

# CLARK WON'T ATTACK WILSON PERSONALLY ON TOLLS, IS BELIEF

Four Hour Debate Tomorrow Will End House Discussion, With Vote in Afternoon.

**FINAL VOTE TOMORROW**  
Minor Speeches for and Against Repeal Take Up Time of the Day's Session.

(United Press Special Wire.)  
Washington, March 30.—The belief was growing this afternoon that Speaker Clark will not attack President Wilson when he speaks against the canal tolls repeal resolution. Either Representative Adamson or Representative Covington will reply to Clark, and they indicated this afternoon that they intended to speak entirely upon the speaker's address whether there would be peace or war.

Only nine of the 29 hours allotted for debate on the Sims resolution had been spent when the house met at noon today. The session will end at 7 o'clock this evening, leaving four hours of debate for tomorrow. The speaker will come the vote on the resolution itself.

A final vote on the Sims resolution for the repeal of the exemption clause in the Panama canal will be reached in the house tomorrow afternoon, according to the prediction today of house leaders.

Today's session was devoted to minor speeches both for and against the repeal.

**Hamilton Defends Wilson.**  
Representative Hamilton of Michigan, a Republican, defended President Wilson's stand on the tolls question.

Seated in an invalid chair in front of Speaker Clark's desk, Representative L'Engle, a sufferer from rheumatism, denounced the Sims resolution and also England's attitude on the tolls question.

Representative Knowland of California again reiterated this afternoon the charge that Shirley Henn had reported in London that President Wilson had agreed to the tolls repeal and also that the peace centenary appropriation would be acted upon to the satisfaction of England.

"If the president would read my speech carefully," said Knowland, "he would see that I had not charged there was any deal. I merely said that if there had been any deal, and if there had been, that there was some misconception about the situation, and also that it was due to the president's failure to take the people into his confidence."

"As for the Henn incident, I have it on reliable authority from London, and if it becomes necessary I will disclose the name of my informant."

**Heard of Henn's Report.**  
"I do not know whether Mr. Henn saw President Wilson or not, but I do say that Mr. Henn reported in England that the two matters would be arranged to England's satisfaction, and that he credited the statement to the president."

Representative Bell also spoke against the repeal.

"The Democrats are listening to their master's voice and are brushing their treaty with a few of the graceful sentences and at the same time giving out veiled forebodings."

Bell said: "If we believe all they tell us we might expect to hear something of the Japanese bombarding California and other nations blowing up New York and other seaboard cities. The people resent these frantic appeals to break down the party's platform."

Well Known Lawyer Laid to Rest in Riverside Cemetery. Prominent Members of Bench, Bar Are Pallbearers.

Funeral services were held this morning at Finley's undertaking parlors for Edward NeSmith Deady, local attorney, who died at his home, 1546 Curless avenue, Saturday night.

The Rev. John Dawson, pastor of the Church of the Good Shepherd, officiated in the chapel and at a private service in Riverside cemetery.

Judge William B. Gilbert, Judge L. B. Stearns, Judge Henry E. McGinn, Frederick V. Holman, Thomas Scott Broadbent, Scott Smith, D. Walter Tilford and U. S. brothers, Dr. Henderson, and Fred Strong served as pallbearers. Honoring the memory of Mr. Deady, Judge McGinn did not hold court this morning.

Edward NeSmith Deady was the son of the late Judge Matthew P. Deady, for 40 years United States judge in Oregon. He was born on a farm at South Yamhill, September 15, 1853, and was admitted to the bar in 1880. Due to the effects of an attack of diabetes Mr. Deady gave up his active practice about 14 years ago.

Inconspicuous seat in the rear of the chamber instead of the one usually reserved for the war minister, with the other members of the cabinet, he considered it his duty to retire to relieve his colleagues of embarrassment.

The king, Asquith stated, approved his decision to take the war portfolio himself.

The conservatives plan to have one of their members of parliament resign and run for reelection in the same district as Asquith in the hope of cutting down his vote as much as possible.

