Labor Council Has Ticket in Field

Marion County Organization and Pomona Grange Members Indorse Legislative Ticket.
Salem, Or., April 7.—A Republican legislative ticket is being put out in Marion county by the central labor council of Salem and the Pomona grange. The selected candidates for representatives are A. C. Libby of Jefferson, J. M. W. Bonney of Woodburn, C. W. Farris of Turner, C. W. Brant of Selem and Ivan G. Martin of Salem.

This ticket has been indorsed by the labor council and a committee from the council visited the Pomona grange, but that organization, because it is supposed not to mix in politics, did not take any official action approving the candidates. As individual members, however, the ticket was accepted by them as satisfactory.

All but Farris have filed their declarations.

Many Are Injured In Wreck of Limited

Three Trains Killed, 43 Persons Injured When Continental Limited on Wabash Goes Through Bridge.

Attica, Ind., April 6.—Of the 43 persons injured when the Wabash railroad's Continental Limited went through a Wabash river bridge west of here Sunday, it was thought today that all would live.

Two of the three who perished, Engineer Timothy Hall, caught under his engine, and Baggageman Harry Thomas, crushed beneath an avalanche of trucks, were killed outright. Fireman J. L. Miller was so badly scalded that he died in a short time.

Though the engine, baggage car and day coach plunged into the water they were not completely submerged.

Socialist Elected Mayor of St. Johns

Dr. A. W. Vincent Defeats Charles Bredeson, Republican-Progressive, Present Incumbent.

St. Johns, Or., April 7.—Dr. A. W. Vincent, Socialist, was elected mayor yesterday, defeating Charles Bredeson, incumbent, Republican and Progressive nominee, by 24 votes. Bredeson led by nine votes in the first ward, but was 42 behind in the second ward. Dr. H. O. Brown, named on the "law enforcement and good government" ticket, by the churches, ran last in each ward. Vincent received the Democratic nomination at the primaries, by having his name written on the ballots.

Recorder F. A. Rice, Republican and Progressive nominee, defeated H. D. Beam, Democratic and church independent nominee, by five votes for city treasurer. Albert E. Dunsmuir, Republican-Democrat-Progressive-church independent, defeated Miss Myrtle B. Brodahl, independent, for recorder by 130 votes. Miss Brodahl, present assistant recorder, was the only woman candidate. Thad T. Parker, Democrat-church independent, defeated Perry C. Stroud, Progressive-independent, by 52 votes for the city attorneyship. City Attorney O. J. Gatzmyer was defeated for reelection.

O. M. Cornell, Republican-Democrat-Progressive-church independent; H. M. Waldorf, Democrat-Progressive, and John W. Davis, church independent, were elected councilmen at large. George W. Munson, Republican-Democrat-Progressive, and C. R. Chadwick, Republican-Democrat, were elected councilmen from the second ward. From the first ward, Charles E. Garlick, Democrat, and Randolph Graden, Progressive-church independent, were elected councilmen.

Skillet-Shaped Hats.
With "stove polish" ribbon and "skillet-shaped" hats we seem to be getting back to the kitchen with a vengeance, and after all this homely part of the house offers all sorts of possibilities for the skillet-shaped hats with their adornment of ribbon, tulle and delicate flowers are quite as artistic as anything I have seen in millinery land this season. Poke bonnets are coming once more and already they may be seen in a variety of colors and degrees of "poke" in a Fifth street shop which specializes on the latest thing in hats.

Spring Cleaning Hints.
To Purify Sponges—Soak for 24 hours in buttermilk and then wash well in tepid water.

To Clean Ink Stained Floor Boards—Apply strong hydrochloric acid (spirit of salt) to the stains, and wash all acid away with clean water.

To Restore Painted Woodwork—Clean with weak soapy warm water and fuller's earth. Wash off with clean warm water and a leather.

To Cleanse Gilt Frames—Wipe softly with a sponge dampened with spirits of wine or oil of turpentine, and allow to dry of themselves.

To Wash Paper Mache—Use cold water without soap. Sprinkle with flour while wet, and polish with a rag of flannel.

To Wash Galvanized Vessels—Wash with strong soda and hot water. If soiled with a greasy deposit treat as recommended by baths.

To be fastenable you must be ruffled up from top to toe. We have been straight lined and slimsy and sleek so long that once the break was made there has been a mad revolt from the straight and narrow. The consequence is an amazing eruption of ruffles on all the spring frocks and hats.

While most of the ruffling on the gowns catches you on the hip following the approved hippy outline of the tunic, puff and pannier, others begin at the knee and take a crooked and bias path to the waist line. Some of the ruffles have even dared to break into that narrow zone about the ankles and on some of the newest taffeta models they ripple three deep about feet so long bounded only by the straight and narrow, plain and uncompromising hem.

For the skirt ruffles, net or the taffeta, from which the entire gown is built, are the approved materials. For the wrist ruffles and those outlining the low bodices the same materials are the thing, although lace is also popular. The neck frills evolved from the taffeta medium are very chic, but not as full as those of the thinner fabrics.

The new suit coats are all cut with a flaring circular ruffle around the bottom, when the suit is of serge or the heavier twilled silks. When the suit is of the omnipresent taffeta the coats are finished with ruffles as full and flamboyant as the law allows.

Separate silk wraps of flowered or plain silk are very quaint with kimono tops and deep ruffles two or three deep, set on from the yoke line to the finish. The loose sleeves of these wraps end in deep ruffles, while an upstanding one finishes the neck.

As for the hats, the small turban shapes almost all boast an upstanding frill of either taffeta or net, while the brimmed ones have ruffles of lace, net or taffeta gathered around their crowns and fluffily veiling their brims.
