Superintendents Asked to Use Best Efforts to Interest the Pupils of Different Schools.

DRAG USE IS SUGGESTED

Cooperation Necessary Between All Interested, Teachers, Students and Parents; Organization Plan.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., March 21.-In connec tion with the movement to observe April 25 as good roads day throughout Oregon, State School Superintendent J. A. Churchill is sending out letters calling upon all the county superintendents to use their best efforts to get the school children in every district to drag the main road between school louses on that day.

This is but one feature of a program suggested by Superintendent Churchill to increase interest in good roads and turn it to practical use. Mr. Churchill is one of three appointed by the Portland Ad club as a committee to assist in perfecting an organization that would make good roads day productive of the best results. The other two members are Superintendent R. Alderman and O. M. Plummer of

"Feeting assured of your cooperation," says Superintendent Churchill in his letter to county superintendents "I am suggesting that through th schools we begin now to prepare to do our part in observing the day by interesting the teachers and the children. I have roughly outlined the following, which I hope will be suggestive in bringing about the desired re-

"Create proper sentiment through newspapers. Send letter to teacher: requesting cooperation. Send letter to city superintendents urging coopera tion. Have the children interest their perents in the movement. Arrange fer proper literature to be distributed to teachers and pupils. Emphasize im ortance of good roads day through the language lesson. Use drag and graders on roads April 25."

TESTS ARE SATISFACTORY

Birch and Maple No Longer Alone in Pield of Adaptability. Samples Are Sent to Salem.

(Salem Buresu of The Journal.) Salem, Or., March 31.—That red alder, which covers much of the river bottom land of the Willamette valley, is suitable for manufacturing clothes Reinhardt capsized his aeroplane and pins, broom handles, matches, pulleys and saddle trees, and could be put to profitable use for these purposes, the advice given Secretary Fred S. Bynon of the Salem Commercial club by H. B. Oakleaf, who has charge of forest products in connection with the United States forest service, Portland. Mr. Oakleaf sent Mr. Bynon a sample of clothespins made out of the wood.

"Birch and maple are the only woods in the northwest which were considered sultable for this purpose (making clothespins) and they occur in such imited quantities that we considered t advisable to test the adaptability of red alder for such use," wrote Mr. Oak-"The experiment proved quite leaf. ond only to beech and birch in clothespin making qualities.

"Red alder is also suitable for broom handles, matches, pulleys and saddle Mr. Oakleaf suggests that such a manufacturing industry would greatly

Albany in Line. Albany, Or., March 31 .- That lothespin factory, or any other industry that could utilize red alder (Alnus Oregona) would be successful if estabished in Linn county, was indicated in a letter received yesterday at the commercial club from the department of agriculture, announcing the discovery that red alder makes good clothes-

"Such an industry would assist farmers in clearing land," says the letter, "for this tree is usually found on deep, rich soil, and must be burned when preparing such land for agriculture.

A dozen clothespins made out of red alder at the request of the department to test the adaptibility of the wood, were enclosed under separate cover. It is declared that the alder has proved second only to beech, birch and maple in clothespin making. There is much alder in Linn county
