

CALIFORNIA IS TAKING WATER; OREGON MAY RECEIVE NONE OF IT

New Pine Creek, Near Line,
Has Plant and Mains—
Supply Is Doubtful.

NEW LAW IS URGENT NEED

State Engineer Lewis Sees Good Argu-
ment for National Law in
This Situation.

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.)
Salem, Or., April 7.—Trouble has
arisen at New Pine Creek, a town on
the Oregon-California border line, over
the town's municipal water supply, be-
cause of interstate complications. Pine
creek, the source of water, flows from
Oregon into California and then back
into Oregon, and it appears that ap-
propriators in California claim all the
waters of the creek, thus shutting off
the supply for the town.

A statement given out today by State
Engineer Lewis, to whom the citizens
of New Pine Creek have appealed, in-
dicates that "the Shasta valley project
in California, which is planning to di-
vert water from Klamath river in Ore-
gon, may find it impossible to secure a
permit until California becomes more
liberal toward Oregon."

"Appropriators in California claim
all the waters of Pine creek, and are
depriving the incorporated town of
New Pine Creek, Oregon, of a municipal
water supply," said Mr. Lewis. "This
town is located near the inter-
state boundary line south of Lakeview,
and has a complete system of water
mains installed, securing its water
supply from across the state line. One
third of the water running into the
stream originates in Oregon above the
town's intake, and the entire stream
flows into Oregon below this intake."

"I have repeatedly called attention
to an unfair law adopted by California,
March 3, 1911, making it unlawful to
conduct water from that state into any
other state, for use therein. I have
pointed out the serious situation of
settlers in Lunkells valley on Lost
river, whose water supply is now being
seized by the state water board, but
the waters of which stream are
entirely controlled by the United States
through the construction of the Clear
Lake reservoir, just over the line in
California. The regulating works are
beyond the jurisdiction of the Oregon
officials in case of shortage, and the
adjudication proceedings may be of no
value in case of arbitrary action of
the government officials."

"To retaliate, Oregon has enacted a
law, authorizing the state engineer to
deny applications for the diversion of
water in Oregon, for use in other
states. If under the laws of such state
water cannot lawfully be diverted for
use in Oregon, the Shasta valley
project in California, which is plan-
ning to divert water from Klamath
river in Oregon, may find it impossible
to secure a permit until California be-
comes more liberal toward Oregon."

"To overcome these interstate diffi-
culties Mr. Lewis has suggested the
enactment of a national water law, and
has recently appointed on a committee
to prepare such a law by the American
Society of Civil Engineers."

"Until such law is enacted, there is
no remedy except through the slow,
expensive and antiquated method of
government by injunction," said Mr.
Lewis.

Only Few Arguments.
Salem, Or., April 7.—Next Friday,
which is the last day on which candi-
dates for office may file their com-
pleted petitions with the secretary of
state, is also the last day that they
may file arguments for the voters' pamphlet. This is the case in regard
to arguments either in support of or
against any candidate. So far only a
few candidates have filed arguments.

Many in High Schools.
Salem, Or., April 7.—Over 11 per
cent of all the pupils enrolled in the
public schools in Oregon are in the
high schools, according to statistics
gathered by State School Superintendent
J. A. Churchill. This is believed

to be a higher percentage than can be
shown in any other state. Government
statistics show that throughout the
nation as a whole only 1 per cent of the
boys and girls in the public schools are
in the high schools.

To Pass on Fairs.
Salem, Or., April 7.—Based on the
registration for the last regular elec-
tion, 15 per cent of the voters of a
county must sign a petition to call an
election for voting upon the establish-
ment of county fair grounds, under
the new law enacted by the last legis-
lature, according to an opinion of the
attorney general, given today to E. L.
Coburn, county clerk of Josephine. He
held that the signers of the petition
must be voters who have registered
this year.

New Life Insurance Issued.
Salem, Or., April 7.—Fifty-one life
insurance companies doing business in
Oregon issued policies last year to
12,223 persons in this state for sums
aggregating \$25,217,989. Their total
amount of life insurance in force in
this state on December 31, 1912, was
\$116,543,942, according to a statement
issued today by State Insurance Com-
missioner Ferguson. This was an in-
crease of nearly \$10,000,000 during the
year.

These companies collected \$3,823,367
in premiums less reinsurance in au-
thorized companies, and paid out in
claims the sum of \$1,888,955, less re-
insurance in admitted companies.

Five Candidates File Declarations

**Flagel, for Congress, Only Portland
Man; Three From Marion County;
Sheahan of Enterprise in the Race.**

Salem, Or., April 7.—Pledging him-
self to "give the public business the
same attention that has heretofore
been given to my private business," A.
F. Flagel of Portland has filed his
declaration as a candidate for the
Democratic nomination for congress in
the third district, comprising Multnomah
county, yesterday afternoon.

W. H. Downing of Sublimity filed his
declaration of candidacy for the
Democratic nomination for state senator
in Marion county.

Tom J. Cronise of Salem, Republi-
can, filed for representative in Mar-
ion.

Daniel W. Sheahan of Enterprise,
Democrat, filed for representative in
the Twenty-fourth district, comprising
Union and Walla Walla counties.

censes from store owners and others
in the Lents district. His opinion fol-
lows:

"The supreme court of Oregon, in the
recent case of Cooke versus the
city of Portland, announced the prin-
ciple of law that, in proceedings for
the annexation of territory into the
city of Portland, this city must ob-
serve not only all of the requirements
of its charter, but also the state law
on the subject of annexation of ter-
ritory. In attempting to annex the Syl-
van district, the city of Portland did
not observe any of the requirements
of the state law and was otherwise re-
miss, in consequence of which the at-
tempted annexation was declared to be
void."

Lents Case Considered.
"In the annexation of the Lents ter-
ritory our information is that the state
law was complied with in part only,
but the courts notwithstanding the de-
fects in the procedure in the Lents
annexation, may declare Lents to be
a legal part of the city of Portland,
and we would advise you that in the
opinion of this department it would be
wiser to treat Lents as a part of the
city of Portland until the courts have
formally declared the proceedings of
the annexation void."

"We are pleased to announce, in our
opinion, no question regarding the le-
gality of the annexation of any other
part of this city can be successfully
raised."

"On the strength of this opinion it
is expected the city will continue to
collect licenses, taxes and perform
other duties of the district as in the
past few months."
