WOULD LESSEN TAX BURDEN OF PEOPLE

Waste of Public Funds and Remedy, Discussed by W. A. Carter.

High prices for commodities, tax burdens, their causes and the remedies therefor, were discussed by W. A. Carter, candidate for governor on the republican ticket, at a representative meeting of the Ladies' Social Service club, at Oak Park yesterday.

Extravagant expenditure of public funds was declared by Mr. Carter to be responsible, in part, for the present heavy burdens on the shoulders of the taxpayer and the private individual in the home.

"Eliminate some of the many boards and commissions, and consolidate the work done by them in the hands of fewer boards and a long step will have been taken toward reaching a solution of the present economic problems," said the speaker.

"I am for the home owner and the people as a whole and any system which tends to place extra burdens on the people ought to be wiped out," he added. "For instance, we now have a multitude of boards and commissions. Each one requires an extra help and means an added expense of administration which must, in the end, be paid by the people."

The destruction of tons of meats and products annually by local dealers was scored by Mr. Carter. It was pointed out that enough food was destroyed last year to feed 25 per cent of the people of the city. These supplies were destroyed in order that they should not be put upon the market at a figure under the regular market price. It was explained.

"This system is all wrong," said the speaker. "It would be better for the dealer and better for the people if these goods had been sold at reduced prices. Where the merchant now discounts, he should be allowed to do so."

He said: "Recently we saw where the school board negotiated for the purchase of a site for a public school for a consideration of \$51,000, whereas the tax value was only \$15,000. One of our citizens, C. S. Jackson, brought suit to enjoin the board from making this deal. The suit was lost, but the action taken by Mr. Jackson is sure to have a beneficial effect. The people are being aroused by this kind of publicity and in time to come such system will, I hope, be eliminated."

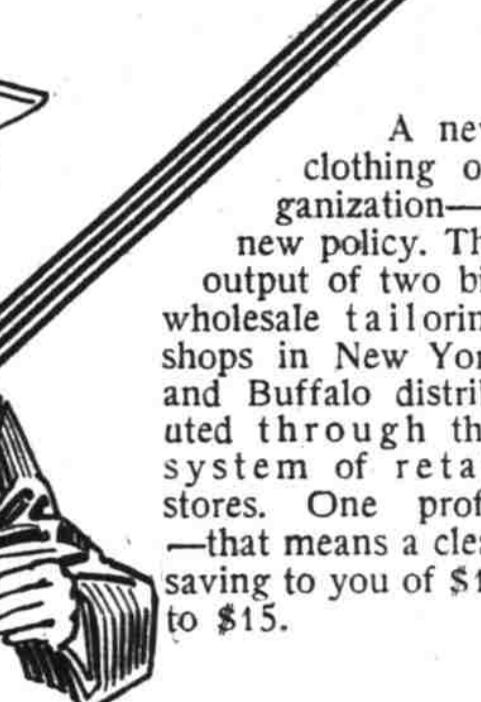
