

FLY CAMPAIGN WILL PROCEED IN SPITE OF DR. WHITE'S PROTEST

Committee Makes Decision After Listening to State Health Officer's Reasons.

ASK JINTED QUESTIONS

Chairman Wants to Know Reason for Neglect to Make Position on Subject Known Until Last Moment.

Courteously but decisively, the anti-fly campaign committee "sat upon" Dr. Calvin R. White, state health officer, yesterday. His eleventh hour interview of protest against the campaign were declared without force by Mrs. F. S. Myers, chairman of the committee; L. R. Alderman, superintendent of schools; Professor Harry Beal Torrey of Reed college, J. D. Mickie, state dairy and food commissioner, and others.

"Dr. White could make as good an argument on the other side if he wished to," commented Dr. M. E. Marcellus, city health officer.

The state health officer appeared before the committee at its headquarters in the Meier & Frank store yesterday afternoon and made his statement. After listening to him the committee confirmed its intention of proceeding along the lines of its original plan.

Mrs. Myers very pointedly asked the state health officer why he had neglected all previous invitations to attend committee meetings and give the benefit of his wisdom at a time when plans were being made. Instead of waiting until the opening of the campaign and then giving interviews to the newspapers, Dr. White answered that he had never been formally notified of his appointment as a member of the committee.

Told He Was Not Wanted. "The Commercial club told me I wasn't wanted as a member," he added. "What did the Commercial club have to do with the matter?" he was asked.

Dr. White was unable to reply. He admitted that he had no police powers to stop the campaign, but was merely voicing his disagreement with its methods. He said he was in sympathy with destroying the places where flies breed, but was opposed to having the children handle "the putrefying carcasses of dead flies." He was assured that instructions had been that children were not to handle the flies, but to brush them up on a sheet of paper, then transfer them to other containers, glass jars or other containers, and immediately thereafter to wash their hands.

Menace Is Slight. Professor Torrey observed that he really could not see much menace in a fly's body, as the softer portions of its body, tiny in quantity, are enclosed in a shell.

Dr. White himself, while painting with words the hazards of counting flies, said that statements as to the number of organisms borne by flies are grossly exaggerated and that, at this season, there are probably not over 1000 flies in the city.

A motion was made to settle Dr. White's doubts as to his membership on the committee by formally electing him, but after a few more comments by him, including a declaration, the motion was withdrawn. The committee will proceed according to plan without Dr. White's services.

From Seattle comes the flash that Titta Ruffo created a veritable sensation as Tonio in "Pagliacci" Monday night, when the Chicago grand opera company opened its season there. Tomorrow night the famous baritone will sing Tonio in the company's opening performance here at the Orpheum.

At San Francisco Ruffo was indisposed with a cold, and hence the appearance in Seattle Monday night was his first on the Pacific coast, and word of his success was therefore awaited here with the keenest of interest. That he completely captivated the audience is indicated by press dispatches, in which he is hailed as one of the greatest singers in the world.

Mary Garden, who appears here Saturday evening as "Tosca," passed through Portland yesterday afternoon en route to Seattle, to sing the same role there tonight. She was happy as a lark, with but one regret, that she could not leave the train and remain in Portland till Saturday night.

No State Funds to Return Fugitives

Governor West Again Explains That County Officials Must Be Responsible for Any Expense Incurred.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., April 1.—For the information of District Attorney C. T. Godwin of Baker, and others who may be ignorant of affairs relative to the issuance of requisitions by the governor's office, Governor West today explained again that the fund appropriated by the last legislature for the return to the state of fugitives from justice is exhausted and requisitions are being issued only when the county officials will be responsible for the expense connected with them.

In an interview, District Attorney Godwin attacked Governor West for declining to issue a requisition for Martin Knezevich, indicted in connection with the Copperfield lawlessness, until Godwin provided for defraying the expense of going after Knezevich. Godwin referred to a number of requisitions issued at the request of District Attorney Evans of Multnomah.

"We gave out to the district attorneys and the public through the press that there were no more funds for returning fugitives from justice," said Governor West. "Whenever the fund of the emergency board law prohibiting deficiencies, this office is not in position to issue requisitions unless the county courts or others provide the necessary funds."

"Regarding the requisitions referred to by Godwin in his interview, the expense was taken care of by District Attorney Evans. Whenever the district attorney of Baker county will arrange to take care of the expense the same as the others are doing, we will be glad to issue the requisition."

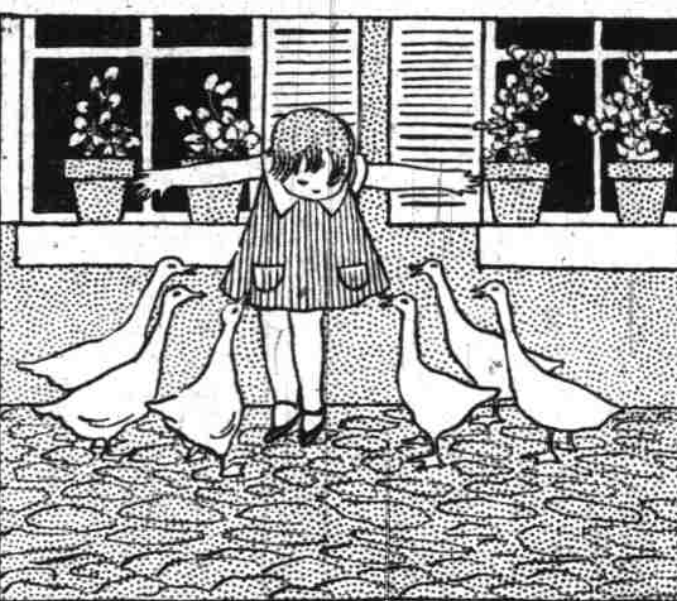