Viscount Morley, lord president of the council, who presumably was identified with War Minister Seely in the military preparations of the cabinet, would also resign. In fact, Lord Curzon did ask, in the house of lords, why Morley had not resigned at the same time as Seely, and Morley promised an answer tomorrow.

London, March 30.—According to dispatches received here today from Belfast, Nationalists last night attacked three uniformed Ulster volunteers in the street. The police interfered before anyone was injured.

# COUNTY, SCHOOL AND CITY OFFICIALS WILL HOLD JOINT MEETING

Use of Portion of Poor Farm by Municipality and Site for School Coming Up.

# SESSION FIRST OF KIND

Several Other Matters of Importance to Occupy Attention of Three Governing Bodies.

The first combined meeting of the city commissioners, county commissioners and members of the school board is to be held at 8 o'clock tonight in the office of the county commissioners. Several questions pertinent to those governing bodies will probably be discussed, principally among them being the proposed use of a portion of the Multnomah county farm for the establishment of a municipal industrial and detention home for women, and the exchange of city property for school property.

Plans had been considered by Mayor Albion for the purchase of a 31 acre tract near Troutdale, owned by H. C. Campbell, for \$8000. The assessed valuation of this tract is \$2600. Following suggestions made by County Commissioner Holman that arrangements be made for the use of the county farm for the establishment of the home instead of purchasing additional property, the Campbell offer was eliminated by the city commission last week. Tentative arrangements for the use of a portion of the county land will be probably discussed at the meeting tonight.

The members of the school board have been considering a site for the location of the new Shattuck school, and it has been suggested that the city donate the old reservoir property at Sixth and Grant streets, providing the school board purchases enough property along the highway to complete Torwilliger boulevard to the park blocks.

No meetings have yet been held between the school board and the city commissioners to consider this scheme, so it is likely that a tentative plan will be agreed upon tonight. Several other matters of importance will engage the attention of the members of the three governing bodies.

They then chose between execution and joining the rebels to the rank and file, nearly all of whom accepted the latter alternative.

# Tells of Brutality of Rebel Soldiers.

Mexico City, March 30.—Blood-curdling story of brutality practiced by rebel troops was told today by Daniel Mier, an engineer and the only survivor of the crew of a freight train on the Mexican National railway which ran into a battle between rebels and federal near El Oro.

The government troops, defeated, stopped the train and made for the freight cars, Mier said. They were overtaken by the rebels, he declared, and the battle continued until all the government troops were either killed or wounded.

"Then the rebels took me, Fireman Ortiz, Brakeman Pena and a coal passer, as prisoners," Mier said. "We were taken to a spot where a federal prisoner stood surrounded by rebels. A rebel officer turned to us and said: 'Here's how we slaughter federal prisoners.'"

"He then shot twice at the prisoner from a distance of 18 feet but missed both times. Then he walked up to the federal soldier, placed the muzzle of his revolver to the man's forehead and fired. The federal went to his death with a contemptuous smile on his lips."

# HOUSEWIVES ARE REMINDED

Garbage Cans Left Open at Times, It Is Said.

"That a number of housewives and others are negligent in not keeping the covers on garbage cans and as a result breeding places are established for flies," is the statement made by City Health Officer Marcellus, who today issued orders to his inspectors to see that all cans for refuse are kept tightly covered. The ordinance requiring the tight covering of all garbage receptacles is specific and unless it is obeyed, according to Dr. Marcellus, arrests will follow.

# TABERNACLE IS CLOSED

Haven for Unemployed Will Now Undergo "House Cleaning."

The Gipsy Smith tabernacle, used for several months as shelter for the unemployed, was closed today and members of the "house committee" started housecleaning. The official closing will not occur until Tuesday night, April 1, having been set as the last day for its use as a home for the unemployed.

# His Sanity Is Questioned.

San Francisco, March 30.—Roy Snyder, who last Saturday demanded \$10,000 from William R. Corbin under penalty of death, appeared today before Judge Deasy. The charge of extortion was dismissed, but Snyder was taken to the detention hospital for observation as to his sanity.

