School Betterment Shows.—The general conditions of the "William T. Lumbia, Clatsop, Tillamook and Coos counties are shown to be better than those of a number of other counties examined in the reports for March of the state school nurses. Mrs. Katherine J. Kelly and Miss Rosine Vreeland, received by the state board of health yesterday. Dr. Calvin B. White, secretary of the board, is also in receipt of a letter from H. L. Hopkins, superintendent of schools of Coos county, expressing appreciation of the stimulus being injected into school work by the school nurses.

Saloon Broken Into.—Caught in the act of breaking into the "William T. Lumbia, East Third and Burnside streets, this morning, Charles Miller and Peter Pehr ran from the place, but were later captured. The men were caught inside a meat market at Thirteenth and Washington streets a few weeks ago, arrested, but given a suspended sentence upon his promise of week employment. He was caught then by Patrolman Helms. Both men are under 25 years of age. In the municipal court this morning they were each given 15 days on the workhouse. Both pleaded guilty to vagrancy.

Progressive Luncheon Tomorrow.—At the regular weekly luncheon of the Multnomah County Progressive club, to be held in the main parlor of the Portland hotel tomorrow at 12:15 p. m., Colonel Emmett Callahan will be the principal speaker. The topic of the day will be "What the Progressive Party Can Do for Oregon." L. M. Tilton, congressional candidate, and other candidates, are also expected to speak. Everyone is invited to hear Colonel Callahan, who is at the head of the Progressive Party in this county. He is of Oregon. E. B. Barker will be chairman of the day.

Sentenced to Rockpile.—For seeking to lure a 17-year-old girl into an immoral life, Sidney Carrick, former clerk in the Oxford hotel, yesterday was sentenced to 90 days on the rockpile and required to pay a fine of \$100 in the municipal court. Circumstances surrounding Carrick's actions were typical of the procurer in the slave traffic. The girl was employed in a department store. Carrick took her to dinner, telling her what an easy life she could have by going into the underworld. He was introduced to the girl by a mutual friend.

Damage Suit Compromised.—For an injured leg resulting from being struck by a cable while working in a logging camp near Clatskanie, Or., Axel Erickson, 18 years old, received \$1500 in settlement from the Oregon Timber company yesterday. The settlement was made in Circuit Judge Morrow's court, where the suit for \$20,000, brought by the boy's mother in his behalf, was to be tried.

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REPEAL OF FREE TOLL MEASURE HELD AS MENACE TO COAST

Flood of Telegrams Started to Congress by Pacific Coast Interests.

HEARING IS DEMANDED

Action by Senate Committee on Inter-oceanic Canals Asked Before Congress Decides on Issue.

Containing that repeal of the free toll measure would seriously affect shipping and that it is too vital a matter to dispose of without a most extensive investigation, commercial interests of the Pacific northwest yesterday started a flood of telegrams to the senators in congress.

It is most earnestly urged that hearings be held before the senate committee on interoceanic canals before final action is taken.

Resolutions were passed at a meeting held Friday afternoon at the Benson hotel by the West Coast Lumber Manufacturers' association, attended by representatives of a number of other lines of industry and business from different parts of the Pacific northwest and these are embodied in the telegrams. Representatives of other industries had been invited to the meeting because it was felt that the lumber industry, it is fully as vital to many other branches of industry and business.

W. B. Mackay, the North Pacific Lumber company, this city, who is president of the Lumber Manufacturers' association, presided at the meeting. It was one of the most representative gatherings ever held here.

The preamble and resolutions following: "Whereas, After due deliberation congress in prescribing rules to be observed by shipping in the use of the Panama canal as provided in the Hay-Pauncefote treaty has enacted into law a provision exempting American shipping engaged in coastwise-trade from payment of tolls for passing through the Panama canal, which act was approved by the United States; and

Whereas, A bill is now pending in congress which has for its purpose the repeal of said law so enacted; and Whereas, Such action is so antagonistic to the interests and national policy of this country as to justify the unalterable opposition of the citizens of the United States thereto, and believing that the action heretofore taken by congress is in no sense a violation of the said treaty, and that the repeal of the existing law would be an admission that Great Britain and other nations of the world had the right to interfere and intervene in our purely domestic affairs;

"Resolved, That we reaffirm our former declaration that there be no tolls charged through the canal on vessels coastwise flying the American flag and we most earnestly request that you continue to oppose the repeal of the present law and do all in your power to maintain the same as it now stands."

"Resolved further, That in view of the importance of the question, not only to the Pacific coast but to the American people, it is our belief that hearings should be held before the senate committee on interoceanic canals before a measure of such far reaching consequences is enacted upon, and we hereby respectfully request such hearings be held."

BECOMES CANDIDATE FOR CIRCUIT JUDGE

John Van Zante, well known lawyer of this city, announced his candidacy this morning for the democratic nomination for circuit judge, department No. 6, of the judicial district embraced by Multnomah county. Judge T. J. Cleaton, who aspires to the supreme court, is the present incumbent.

Mr. Van Zante has long been prominently identified with the democratic party in Multnomah county, although he has never sought office but once, running for county judge eight years ago. He was appointed to fill an unexpired term as municipal judge the last year of Mayor Lane's administration and at one time was chairman of the democratic county committee as well as chairman of the county convention.

Mr. Van Zante has been a resident of Portland for the past 26 years, coming here as a boy from Iowa. He made his way through the Oregon law school by running a sawmill and was admitted to the bar in 1887. At one time he was associated in the practice of law with J. J. Johnson, now candidate for the Republican nomination for attorney general.

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A Defender of the South. Portland, April 1.—To the Editor of The Journal—I would like to reply to "Sufrage and the South," which appeared in the Oregonian of March 21. The writer of that article attacks the chivalry of the southern gentlemen, openly declaring that they deprive women of their privileges and only honor them with their tongues. He also makes the alarming statement that our politicians have a "secret contempt" for the female sex, and give them no really substantial support. What a shameful accusation, coming from a sane party. I am utterly astonished at such language, and can not believe the writer has any acquaintance whatever with "southern gentlemen."
