

WILL ASK CONGRESS TO HELP SEND NAVAL MILITIA TO PANAMA

Secretary of the Navy Tells
General Finzer and Governor
West of Plans.

CONSIDERING CRUISES

No Decision Yet on Matter of Assign-
ing Battleship Oregon to Local
Guard for Training.

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.)
Salem, Or., April 1.—Congress is to be asked to make an appropriation to enable the naval militia of the country to participate in the ceremonies attending the opening of the Panama canal and exposition in San Francisco next year. Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels advised Governor West in letters received today that it is understood unofficially that the Naval Militia Association of the United States is preparing to take the matter up with congress at the proper time. Secretary Daniels, whose letter was addressed to Adjutant General Finzer and of which a copy was forwarded to the governor, as he had taken these matters pertaining to the Oregon naval militia up with the secretary personally on his recent visit to Washington, said that in the event the naval militia did participate in the ceremonies it would not be probable that the Oregon organization could be assigned to the battleship Oregon, as it was the intention to man her as far as practicable with men of the regular navy who had served on her.

Secretary Daniels said that the question of assigning the Oregon to the Oregon naval militia as a training ship after the San Francisco fair, had been taken under advisement, and that a decision will be reached later. He also advised that the question of detailing ships of the regular service to cruise with the naval militia of the country this summer was being considered. The Oregon militia wants a cruise to Honolulu.

Investigate Lumber Company.
Salem, Or., April 1.—His attention attracted to the Dubois Lumber company by the fight being made by the company to resist payment of certain special road and port taxes levied in Clatsop county, Governor West said that an investigation of the company's timber holdings was being made. He said the company had secured large timber holdings through lieu land selections in the early days when such selections were not closely guarded, and that the matter was being thoroughly checked up.

Governor Has Explanation.
Salem, Or., April 1.—Governor West today said that statements coming from Baker county that J. J. Burns, who was chosen councilman of Copperfield following the ousting of Mayor Stewart and his crowd, was a convict paroled by the governor, were not true. The governor said Burns was a convict who served his term before West was elected to office and that when it was reported to him that Burns had since been law abiding he restored Burns to the rights of citizenship.

Malone Is Appointed.
Salem, Or., April 1.—Wade H. Malone of Corvallis has been appointed county judge of Benton county by Governor West to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Victor P. Moses, who has been appointed postmaster.

Ulvin Has Filed.
Salem, Or., April 1.—A. A. Ulvin of Silverton has filed his declaration of candidacy for the Republican nomination for representative in Marion county.

Struck Her With a Telephone.
San Francisco, April 1.—Alleging that her husband struck her with a telephone, Mrs. Clara Fitzgerald sued for divorce from James V. Fitzgerald, real estate man. Mrs. Fitzgerald has \$23,000 in her own right.

Expert Service In Two Weeks

Southern Pacific Expected to Handle
Freight and Passengers, Eugene to
Coos Bay, in Fast Time.

Eugene, Or., April 1.—The Southern Pacific company is expected to begin regular passenger and freight service on the new Coos Bay line out of Eugene in about two weeks. Tariff sheets have been sent from this city to the company's offices in Portland for approval. It is said to be the plan of the company to attach a passenger coach to the regular work train which leaves Eugene for the "front" every morning and returns in the evening. The service would be extended as far as the line is completed, a short distance west of the Noti tunnel. The track that far is well ballasted and the work trains make good time. It is believed that through service will not be started from Eugene to the coast before autumn.

Ohio Coal Miners Quit.
Cleveland, Ohio, April 1.—Forty-five thousand Ohio coal miners quit work today. Their wage agreement with the owners expired at midnight and their representatives could not come to terms with the employers on a new scale. Miners' union leaders predicted much suffering among them.

AUTO CASES CONTINUED

All auto cases in the municipal court for violating the "headlight" ordinance were continued today until Saturday morning, to allow further consideration of the measure before the city council. While the matter is under consideration, the police are not enforcing the ordinance. Attorney Harrison Allen appears as counsel for the 45 men arrested last week for having such headlights on their machines.

Portland Firm Low Bidders

Offer to Build Exhibit Pavilion at
State Fair Grounds for \$15,000 Less
Than Legislature's Appropriation.

Salem, Or., April 1.—The contract for the new exhibit pavilion for the state fair grounds was awarded by the state fair board yesterday afternoon to the firm of LeDoux & LeDoux of Portland for \$44,700, which is over \$15,000 less than the appropriation made by the last legislature for the building. The Portland firm was the lowest among 13 bidders, nine from Portland and four from Salem.

State Architect W. C. Knighton says the surplus in the appropriation will be used to add an auditorium to the building.

Warner Company Gets Extension

Irrigation Concern Given Time That
Government May Finish Its Investi-
gation of the Water Supply.

Salem, Or., April 1.—Time of the preliminary contract of the Warner Valley Irrigation company, which is investigating a proposed irrigation project in Warner valley, was extended by the desert land board yesterday afternoon to December 1, 1914.

Bond Election Is On at Centralia

Plan Is to Take Up Outstanding War-
rants of a Higher Rate of Interest;
Franchise Also Considered.

Centralia, Wash., April 1.—A special bond and franchise election is holding the boards in Centralia today. The questions to be voted upon are the issuance of about \$118,000 in bonds to take up a like amount of outstanding warrants of a higher interest rate, and the granting of a 30-year franchise to the Washington Electric company to operate over certain streets on the east and west sides of the city, the apparent intention of the corporation being to form a physical connection for switching purposes between the large local mills and the Puget Sound & Willapa Harbor railway, a branch of the Milwaukee now building through here. A three-fifths majority is necessary to carry the bond issues.

Ernest West asked to have the extension limited to December, as he said he wanted the state to be unhampered by long contracts in the event a general plan for state and federal cooperation in taking over irrigation projects results from the conference called by the secretary of the interior to be held in Denver this month.

ing, reaches here at 6:30 p. m.

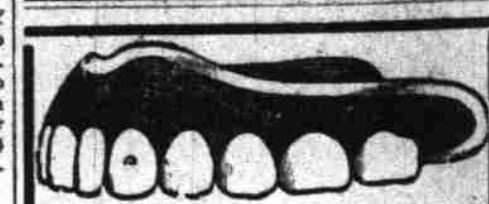
Lie Is Liability and The Truth an Asset