# 35,000 Miners Strike.

London, March 30.—Thirty-five thousand Yorkshire coal miners struck today and as many more are to go out Thursday. They demand higher pay.

# KILL THE FLY, WILL BE THE BATTLE SLOGAN IN FIGHT UPON PEST

Portland School Children to Strive for Prizes in Campaign to Last Ten Days.

**PENNANT WILL BE GIVEN**  
Bulletin, Dealing Exclusively With Disease-Breeding Features, Issued By City Health Department.

**Fight Launched Today.**  
The campaign for the destruction of flies and the improvement of sanitary conditions in the city was launched this morning among the schools when a group of Reed college students in automobiles made rapid tour of all the schools, enlisting 2,000 children in the prize contest for the destruction of the greatest number of flies and for the most radical improvement of sanitary conditions in each district. The work of today was under the auspices of the Portland Parent-Teacher association, Mrs. F. S. Myers, president, personally directing the tour. The Reed college team consisted of Blittner, Brann, French, Gilbert, Hauck, Howes, Johnson, Lancelotti, Miller, Runyan, Smith, Lackey, Young, Bradford, Piper, Schell, Miss Williams, Miss Wolverson, DuBrulle, Miss Calkins.

"Kill the fly and destroy his breeding place."

This will be the battle cry that will resound tonight when the 10 days' campaign to make Portland a flyless city and Oregon a flyless state is instituted.

The school child of Portland that crushes the life out of the greatest number of flies will receive a cash prize of \$25. The one that destroys the next greatest number will receive \$15. The one with the third score will receive \$10. Fourth place will bring \$5. In addition there will be 10 prizes of \$1 each.

A prize of \$5, in cash, will be given the school child from the sixth to the ninth grades, inclusive, who writes the best essay on the fly. This essay must be in the hands of the committee by Friday, April 3.

Pennants will be given, one on each day of the contest, to the school which brings in the most flies for that day.

**Bulletin Is Issued.**  
Further information concerning prizes may be had at the campaign headquarters which have been opened on the fourth floor at Meier & Frank's store.

The city health bureau has issued a bulletin exclusively devoted to the fly campaign, giving reasons for a relentless war and tactics to be pursued in bringing it to a successful issue.

In addition to this bulletin, Professor Wilson of the department of entomology of the Agricultural college has prepared in bulletin form a statement for general distribution. Arrangements have been made to send 5000 copies of the bulletin to Portland and 15,000 to other cities of the state. The copies will be sent to commercial clubs, offices of women's organizations and to schools with the suggestion that they immediately organize.

Outlining a general plan of campaign, Professor Wilson says: "Our problem is to destroy the fly before it reaches the house at all, and while this may seem a gigantic task, it is really a simple matter if the right forces can be brought together in harmonious cooperation. Two practical methods of destroying flies have been advanced: First, by doing away with the breeding places. Second, by catching the flies as soon as they emerge and before they have a chance to lay their eggs."

**Must Dispose of Refuse.**  
"The first and by far the most important consists of the immediate disposal of all refuse or other substances in which flies may breed. Where this is not possible the treatment of refuse with such materials as will destroy or prevent the development of larvae must be resorted to. The second consists in placing fly traps around the house and in places frequented by flies so as to catch them whenever they appear. This method is based on the fact that flies are readily attracted to baits of meat, etc., and when these are placed above cages made of wire screen the flies work into the cages, which are so arranged that they cannot get out. They may then be destroyed by pouring hot water over them or by burning sulphur under the cage."

The bulletin also outlines the organization of campaigns by communities. As a reason for exterminating the fly, the bulletin says he is the carrier of the following diseases: "Typhoid, dysentery, diarrhoea, tuberculosis, cholera, typhus, scarlet fever, diphtheria and possibly anthrax, plague, scarlet fever, spinal meningitis and anterior poliomyelitis, which is generally incorrectly called infantile paralysis."

# ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Frederick M. DeNeffe, member of the firm of Conley & DeNeffe, local attorney, has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for the state legislature from Multnomah county.

In his platform Mr. DeNeffe favors lower taxes, semi-annual payment of taxes without penalty, and a reasonable discount for payment in full before April 1; rigid economy in appropriations without retarding the development of the state; the enactment of fewer but more effective laws; the enactment of laws that will tend to develop the natural resources of the state; abolition of useless state commissions and consolidation of remaining commissions into a sane and business-like legislative session.

Mr. DeNeffe was graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan in 1905 and has been engaged in the practice of law in Portland for seven and one-half years. He was chief clerk of the senate judiciary committee during the legislative session of 1909. He is a member of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club.

# KNOWLAND'S SPEECH IS 'CROWNING INSULT' DECLARES PRESIDENT

Wilson Tells Story to Illustrate His View of Attacks Made on Him in Congress.

**SUBSIDY UNDEMOCRATIC**  
President Says Democrats Need Not Fear Going Against Free Tolls Plank When Platform Denounces Subsidies.

Washington, March 30.—President Wilson today resented as "the crowning insult" Representative Knowland's charge on the floor of the house that he had entered into a bargain with England whereby the exemption clause of the Panama canal tolls act would be eliminated in return for England's support of America's Mexican policy.

Replying to a specific question as to whether he had entered into any deal with Sir William Tyrrell, President Wilson said:

"It is just the crowning insult of a number of insults that have been injected into the tolls debate."

The whole thing reminds me of a story of a very effective debate which I saw in a newspaper. It was a very hostile to him for a debate. The people down there did not like the job very well, but they put up with it because they liked best, a big husky fellow named Tom. The challenger was given the first hour of a two hours' debate and had not spoken more than 30 minutes when it was evident that he had convinced the audience that he was on the right side. One of Tom's partisans from the rear of the hall, however, rose to his feet and shouted: "Tom, call him a liar and make him fight." That is the stage this debate has reached.

The president was especially incensed at Knowland's allegations. He said he regretted that the debate had degenerated into an organized attempt to discredit his administration, but he insisted that the repeal resolution was certain of passage.

President Wilson said that not all of those opposing him were participating in the "campaign of misrepresentation." He also declared he did not expect the party to be disrupted on account of the tolls dispute, and he said the question was merely a capital surgical operation and pointed to two planks in the Democratic platform declaring against subsidies, either direct or indirect.

**Grey Denies Agreement.**  
London, March 30.—Foreign Minister Sir Edward Grey denied in the house of commons today that there was any Anglo-American understanding back of President Wilson's request for repeal of American coastwise shipping's exemption from Panama canal tolls. "It has been stated," he said, "that under the terms of such an understanding England is agreed to support President Wilson's Mexican policy. There is no foundation for these reports."

# Kilfoil Says Girl Will Admit Guilt

San Diego, Cal., March 30.—Lillian Palmer is out of danger, her physician announced today. Both she and her child will live.

A statement will be taken concerning the charges of Philip Kilfoil of Los Angeles that the Palmer girl poisoned his sister, Kate, as soon as the little mother is able to be questioned.

Subpenas were issued today for witnesses to appear before the grand jury tomorrow to testify in an inquiry that will be made into the poisoning of Mary Kilfoil, sister of the accused.

Kilfoil in his cell in the county jail is optimistic, declaring the suspicion under which he is now placed will be lifted when the testimony of Lillian Palmer is obtained.

# Cricket Is Bar Bound.

Repeal action will be supplied by the first which damaged her here three weeks ago, the American steamer Cricket could not make the passage over the bar yesterday when she attempted to put to sea. The Cricket is bound for San Francisco under her own steam to be overhauled. She put out at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, but after finding how stormy it was, she was ordered to return to the bar.

Captain Welman decided not to risk trying to go on out, and put back into Astoria. It is believed he will make another attempt today should the storm have moderated.
