, shot in a recent encounter with an armed highwayman on Portland Heights, who had been in a serious condition for the past few days, is reported to be very much improved today. He is at St. Vincent's hospital.

For several days it was feared that his recovery was impossible, but a decided change for the better has come.

Sues Drug Company.

Alleging that Woodard, Clarke & Co. sold drugs to his wife after he had notified them of her death, the practice, Carl A. Hayner, a laborer of St. Johns, this morning filed suit for \$50,000 damages against the company. He alleges that December 17, 1913, he gave orders that no more laudanum should be sold to his wife, Helen Hayner. Hayner alleges that his wife first took the drug in the spring of 1913 to relieve pain during the temporary illness in the form of a beverage which she purchased from the store. Now he alleges she is a mental and physical wreck.

Hearing Is Being Held. Bernardo Garando, the Italian arrested by Police Officer Lillis at 88 North Main street Tuesday night, against whom a charge of white slavery has been placed, is being given a hearing before United States Commissioner R. M. McMillen this afternoon. It is charged that Garando, under the guise of friendship for Jennie Sarpo, an Italian woman whose husband is serving a life sentence in the penitentiary, brought the woman from her home in Sacramento and forced her into an immoral life.

Samuel Hill Returns. Samuel Hill, president of the Home Telephone and Telegraph company of Portland, has returned from a trip to California, having visited San Francisco, Santa Barbara and Los Angeles. He was invited to address the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce on the occasion of its annual dinner.

He will be present on account of the recent floods in Southern California. He was marooned at Santa Barbara for seven days.

Physician Deserts Florence. Florence, Or., March 5.—Dr. Merle C. Fox, physician and surgeon, left yesterday for Lakeview, Or., where he will make his home. Dr. Fox has practiced here for two and one-half years.

CITY HEALTH OFFICER IS DIRECTED TO GIVE ALL OF TIME TO CITY

Frequent Complaints Are Assigned as Reason; Conditions Causing Comment.

Mayor H. R. Albee said this morning that he had instructed City Health Officer M. B. Marcellus that he must give full time to the city's service, and not divide the health department work with his private practice.

The city health officer said that he had arranged to comply with the instruction by the extent to which he would put in office hours from 8 until 12 and from 2 until 5, but that he would feel at liberty out of office hours to attend to private practice, and that he would not feel justified in continuing as city health officer under the present salary of \$350 a month unless he was given the liberty of private practice out of office hours. Section 141 of the commission charter says:

"All officers and employees receiving pay from this city shall devote their entire time during business hours to the duties of the health department, and be excused as in this charter provided."

Dr. Marcellus has never been excused from this charter requirement. He said this morning: "It is fair that I should be asked to give my entire time for the salary of \$350 a month. It was not my understanding when I took the office that I would be required to."

Afternoon for Private Practice. Dr. Marcellus' program has been to give certain hours of the morning to the duties of the health department, spending the afternoon in his private office in the Seiling building. He said this morning that while he had followed this practice he had attended to health department duties in his private office and had so responded to calls as to have put in a total of every more time than would be included in the term "office hours."

The mayor said he believed Dr. Marcellus had put in enough time, but that the instruction which he had received because Dr. Marcellus had divided time between public service and private practice had caused him to leave the instruction which he had received, where he has been observing since his return from an eastern trip.

Conditions Causing Complaints. Conditions in the city health department have occasioned a good deal of unfavorable comment. A majority of the health department employees are dissatisfied. One of them, Dr. Charles B. Ballard, chief sanitary officer, has resigned. Others have signified their partial intention of resigning. It is freely charged that some of the inspectors have neglected their duties and much of their time to their own private business. Until very recently no daily reports were required from inspectors.

Charge has also been made that under the administration of Dr. Marcellus the appropriation for supplies and maintenance was being spent so rapidly that after a few months there would be none of it left.

When asked for the information, C. A. Bigelow, commissioner of finance, said that this morning figures that in part substantiate the charges. The hospital bills, for instance, have greatly increased. The city has an arrangement with St. Vincent's and Good Samaritan hospitals for care of city patients at \$1 a day each. Frequent and rigid inspection is said to be necessary to prevent having patients in the hospital at city expense longer than there is any necessity for their being.

The commissioner of finance said the city has paid for the hospital care of patients \$2500 and that half of it was \$1250.

"I don't know anything about that," was the answer. "I leave such matters to the chief sanitary officer, I wouldn't want to eat them myself," he added.
