

CHAMBERLAIN BILL HAS WORKED WONDERS ALREADY IN ALASKA

Northwest Also Shares in
New Spirit; Business Pick-
ing Up and Boats Crowded.

VIRGIN COUNTRY OPENED

Proposed Government Railroad Will
Tap Almost Virgin Country. Large
European Travel Is Predicted.

"The mere passage of the Alaska railroad bill has worked wonders in both Alaska and the northwest," said Leslie W. Hayes, Seattle representative of the Pacific-Alaska Navigation company and the Hamburg-American line, who was a Portland visitor yesterday.

"There is an entirely new spirit abroad. Everybody in Seattle is feeling better and business is picking up. Alaskan boats are so crowded that passengers are sleeping on the decks. Seattle papers contain two more pages of financial advertising and news each day. The proposed road will open an almost virgin country and its effect is already beginning to be felt."

"Of course, I have heard of your new Portland-Alaska route. It is a splendid move, but I am personally of the opinion that Portland should look to the interior rather than to the outside for her business. The whole of eastern Washington and Oregon can be made yours if you go after it."

"As regards Transatlantic business, everything indicates the largest European travel on record. It is an index of national prosperity if nothing else, and I am inclined to believe the financial stress we have been hearing about all winter has been mental rather than real."

"The Hamburg-American line has opened its northwest office in Seattle as that is the travel center of this part of the country. It is not probable that a Portland office will be opened until after the canal is opened, if then. Nor will our line open a passenger service until after the canal is opened."

All our business is being sold through New York. Our new boat, the Vaterland, reaches America in June. With the canal opened, the line is considering a round the world service in both directions, vessels going through both Suez and Panama canals, and making a complete circuit of the globe each trip."

Mr. Hayes was connected with the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul company at North Yakima before affiliating with the Hamburg-American company.

REPEAL FORCES SAY MAJORITY OF 16 CERTAIN

government's right to extend at any time complete or partial exemption of tolls to American coastwise or any other shipping. It states also that the protest England filed against such a construction of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty is recognized as presenting an international question suitable for arbitration, and directs the president to open negotiations with England with a view to such a step.

Pointdexter Has Amendment.
Senator Pointdexter of Washington, also introduced an amendment proposing that the upper house suspend consideration of the repeal proposition until the president informs the senate, confidentially, if he so desires, what are the unnamed members of "consequence and greater delicacy" than canal tolls. The Pointdexter resolution was formally admitted in Washington.

America's right to exempt its coastwise shipping from canal tolls and as "acts" that the British foreign minister in writing declared that many "material provisions in the Hay-Pauncefote treaty did not apply to the Panama canal, because the canal was constructed under conditions not contemplated by either party at the time the treaty was made."

Will Require Six Weeks.
The senators' opinion was that under their house's rules, it will take at least six weeks to dispose of the resolution. The president was anxious to make better time than this, and it was understood he was likely to make a personal effort with friendly lawmakers to have the proposition pushed, in order to hasten adjournment.

It was admitted that certain of the senators hope to make 1916 campaign capital out of the tolls debate, Borah and La Follette in particular having prepared long speeches against repeal. The president did not, however, look for any such display of bitterness in the senate as was shown during the debate in the lower house. Senators O'Gorman, Vandaman, Walsh and Chamberlain were considered the repeal resolution's opponents.

The upper house had received the resolution, following its passage by the representatives, and referred it to the canal tolls committee which stands 10 to 7 for and against the measure. The committee was expected to report it out without a recommendation in about a week.

Before Speaker Clark spoke yesterday Representative Humphrey of Washington assailed President Wilson. "The truth is," he said, "that the president fears Japan and desires the support of England. The president and Secretary of State Bryan have been outwitted as diplomats."

Representative Kent of California supported the repeal proposition.

Lafferty Like a Tomcat.
Representative Thomas of Kentucky, son of a minister, said:

"This is no place for a minister's son. I have been very much amused at the antics of Representative Lafferty. Ever since this debate started he has been jumping around like a tomcat on a pump handle."

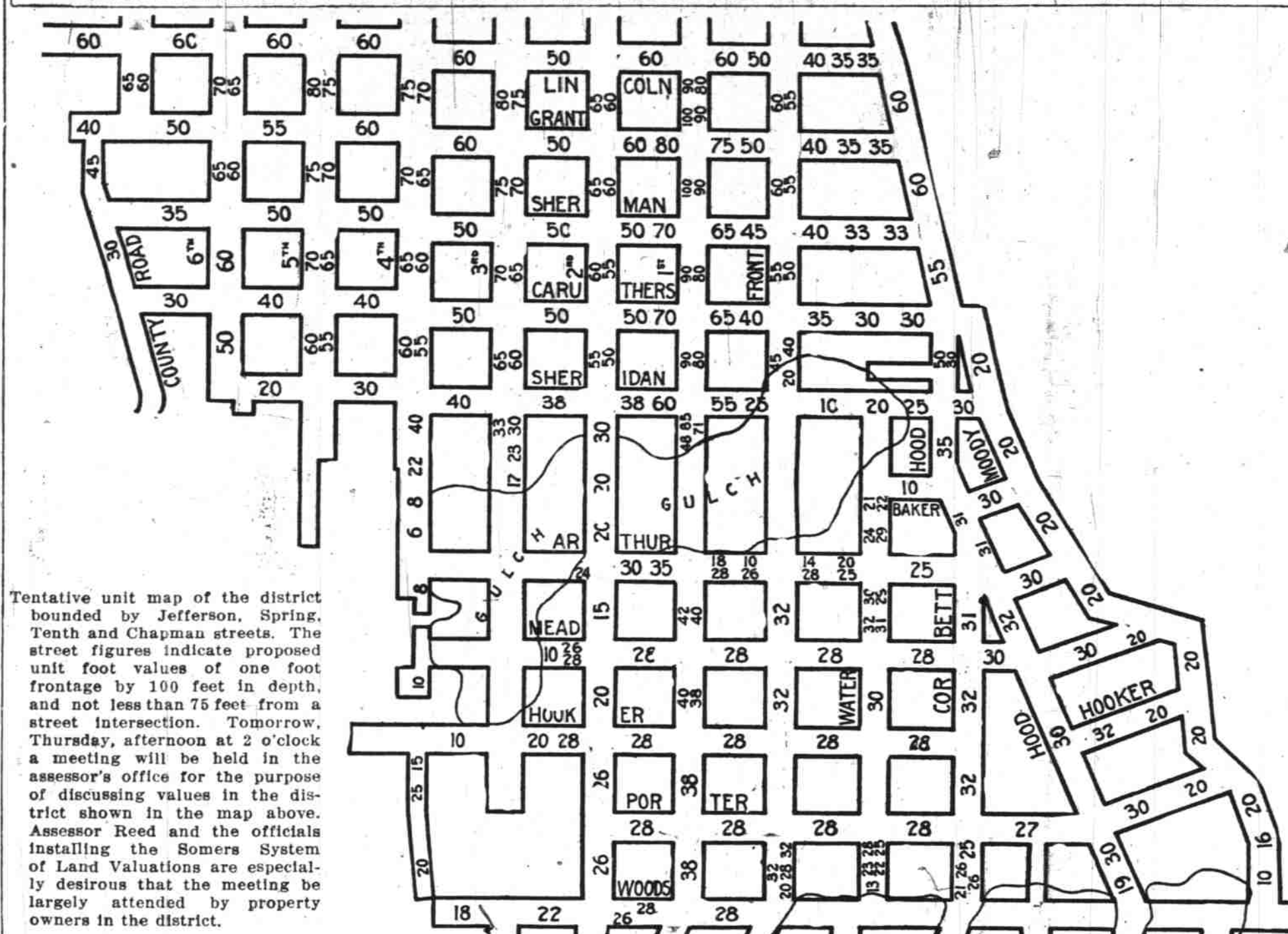

Ridicules Japanese War.
New York, April 1.—Commenting here today on the speech delivered in the senate Monday by Senator Lewis

of Illinois on the free canal tolls proposition, Dr. Shouko Sato, dean of the college of agriculture in Tohoku Imperial Japanese university, said: "War between the United States and Japan is out of the question. Even if it did come Japan would not seize the Philippines. We do not want them. Japan feels friendly toward America, and it is simply absurd for anyone to suppose that Japan is lending money to Mexico."
